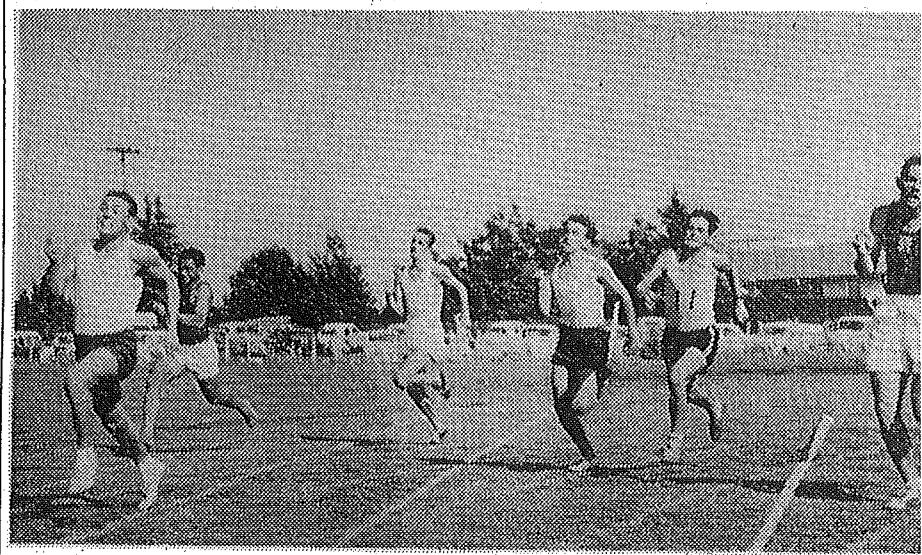

TAUPO FARMERS FACING SERIOUS DROUGHT - 1963 DRIEST YEAR IN DECADE

Unless there is a long period of rain, drought
conditions in the Taupo area are likely to become
serious for most farmers in the district.

In general farmers agree that it is probably the worst
drought in at least five
years, possibly 10.

Apart from small amounts
of "trace rain" Taupo county
has remained dry since the
second week in January.
Since then rainfall has been
inconsistent and only a frac-
tion of the seasonal average.

Several frosts in the area
have worsened the situation
and so far there has been no
autumn growth at all.

Farmers in the area norma-
lly depend on at least a

few inches of rain in Feb-
ruary and March to build up
the pasture for winter.

They say now that unless
frosts are delayed until later
in the winter and unless
there is a good fall of rain
the situation could be "seri-
ous."

Forage crops in most
areas have withered and un-
less there is reasonable rain-
fall before winter farmers
will have to depend on hay
supplies.

Farmers with a late fat
lamb season have reported
stock in poor condition.

While the dry weather has
kept down lamb worm,
young stock in the district
has not gained condition at
a normal rate.

Further afield in Whaka-
maru dairy farmers have re-
ported a drop in production
of about one-third.

Pumice pastures in that
area have been dried out by
high winds and a long rain-
less period.

The conveniences on the landing reserve were again referred to when a letter was received from the Internal Affairs Department advised that pumping equipment for the conveniences had been ordered and would be available in about three months time. The department meantime had given an assurance that it would open the conveniences over the Easter period.

The Taupo Borough Council decided to give support to an Autumn Festival in the future.

The Borough Engineer, Mr W. K. Kiddle, would be in a position shortly to prepare proposals for water reticulation on the Gradwell Block and Wharewaka Point. This was stated after the County Council had asked for a report on the planning.

Mr J. E. Story, Cr. C. J. E. Newbold and Cr. W. L. Haines will represent the Borough Council on a lake tour next month organised by the County Council. Development of reserves and potential of the lake-side areas are to be the subject of the tour.

The Taupo Citizens Silver Band is to benefit by £75 from a grant by the Borough Council. However, the Council required that the amount be placed in an account for new instruments.

Swamp Land For Private Wild-life Breeding

Private competition with the Government for the purchase of swamp land for wild-fowl breeding grounds was hampering Internal Affairs Department plans, Mr J. Clendon, senior executive officer, told the Lake Taupo Angling, Shooting and Boating Federation on Saturday.

There was a growing tendency, said Mr Clendon, for private groups of sportsmen to purchase swamp land, for their own use, at prices well above those which the department could pay.

In certain respects this situation was a reasonable one, because the land would not be reclaimed, he said, but it did curtail the department's activities.

Mr A. J. Disney (Taupo Rod and Gun Club), said that this practice would continue until the Government put a stop to it.

Mr E. Barling (Motuoapa Fishing, Shooting and Boating Association) raised the question of Government owned sanctuaries.

While these privately owned swamps were good breeding grounds, they were also open to shooting for two weeks a year. During the rest of the year the birds were not disturbed.

This policy, he said, should extend to the Government sanctuaries.

Mr Clendon said it was not the Government's intention to close all the swamp areas which it acquired to shooters.

As land was acquired the department would maintain a balanced policy.

Taupo is to be displayed in a Rotorua shop window during the coming travel week, being held in conjunction with the Travel and Holiday Association convention.

A special sub-committee has been appointed by the Taupo branch of the Travel and Holiday Association to decide what is to go into the display.

The travel week will be held for five days from June 10 and holiday and tourist centres throughout New Zealand will be represented.

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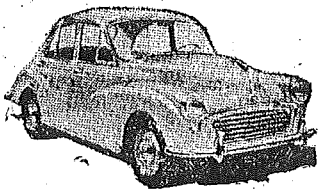

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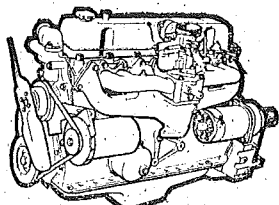

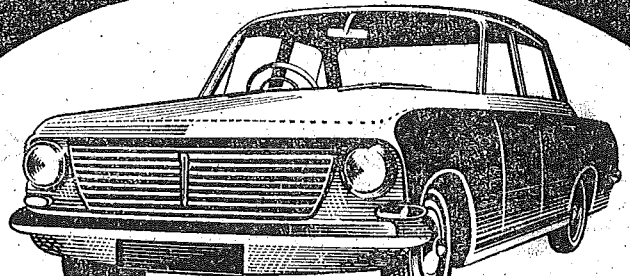

The cost of bringing these into line would be in the vicinity of £500,000 — and this should be dealt with within the next five years, ten at the outside.

So far as the planning of county roads in areas to be developed in the future, the council was in the unique position of having a number of markets to chose from.

Mr Haskell suggested a plan for a roading pattern in the future should be drawn up.

"The council is about 50 years behind in its roads development, but its people are not 50 years behind. They want more action than they are getting at present.

"We have to compress 50 years' work into five to 10 years."

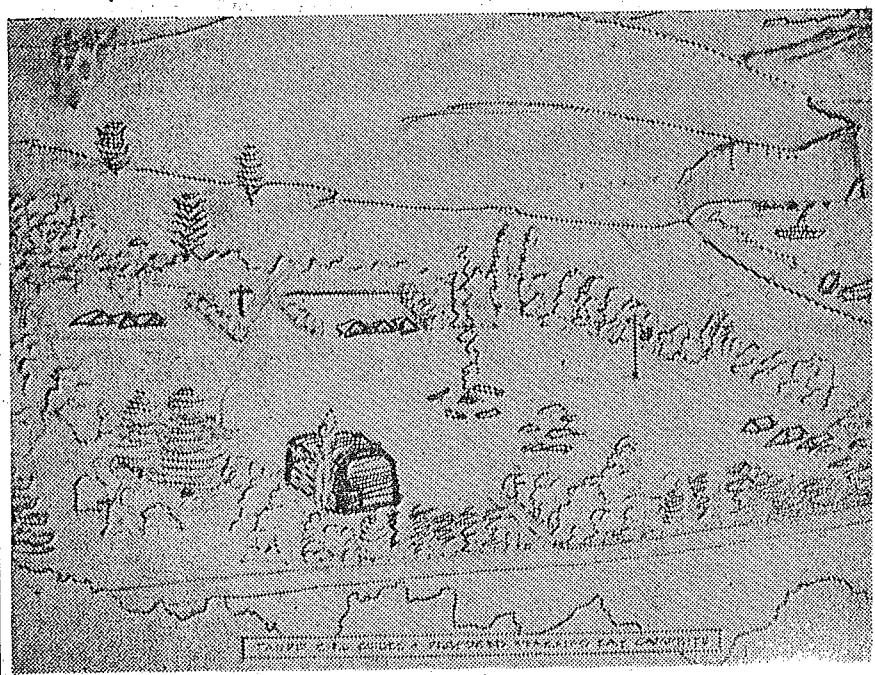

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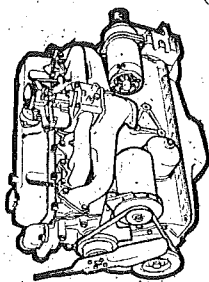
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**IMPORTANT SOCCER WINS TO WAIRAKEI AND

County Loses Metal Off Its Roads

The Taupo County Council is yearly faced with a large capital loss in road metal which is largely being wasted, the engineer, Mr G. B. Burton told the council last week.

"Last year a total of approximately 3000 yards was spread on the roads and I am almost certain that this rate of application does not anywhere near compensate for the amount of metal lost through breaking, abrasion, wind and water erosion.

"It as been estimated that on a moderately used road, losses from this source are of the order of 1/4 cu. yds. per chain, and ignoring the sealed and unmetalled roads, the loss on this basis is approximately 18,000 cubic yards per annum.

"From this, it can be seen that great quantities of the capital asset are being wasted each year.

"This is a further point in favour of sealing the roads as quickly as possible, for not only is the quantity of metal lost great, but so is the capital cost lost because of the extremely high cost of metal in the county.

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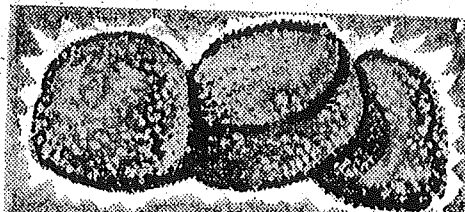
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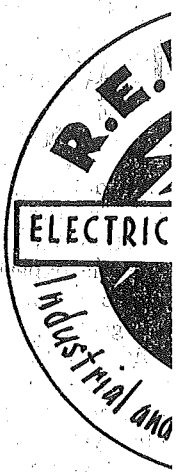
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REVENGE FOR TAUPO SOCCER CLUB AGAINST WAIRAKEI

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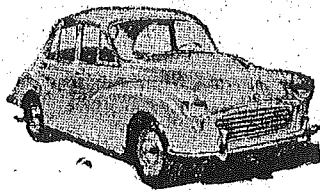
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TAUPO SOCCER CLUB WINS GAME WITH WAIRAKEI 4-3

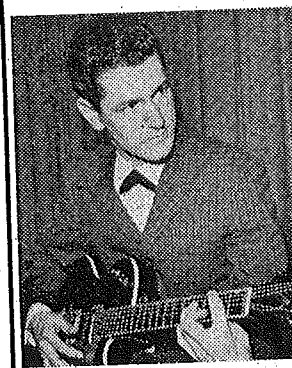

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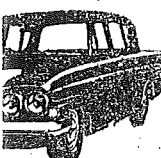
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SOCCER TEAM HAD HARD TIME TO DRAW 3-ALL

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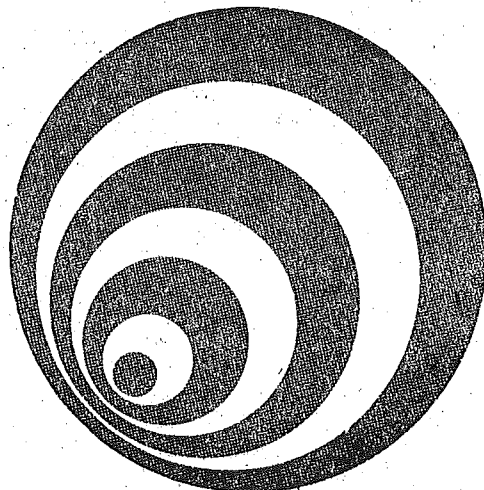

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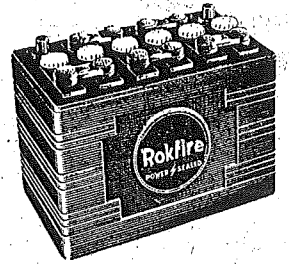

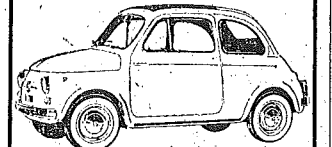

The announcement of the construction of a new geothermal power station of about 150 megawatts at Wairakei may be made in about a year's time.

He made the statement in officially opening the annual conference of the Electrical Supply Authorities' Association at Rotorua.

Less water than expected was available for the "flash-steam" plant using waste hot water.

"Whilst the steam field is maintaining the output of steam, the steam is much drier than a few years ago," he said.

The availability of hot water for the supply of steam for Stage III would not be known for some time.

The construction of Stage II was now nearing completion.

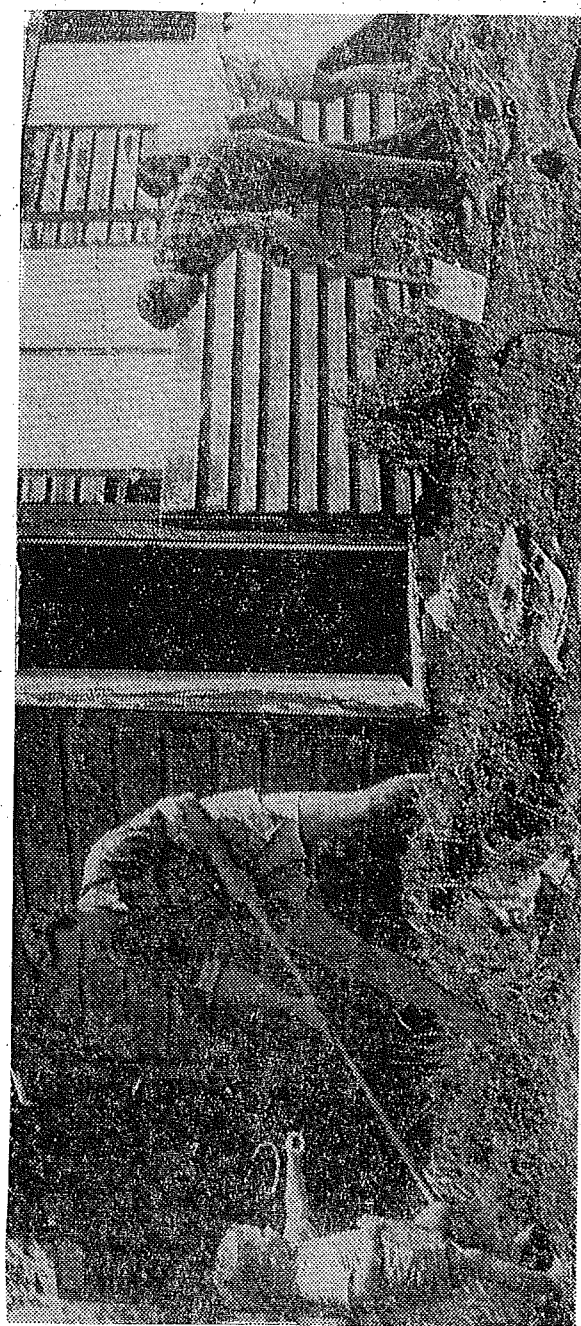

Have visited your website and have looked at the photos of your earliest teams and I'm pretty sure that I am in that first photo, in the front row to the right hand side looking at the photo. Do you have the names of the players in that first photo?. I played for Taupo in 1963 in the B division of the Bay Of Plenty League and I'm sure I was in the team that came second in the league during that season. I then transferred to Wairakei for the following season because I had then moved from the Atiamuri Power Station to work in the Wairakei Geothermal Station and at work there, I had to take a lot of pressure from my workmates, to transfer to my now local team, although I had been very content with Taupo. I believe I was part of the Wairakei team that won promotion to A Division of the BOP league the following season, although I never played in that division as I moved on to work at the Kinleith Mill in Tokoroa. I then returned to Scotland in 1966.

When I first moved out to New Zealand in 1963 I was placed to work at my trade at the Atiamuri Hydro Power Station. I was recruited to play for Taupo by an insurance agent who was selling me life insurance at the time. He had contacts at the Taupo Soccer Club and arranged a mid week trial for me in Taupo. As I had no transport I had to get one of my workmates at Atiamuri to drive me down to the training session in Taupo. After the training I was asked by the Austrian coach, to sign on for the team at that time. I had to explain to him then that I might have difficulty getting to the games. It was then arranged for two of the Taupo players at that time to come to Atiamuri and pick me up and take me to the games home and away.

The first guy to pick me up at Atiamuri was a fellow Scot, called Hector, who arrived in a works Landrover to take me to play against a team in Rotorua with a name like Kahakura. We travelled to the game via Upper Atiamuri. The following week I was picked up again and taken for a home game in Taupo and then driven back to Atiamuri after the game by a Dutch member of the team, who stayed in a construction house near the Waikato River in Taupo. I had to sit in his house until he had his dinner with his family before he returned me up the road to Atiamuri. I was offered dinner with his family, of course, but declined because Oor Louisa would have dinner waiting for me back home in Atiamuri.

When I played my first game against the Wairakei side in the league I wondered why I seemed to be taking a lot of abuse from the Wairakei team and their support and only found out at the harmony after the game, in a hut beside the Wairakei's pumice soil pitch that the abuse was because they had found out that I worked for the then New Zealand Electricity Department and that they thought that as they were mostly NZED employees too, that I should be playing with them. I believe I scored a goal for Taupo that day. I never had photos of the Taupo team when I played with them but have photos of Wairakei the year later.

I still have pleasant memories of playing for both Taupo and Wairakei and when I visited New Zealand in the year 2000 and stayed in Taupo for nine days of a six week holiday. I visited your new park and looked in the window of your clubhouse, unfortunately the place was closed and there was nobody about as it was the close season over there at the time. I was twenty five years old when I played with Taupo and I'm now seventy one years old and I am now considering giving up playing soccer, now that players can get past me.

Best Wishes to the team and will follow your progress with interest.
