

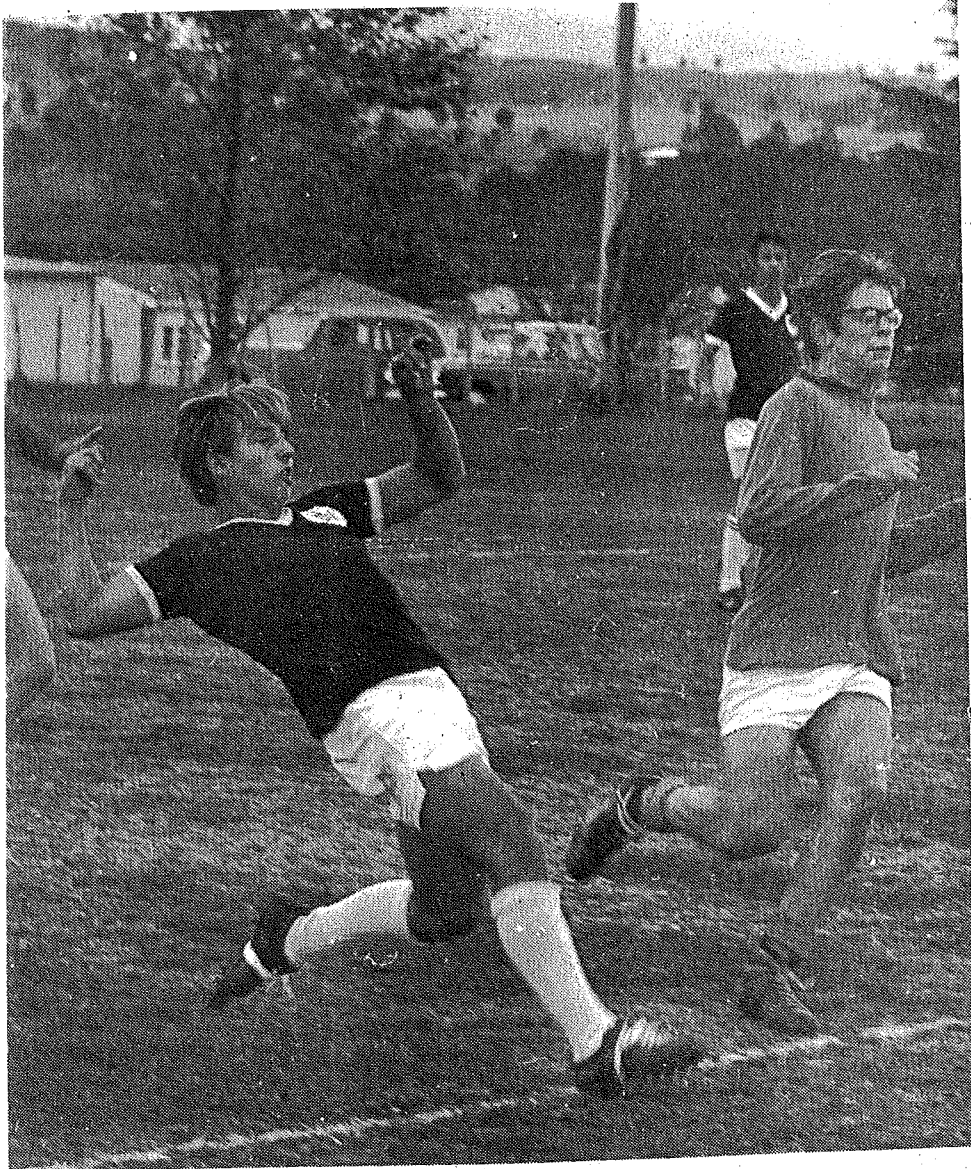

# M.O.W. PROJECT THIRD TUNNEL TO OPE

A third tunnel will be opened this month on the Tongariro Power Development.

While the 10-mile tunnel being constructed by the Italians at Taurewa and Downer and Associates 4-mile tunnel linking Lake Rotoaira with Lake Taupo were let to private contractors, the latest tunnel is being constructed solely by Ministry of Works employees.

But tunnel construction is far from new to Ministry of Works workers. Many of the senior staff engaged on the Poutu tunnel, just south of the Rangipo Prison Camp, have been associated with underground work on hydro construction projects all over the country before coming to Turangi.

The 8900 foot-long Poutu tunnel will be "D" shaped and 16ft 6in. in diameter. It will

# CONVINCING SOCCER WIN

Following their fine wins against Hautu (2-0) and Taurunui (4-1), the recently reformed Taupo Senior Soccer Club convincingly defeated Rangipo (11-0) at Turangi Park on Sunday in the division 2 Central North Island match.

From the beginning, Rangipo relied mainly on kick and rush methods and Taupo soon took command with superior football.

B. Vowden at centre-forward shot narrowly wide from a good position but after 10 minutes play a corner was forced on the left.

B. Bramley sent over a good centre which Vowden collected and passed to W. Christie who scored with a hard drive.

Five minutes later as Taupo kept up the pressure, a high ball was lobbed into the Rangipo goalmouth and was headed down by Vowden to Ellis, who scored with a first time shot.

Rangipo responded to these goals with some fierce rushes. T. Williams cleared up one situation cleverly and P. Turketo another by goal handling well.

Many of Taupo's attacks stemmed from the fine prompting of Cochrane at right half and a leader from this player to Ellis, resulted in the inside right scoring his second goal.

Six minutes later Christie completed his hat-trick with another well-taken goal, a fitting reward for his constructive play at inside left.

Left back, W. Harding, played a storming game but was injured in a tackle after 35 minutes' play in the second half and left the field. He was replaced by F. Williams.

The final nail in Rangipo's coffin was driven home by right half, Cochrane, who jinked his way through from his own half and scored with a fine 40 yard drive to make the final score 11-0.

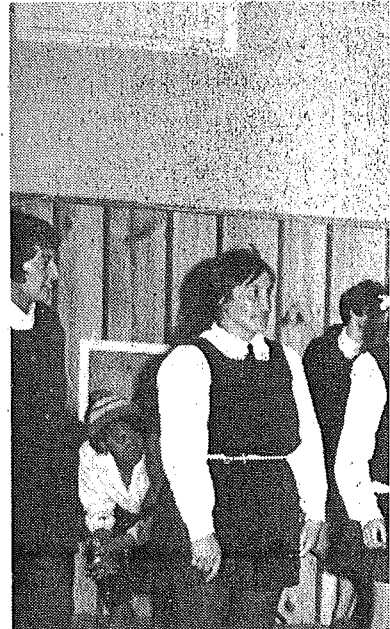

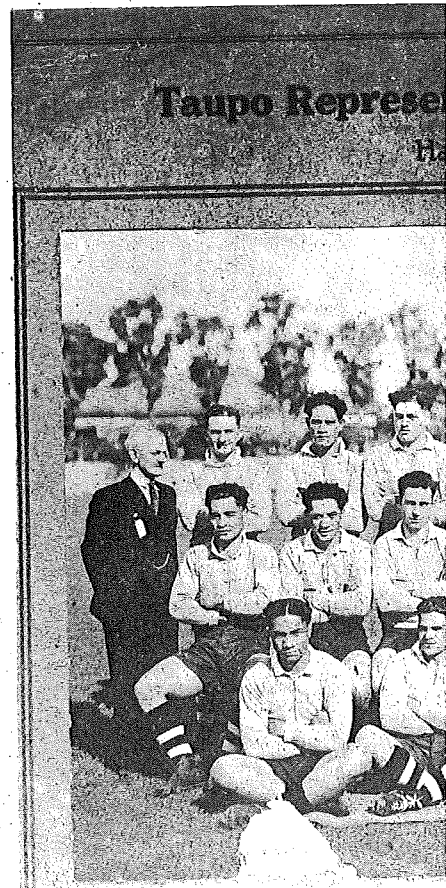

Judges for the competition will be Mr and Mrs Julian Dickon. Mr Dickon is a professional writer and his wife is a former art teacher from London.

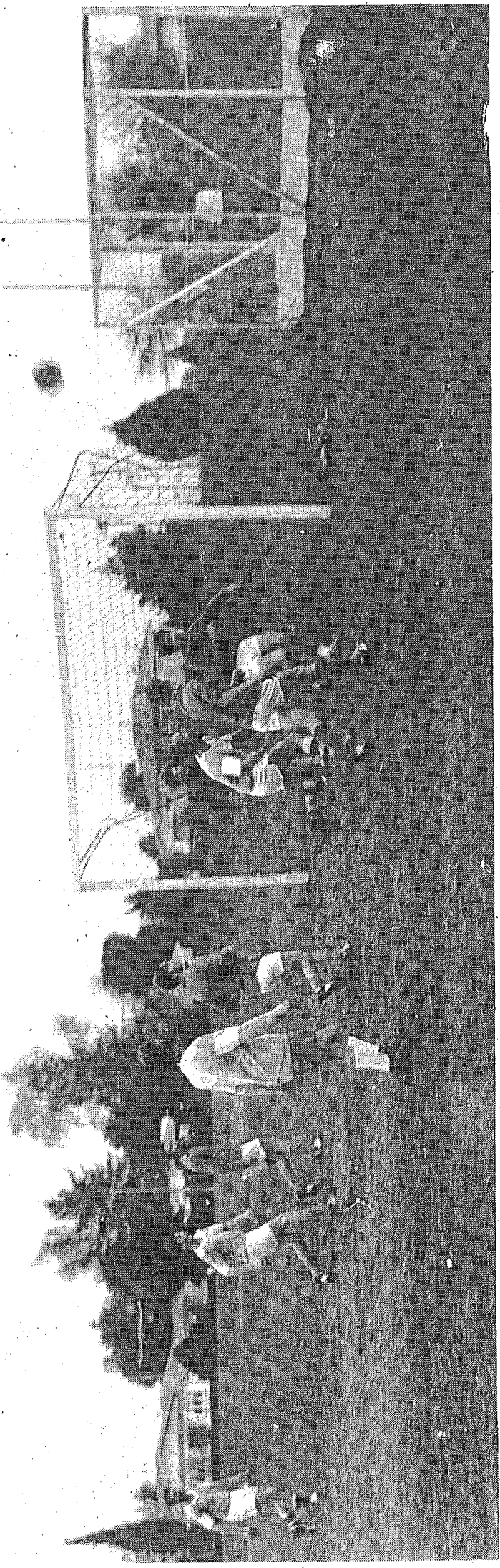

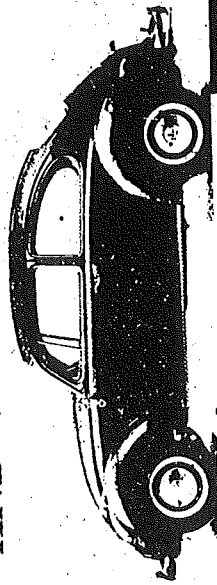

"Furthermore, opportunities will be provided for farmers to invest in this venture if it is their wish to do so," he said.

to Godfrey who netted his third goal.

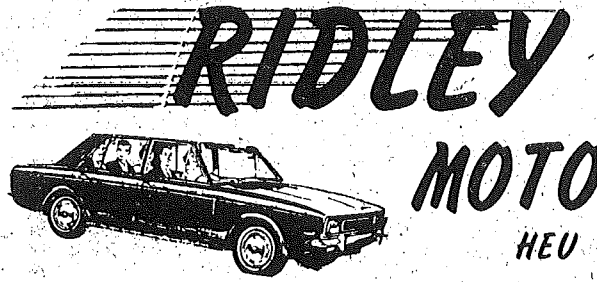
Taupo won the game and to date have played eight games, including six wins, one draw, one loss and has scored 36 goals with 11 against.

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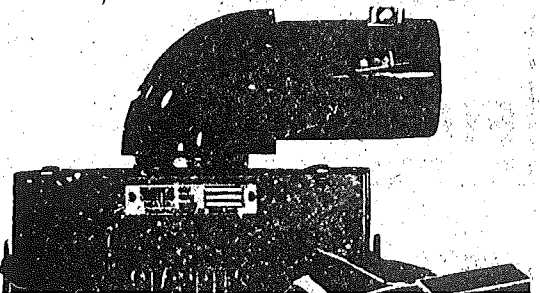
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Both teams found ball control difficult on a very wet and greasy pitch when Taupo met Rangipo in a soccer match at Turangi on Sunday.

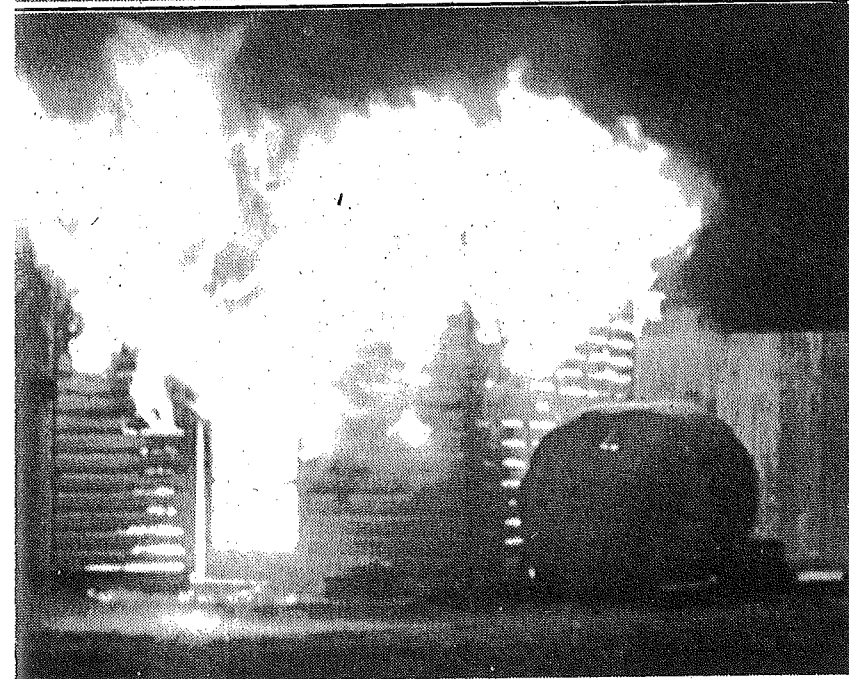

# Taupo won shield game

Hautu were a much-changed side as they held Taupo from any offensive moves. However, Christie scored from a penalty during the opening minutes, but Hautu forwards again went on the attack and kept the Taupo defence at full stretch.

## Protest lodged after soccer loss to Taupo

A protest has been lodged  
with the Central North Island  
League concerning the referee's

The linking of Elizabeth and

tribution would be assessed fol-

and grade to drain the area  
properly.

In order to avoid confusion  
the council decided that the  
new street created would  
be called MacDonell Street  
and the existing MacDonell Street  
be renamed Elizabeth Street.

Scorers for Taupo were Christie 4, R. Williams 3, Allmark 2, Vowden 1.

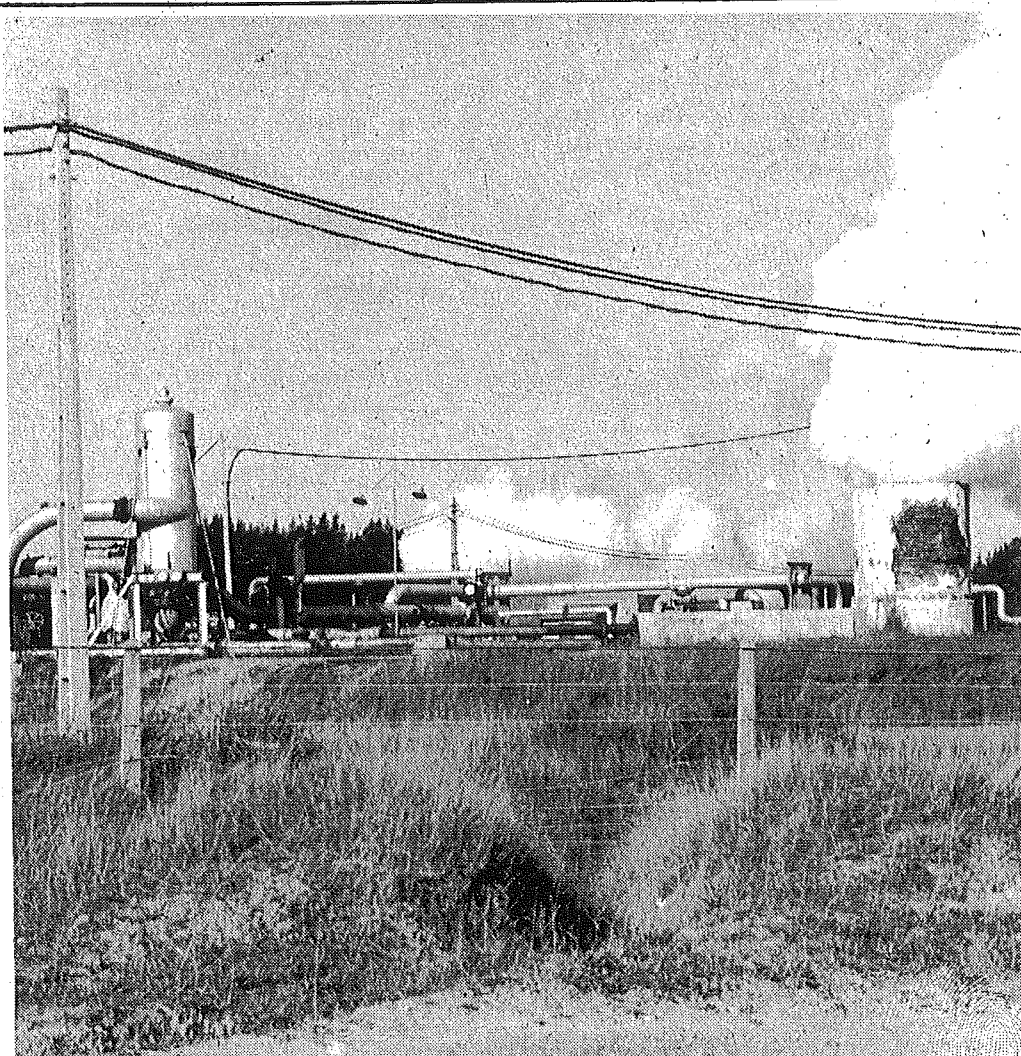
