UNION WAY FOR SCOUTS

A new programme of scout training is under way in the Taupo area.

This has come about because it was felt past programmes lacked the basic ability to keep boys interested.

"The yardstick of our success is not the numbers we train, but how well we train them," said the district commissioner for Taupo, Mr P. H. Campbell, at the annual meeting of the local association this week.

"Looking at the June census, it shows that every group had a drop in numbers, which over the district amounted to a complete scout troupe.

"Standards on the other hand, showed an increase of three in the number of second-class badges awarded, and a decrease of 10 in the number of first-class.

"On these figures, there

was obviously something wrong somewhere," said Mr Campbell.

"District training was accordingly aimed at programme planning, and in conjunction with the Waikato area, a booklet was produced which has proved of immense value in planning for progressive and interesting training for the boys," he said.

County And WVA To Meet On Land Utilisation Plan

Taupo County Council and the Waikato Valley Authority are to meet to consider the council's recommendation that a land utilisation plan should be prepared before Lands and Survey Department develop further farm blocks.

The council decided to invite the authority to meet it following discussion in committee on a "shocking" case of erosion at Whakamaru, attributed directly to Lands and Survey development of hill country behind the farm affected.

According to councillors present at a meeting last week, the area of Mt. Kahu was causing erosion which was cutting 3000 cubic yards of sediment from the farm each month. This, said Cr M. J. Black, had continued for the past 20 months.

Remedial measures to a minimum scale were likely to cost nearly £2600 and included large scale planting, erection of 151 chains of permanent fence, 50 chains relocated and 50 chains of electric fence, as well as re-tiring 75 acres of land and withdrawal of 41 acres of forest from lease.

"Lands and Survey should be forced to plant a large area of Mt. Kahu behind the farm in forest and to retire the bulk of the remainder from farming," Cr Black told the meeting.

Cr P. Mann: There must be a committee set up which wields greater power than these Government departments — including the geothermal power development section. There are bores going out onto farms in the

Aratiatia Rapids Will Be "Turned On" For Tourists

The early promise of the NZED to maintain the Aratiatia Rapids as a tourist attraction is to be kept. The department will "turn on" the rapids twice a day at specified times.

In a statement to the Taupo Times today, the district electrical engineer, Hamilton, says:—

"Aratiatia, the eighth and final hydro-electric power station on the Waikato River, is scheduled to commence operating within a week.

"Twice a day, every day, so that visitors may see the river flowing over the rapids, the station load will be reduced and the spillway gates will be opened.

"This will occur as a definite programme every day from 10 a.m. to 11.30 a.m. and from 2.30 p.m. to 4 p.m., but water may also be discharged down the rapids at other times to suit operating conditions.

"On these occasions, the water will rise quickly and it is most important that the public do not enter the river bed at any time.

"As a safety precaution, the NZED has installed a siren which will sound with a rising and falling note for 15 seconds whenever water is about to flow down the rapids, except in the unusual event of this happening at night.

"Warning notices and fences are being erected."

A Home Away From Home For Men On Arduous Job

Taupo Post Office employees have all the comforts of home while working on the reticulation scheme in Heu Heu Street.

The red-hot brazier outside a tent covering a hole in the street was once a familiar sight in the old days of the P. and T.

It was also a common sight to see a P. and T. employee emerge, dirty, from his hole to warm himself at his fire, made from sand doused with petrol.

Now Post Office employees, in Taupo at least, are up-to-date with electric heaters, transistor radios and fluorescent lights in their inspection holes.

This undoubtedly makes working conditions more favourable in a job that must be far from pleasant at the best of times.

The reticulation scheme being worked on a 24-hour shift in Heu Heu Street has these amenities.

The series of inspection holes are first dried out with the use of blow lamps and heaters, lights are installed, then the two-man teams move in with their radios, under the canvas tent, to work feeding the 1800 pair cable through the conduit.

Twenty-four hour shifts are worked to eliminate time sealing the conduit, which must be done when the job is left, to prevent moisture entering and damaging the cable.

NEW SKI FIELD VILLAGE PLANNED FOR RUAPEHU

The Tongariro National Park Board has approved the development of a new ski field village on the Ohakune side of Mount Ruapehu, to be called the Ohakune Alpine Village.

It has also approved a development scheme for the area round the Cha-teau.

In a report in the National Park News, the Chief Ranger, Mr J. Mazey, said, "approval in principle has also been given to the establishment of a village on the eastern side of Mt. Ruapehu and it is anticipated that the ski-fields served by these new villages will assist in catering for the considerable number of people now visiting the park.

"The number of winter season visitors to the park in 1962 was assessed at 82,000 and in 1963 the figure rose to 124,000 (a 52% increase), with more expected in the coming season.

"There is no doubting the popularity of this winter playground and the board is doing its utmost to keep facilities in pace with the increase in visitor numbers. Reliable estimates show that overall public visitation has increased 700% since 1954."

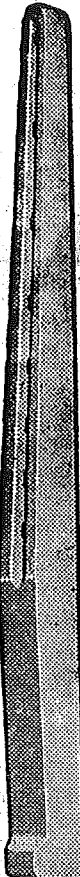

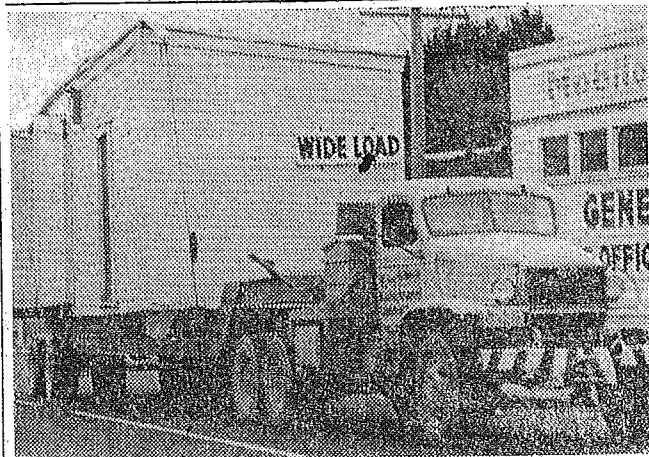

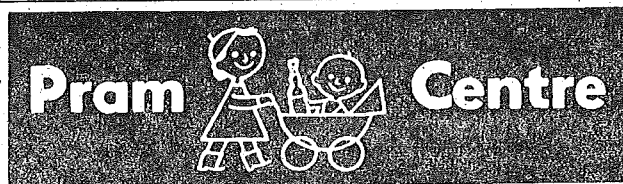

PUMPKIN OR SQUASH

Wash, cut open and remove seeds. Peel and cut into one-inch cubes. Steam for 15 minutes. Pack loosely in jars, pint size preferably, add half teaspoon salt to each pint or one teaspoon to each quart. If bottled in pieces, cover with vegetable water or fresh boiling water. Process for three hours by waterbath method, or 80 minutes (one hour for pint jars) by pressure cooker method.

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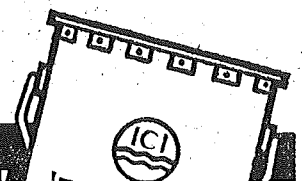

Upper Waikato Proposals Could "Revive" Rotting Maraetai 2 Hydro Scheme

Development of the Upper Waikato hydro schemes would increase the efficiency of the Lower Waikato stations, Mr A. W. Gibson said in Taupo last week. Because of this, and because the development of geothermal power would call for more peak load generation, it might be necessary to "recover" Maraetai 2.

The Upper Waikato proposals would put a considerable amount more water in Lake Taupo and this would then be available to increase the load factor of the lower river schemes.

At the same time, because Wairakei geothermal stations had to be run at a high plant factor (i.e. be generating power all the time) it would be necessary to develop a greater peak load efficiency throughout the system.

Geothermal engineers find it difficult to shut the steam and close down the gen-

Some attempt was made to "mothball" the work, but to a large degree, it stands in its half-finished state with steelwork rusting and wooden formers rotting in the weather.

Mr Gibson emphasised that there was no "tie-up" between the Upper Waikato scheme and the revival of Maraetai 2, but one could follow the other.



"On Saturday next, May Corso will hold a nationwide house-to-house canvass for funds for the Freedom from Hunger Campaign," said Mr Brown. 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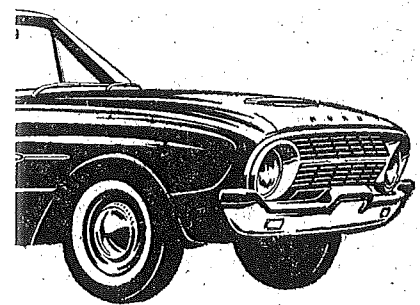
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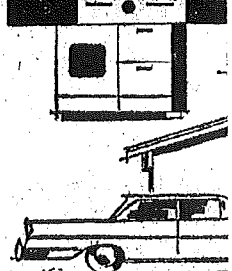

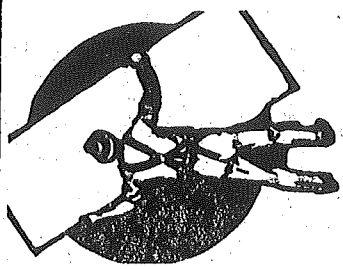

Mr E. A. Mahood, building contractor, Taupo, suffered injuries to his hands and leg, at his business premises, Runanga Street, last week.

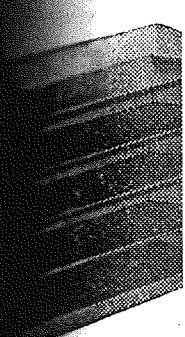
He was alone at the time of the accident, but was able to telephone the ambulance, which subsequently took him to the Rotorua Hospital.

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More Playing Fields May Be Needed Than Are Suggested By Crown Report

Probably one of the most controversial subjects in any town is the location, size and number of playing fields allocated to various sports bodies. Taupo is not likely to be any different and there will be a number of organisations which will differ with the report on present and future utilisation of Crown land in Taupo, presented by the Department of Lands and Survey.

While the report allows a nominal 55 acres for sports fields for a population projection of 15,000, much of the land is thermal and unsuitable for this purpose.

When compared with the Government's own table of playing fields — and even taking into consideration those in existence already — the report is not over-generous in this respect.

Originally, the Taupo Borough Council was reported as requiring 80 acres of land, but the second publication of the report brings this figure down to 55. The report further notes that "the council is willing to pay for the land."

The report says:—
"The only large, relatively



flat areas suitable for recreation occurs at the end of Kotare Street, adjoining the proposed intermediate school.

"At present, facilities for outdoor sports are somewhat limited, the principal grounds being the domain in Tongariro Street (Rugby two fields) and the reserve at the intersection of Rifle Range Road and Kaimanawa Street (soccer, two fields).

"The estimated population at the end of the planning period is 15,000. Types of sports catered for, and the numbers of playing fields required are shown in the following table.

The first column has been derived from the Government Publication "Playing Fields," which was compiled for the Wellington region.

Mr Averill is survived by his wife, Edith, and his daughter, Pam (Mrs McAulay, Rangiriri).

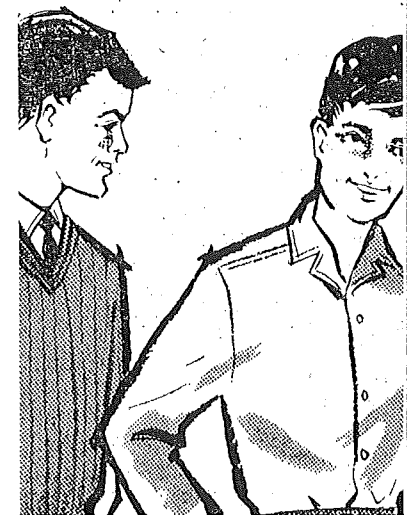
Play Area At Motor Camp

"The figures provided in the second column are exclusive of existing playing fields.

"The last three sports listed, bowling, croquet and tennis, are generally formed by individual clubs.

"The grounds for these sports are not usually grouped together, but are located throughout residential areas to serve the population in each district. The area required is comparatively small and bowling, croquet or tennis grounds can be sited on one or two adjoining residential sections.

"The proposed intermediate school, adjacent to the sports ground, could provide at least one Rugby field. Adequate facilities should be available for summer sports, namely cricket and softball, in the areas set aside for Rugby, hockey and soccer.

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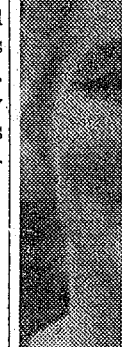

HOSPITAL FOR TOKOROA MORE TALKS ABOUT

The Waikato Hospital Board has Health Department approval to build hospital at Tokoroa.

The board disagrees with the department recommendation concerning Taupo hospital and will send a deputation to the department in Wellington.

Tokoroa hospital will have 50 general and 10 geriatric beds.

The department has said that on population predictions a 60-bed hospital at Tokoroa should enlarge to 120 beds.

The second stage will be undertaken as needed.

The board will proceed now with the accommodation schedule and sketch plans for the new hospital.

The board chairman, Mr E. G. Guy, said Health Department regulations regarding a hospital at Taupo did not agree with the needs of the board.

The board will send a deputation to Wellington to discuss Taupo hospital proposals with the department.

The board wants a general hospital of not less than 40 beds.

But the department feels several factors are making a proper valuation difficult.

One is the present pattern of hospital services around Tokaanu and Turangi.

In this area a sharp population influx would require locally based maternity services.

A small emergency and accident staging point to complement the present service also might be needed.

The department has told the board that in addition to any plans the board may have for geriatric care at Taupo, 10 holding beds would be needed at once.

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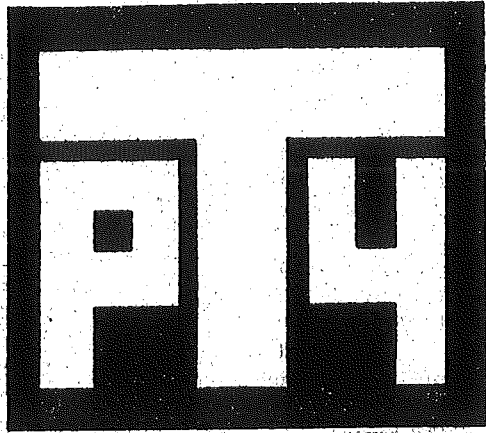

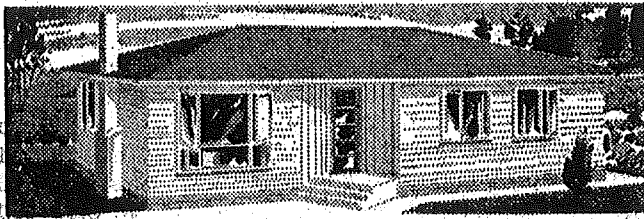

Houses Not Allowed Back In Mangakino, Says Council

Mangakino-type houses at present at Aratiatia must not be moved back to Mangakino by Ministry of Works, says Taupo County Council.

The council this week considered an application from MoW to move the houses back to Mangakino.

Cr P. Mann said the council should refuse the request.

Cr E. Scott: If we let them go into Mangakino, we may have repercussions in other ways. Are they going on sections we have asked the Maori Affairs Department to have surveyed?

Cr Black: If we don't agree with them being moved, they will be put in cold storage until they are moved to Turangi.

Mr H. M. Besley (chairman): I agree with Cr Black. We should have all our lame chicks in one hatch.

Cr J. K. Thorburn: That's just spreading the cancerous sore.

Cr Mann contended the houses should be destroyed. The council decided to refuse the request.

Licences May Be Restricted

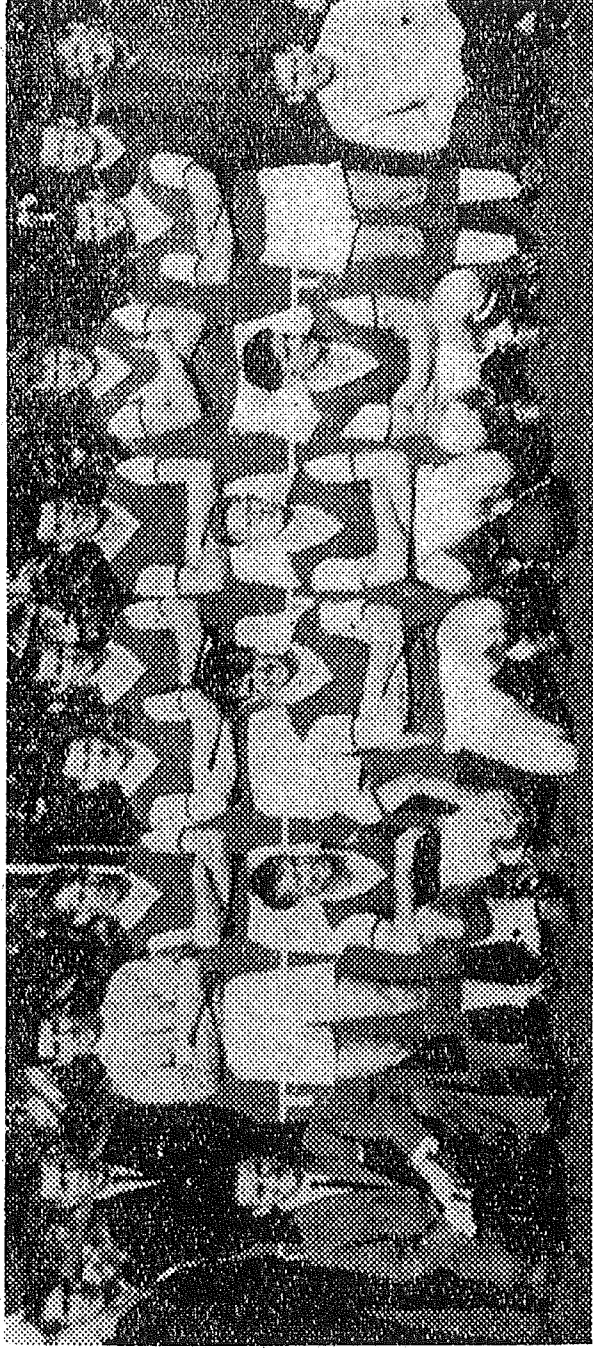

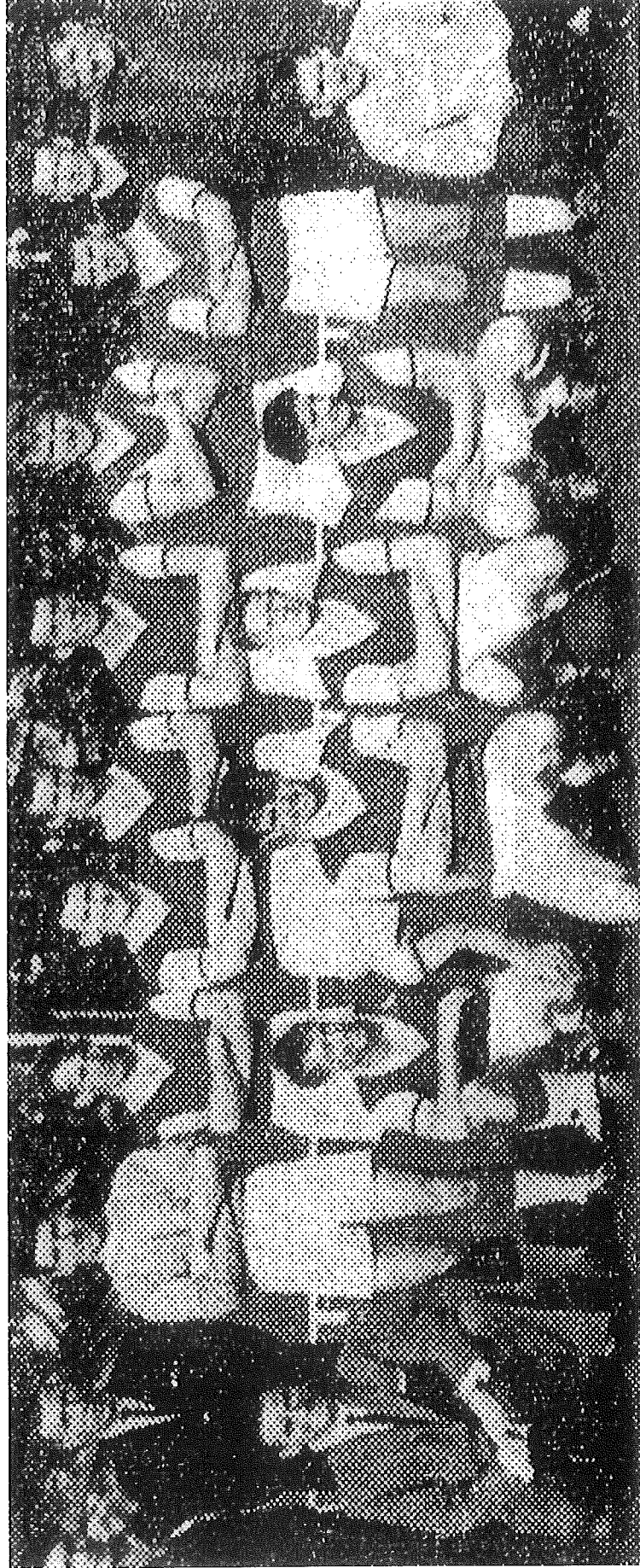

One would like to see more of Jane Galletly, who gave a most polished performance in a very difficult role.

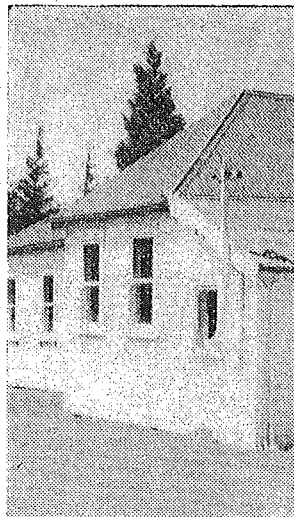
This evening and its entertainment proved most successful, and the Wairakei group is to be congratulated on the excellent standard and the novelty introduced by the seating.

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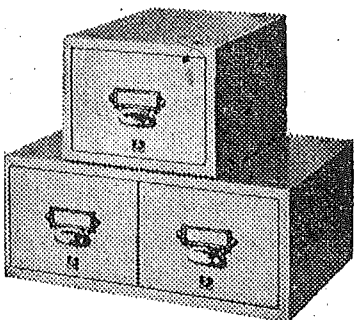

New Street Lights In Taupo

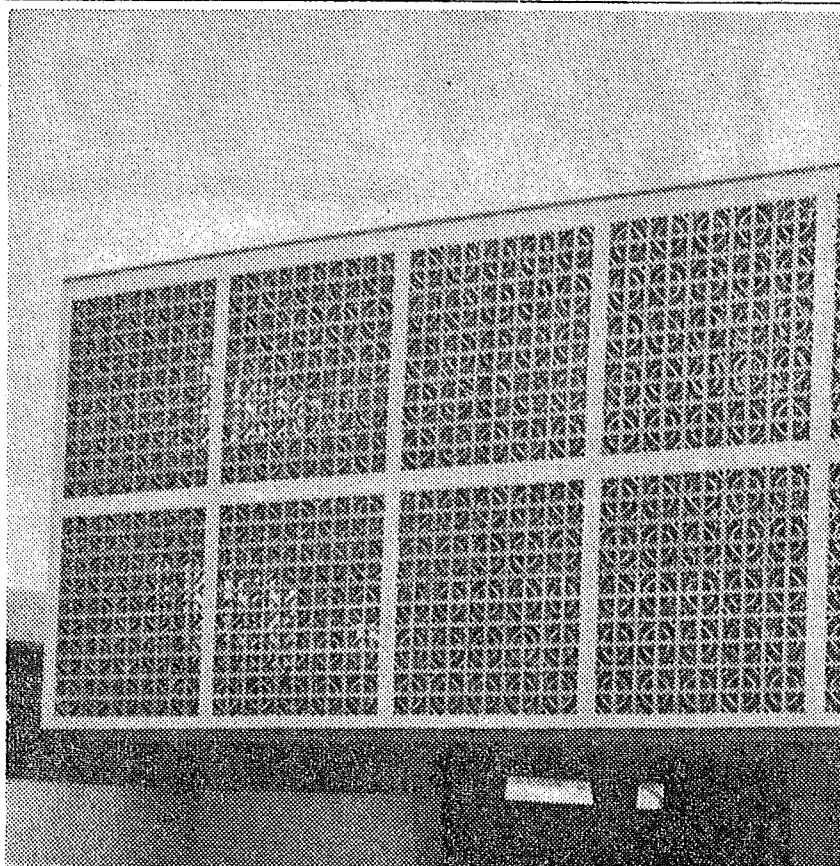
Seventeen street lights were installed in the Taupo borough in May. Most of these lights were placed on streets to the south of Rifle Range Road.

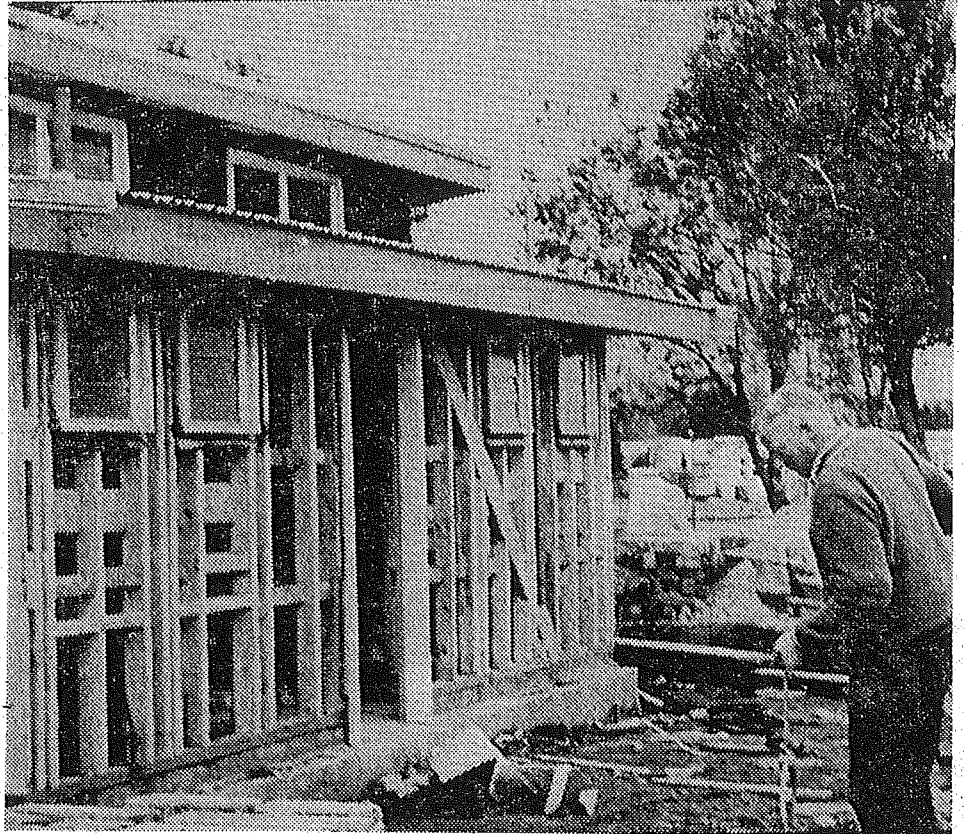

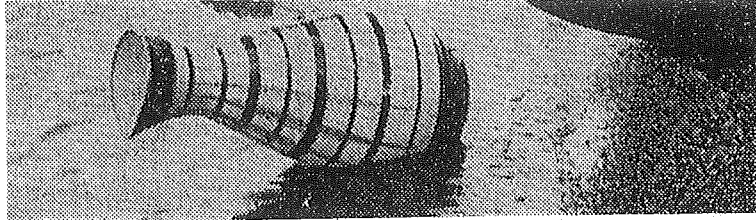

STATEMENT BY COUNTY FOLLOWS DISCUSSION

The chairman of the Taupo County Council, Mr H. M. Besley, yesterday issued a statement on business taken in committee at Tuesday's meeting of the council which dealt with a report submitted by the Turangi liaison committee.

The committee consists of officers of the Ministry of Works and council executives and was set up to co-ordinate mutual requirements, should the Government adopt the Tongariro hydro development proposals.

The statement is as follows:—

"Upon resuming open meeting, the chairman reported that while in committee, the council adopted the recommendations of the Turangi liaison committee as to principles and standards to be followed in the event of the Government proceeding with the construction of a township at Turangi. The recommendations concerned:

"The constitution of the committee during the early planning and development of the town, and it was agreed that the existing committee should operate during the early stages of planning, to be enlarged later as the development proceeds to include four additional Ministry of Works nominees, two councillors representing the Tongariro and Rangitoto ridings, and two persons nominated by the council representing the Turangi community.

"Concerning public relations, the committee should be open to approaches from all parties affected by activities in the area. Reports should be made available to the public on the progress of planning and construction after approval by the two authorities, that is, the council and Ministry of Works.

"Concerning the proposed town plan, the plan produced has been studied and is considered to meet in a satisfactory manner the requirements of all parties with the exception of certain points which have been referred back by the committee to the Ministry of Works.

"Concerning engineering standards, the plan showing proposed subdivisional standards with noted details is adopted. The standards shown have been revised and meet the requirements of the council.

"On the question of zoning, the proposed zoning plan is accepted as the basis for detailed rezoning of the area."

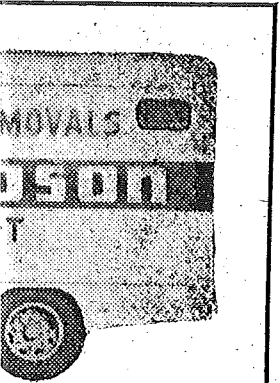

She soon found it was possible to feed it from her hand and, after a short while, it became bolder and took food from her lips.

Mrs Husband has now trained the bird and encouraged it to use the bird-bath in the garden.

It does not appear to be afraid of strangers and will readily pose for the camera or sit on a visitor's shoulder.

Perhaps the migrant from the bush recognised a friend because Mrs Husband has had considerable experience with bird life. Before coming to New Zealand she was a member of the world research station in England, where she spent many hours bird-watching.

Mrs Husband has planted flowers and shrubs on her quarter-acre section, designed to attract birds, and she has had many species visit the property.

Before coming to Taupo, Mrs Husband was on a farm where she was able to tame a wild duck. She said she was able to "call the duck

down from a tree" and it was a phenomenon that attracted many people to the farm. Unfortunately, when the shooting season came the bird was never seen again.

Mrs Husband, who is a new resident in Taupo, intends joining the Forest and Bird Protection Society.

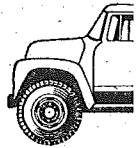
Western Suburbs fought back and their bustling centre forward, B. Hornfolk, caught the Wairakei defence on the wrong foot and netted from close in.

Cr D. Davis: My view is we are not concerned with effluent but with the establishment of noxious industry in the borough.

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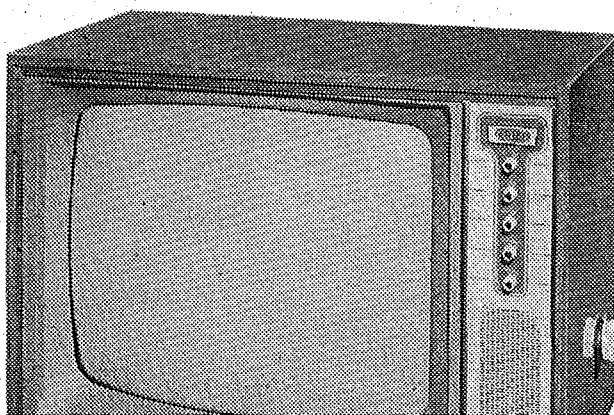

Next week Wairakei play Taupo at Wairakei in the final for the Fenton Cup, this being the last game of the season.

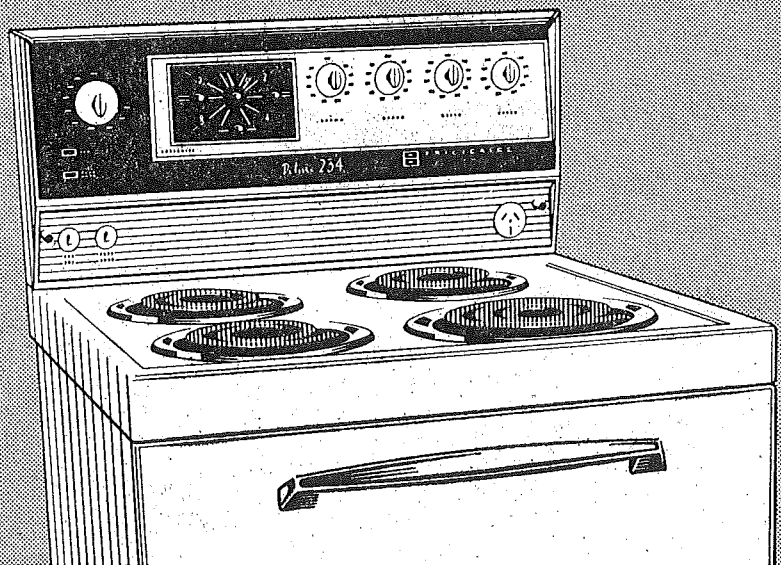

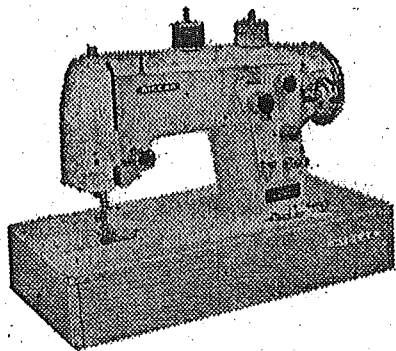

Dear Gordon

This is my photo of the Wairakei football team, taken just before or just after the photo of the same Wairakei that you sent to me.

This photo was taken at Smallbone Park, Rotorua just before the game against Rotorua Rangers in a B division game in 1964.

Back row, looking at photo. Johnny Graham, club official, Johnny was a shift operator in the Wairakei Power Plant, he came from Belfast in Northern Ireland and returned there in 1966. Richie Armstrong, goalkeeper who came from the Newcastle area of England and returned to England, about 1966 and joined London Police, then it is myself, Bill Lee from Kirkconnel, a mining village in Dumfriesshire, Scotland and who also worked as a Shift Operator at the Wairakei Power Plant, I left Wairakei, just after the team had been promoted to the A division, to work at Kinleith before returning to Scotland late 1966. Bill Swanston who came from Glasgow and I'm not sure where Bill worked in the Taupo area, the next two players I can't remember their names, but both were stalwarts in the team, then Jake Lees, from Renfrew in Scotland who was a control room operator at Wairakei Power Station, Jake was a single man and stayed in the single men's accommodation in Wairakei Village. The next player is McAughtrie, I think his first name was John, who came from Greenock in Scotland and worked as a Joiner(Chippie) locally and he had a brother, Bob who worked at the Wairakei Power Plant, his parents also stayed in the village, Mr Christie, from Lancashire in England, I think, who was a Turbine Hall Assistant in the Power Plant.

Front Row, Tommy Drummond, club official, who came from Wales and was a store keeper at Wairakei Power Station, who I later heard had moved to the new Gas Power Station near New Plymouth in Taranaki, the next player was a Mr Ellis I think and I'm fairly sure he was English, The next player was a Londoner, first name Terry, who was a Mechanical Fitter at the Power Plant. The next player is a youngster called Christie, I think and he was the son of the gentleman in the top row, young Christie was I think an electrician at the Power Plant. Andy Masson was Dutch and a very good player, who, I was made to believe, had played at a fairly high level in Holland, The last man is Brian Hobbs, a Londoner who also played for the team and helped a great deal in the running of the club.

We were wearing a new strip for this football season and every one associated with the team got a vote on what colour the strip had to be and as the biggest vote was for a blue strip because of their support for Glasgow Rangers an order was put to Brian Hobbs's mother in England, who ran or owned a sports shop there, for a blue strip to be sent out to New Zealand. We Rangers supporters were a wee bit disappointed when the strips arrived with the white arms on them but this was the nearest that could be got to our requirements.

It was the following season that we won promotion to the A division, with little addition to the team squad shown, my brother had come over from Australia to work at Wairakei and was a welcome addition to the squad.

Gordon,

I can't remember the name of the other team mate nearest to me but believe he was English, the one further back is Bill Swanston, from Glasgow, who played at full back and the goalkeeper is Richie Armstrong who belonged to Blaydon near Newcastle in England. Richie insisted on playing in goals for Scotland in a Charity cum challenge match against England held in Taupo about that time.

There was also a challenge game between a Taupo select team versus Rotorua Select team held in Taupo in 1963 when I still played for Taupo. I was picked to play in the Taupo area team.

Gordon,

I have supported Glasgow Rangers from a very young age and watched them today on Sky television drawing with Celtic in the Scottish Cup and we were fortunate to get the draw. I only go about once a year now to see them in Glasgow. I still go to watch my hometown Junior team, Kello Rovers, when I can, in Scotland, Junior football does not mean that they are made up from youngsters but rather that they don't play in the Senior leagues like Rangers, Celtic, Falkirk or Stenhousemuir. The junior teams from the Falkirk area include Camelon and Linlithgow Rose.

I have only met Walsall supporters on one occasion when on a holiday in the South of England, but we used to visit the Cannock area of Staffordshire where we had relatives who worked in the Pits there and I was taken once to a West Brom game against Arsenal, although the relatives mostly supported Wolverhampton.

I stay in Kilwinning in Ayrshire, Scotland now and have done so since we returned from New Zealand in late 1966. I had a look at the history section of Taupo football Club again after I had sent the photos to you and thought that more has been added since the last time I looked a while back. The photo that you sent of the Taupo team I didn't recognise any of them with the exception of the coach, although a couple of the names looked familiar. The only other player I think I knew in the photo I believe I am in, was a fellow Scot, Hector from Edinburgh, who worked on contract as a welder for Altons of Redcar in Yorkshire on the Wairakei Project. He had the use of the company Landrover at the weekends and he would pick me up from Atiamuri every second week to take me to the Taupo games, home or away. The other weeks it was a Dutchman who would pick me up for the game and deliver me back to Atiamuri at night, but I had to sit in his house after the game and wait till he had his dinner with his family before he drove me home. He did offer me a meal too but I knew Louisa my wife would have dinner made for at home.

The first game that I played for Taupo against Wairakei at Wairakei, a game in which I scored, I wondered why I was taking a lot of stick from the Wairakei supporters, when I hadn't met any of them then and had therefore no history with them. It was later at the harmony after the game that I found out that they thought I should be playing for them as I was a NZED employee, the same as most of their players.

When I moved from Atiamuri Power Station to a better paying job at Wairakei Power Station, the Wairakei football personnel were constantly at me to transfer to their team. It was a hard decision for me to make after all the help I had received from the Taupo team, but it made sense to move to play with the locals as I still didn't have any transport of my own then. It was that much easier for training and playing, less of a burden on others and forbye it got them off my back.
