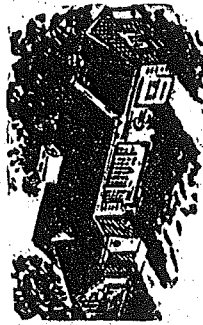

To The Editor

DELIGHTED?

Sir,—

I was delighted to see Mrs R. M. Stevenson, M.P. for Taupo, bringing the attention of Parliament to the necessity for prompt action on the Taupo County Council proposal for lakeside reserves.

This is a matter of local and national importance and urgency, and as such must be kept above party politics.

More people are in favour of the scheme than is realised generally. At the Labour Party conference last May I moved a motion that the Labour Party should adopt as policy the County Council proposals. This was defeated narrowly on the sole and justifiable grounds that an examination of the cost of honouring such a pledge would have to be gone into first.

It is to be hoped that, as with the Tokoroa Town Empowering Bill, another local issue with nationwide implications, Members of Parliament of both parties will act with wisdom, speed and unity.

My support for Mrs Stevenson's Budget speech is limited however, because I feel that of equal if not more importance is the Turangi scheme. Mrs Stevenson spoke for only one-third of her time and then sat down without having uttered one word about the Tongariro slowdown.

One question she could have asked was why the slowdown is continuing when several weeks ago the Federation of Labour publicly agreed to reopen negotiations with Codelfa. I understood that the Government initially had said that the only reason for the slow-

down was because the FOL had broken off the negotiations.

It is a great pity if clarification of the situation and the arguing of the case of those affected by the Government's actions are left to Labour members of Parliament rather than the local member. I wish I could support her stand on Turangi as I do on the lakeside reserve scheme. — Yours, etc.,

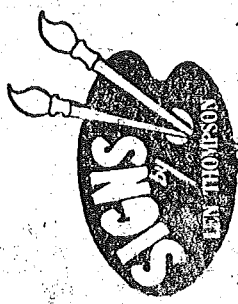

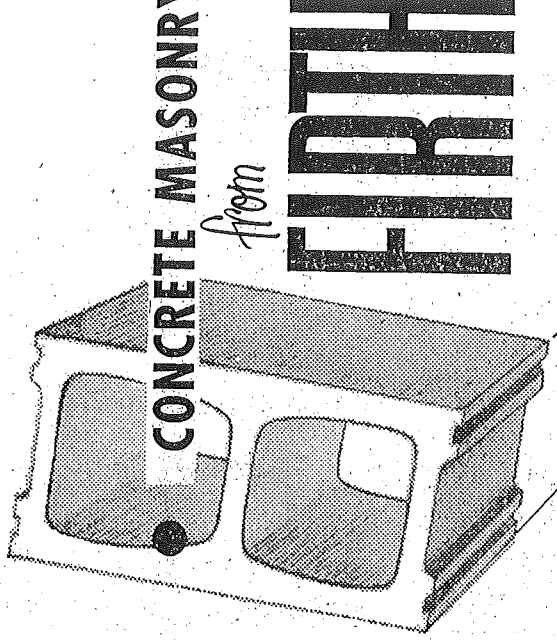

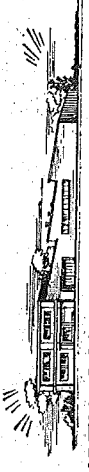

The success of the evening, which it is hoped will be repeated in September, indicates a growing support for Labour in the Turangi district, say branch officers.

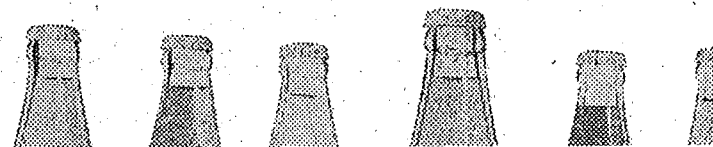
