there will be a prac-

the Pihanga Street
Reserve. Any boy

again be the trophy,
and if the soccer
club is supported by
the boys and their
parents, it is hoped
to eventually have a
Taupo representative
side to enter in the
North Island cham-
pionship.

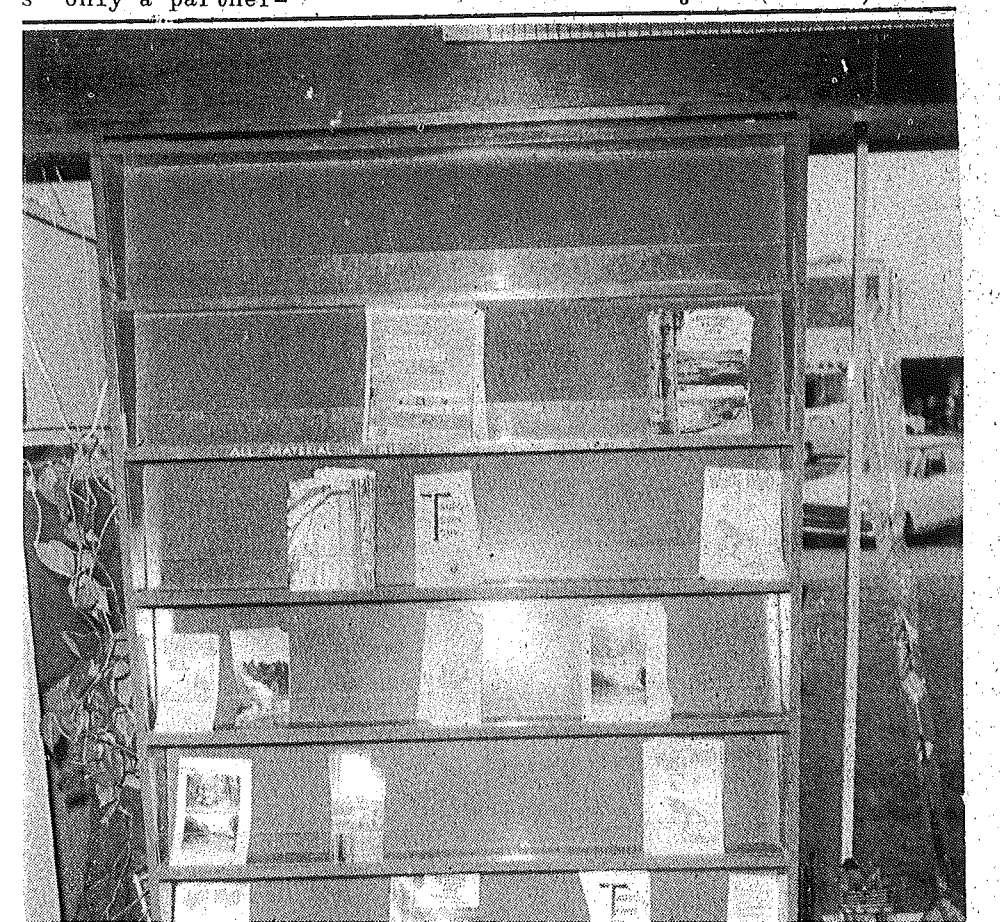

He also said that he knew of some classes still on a one to 40 basis.

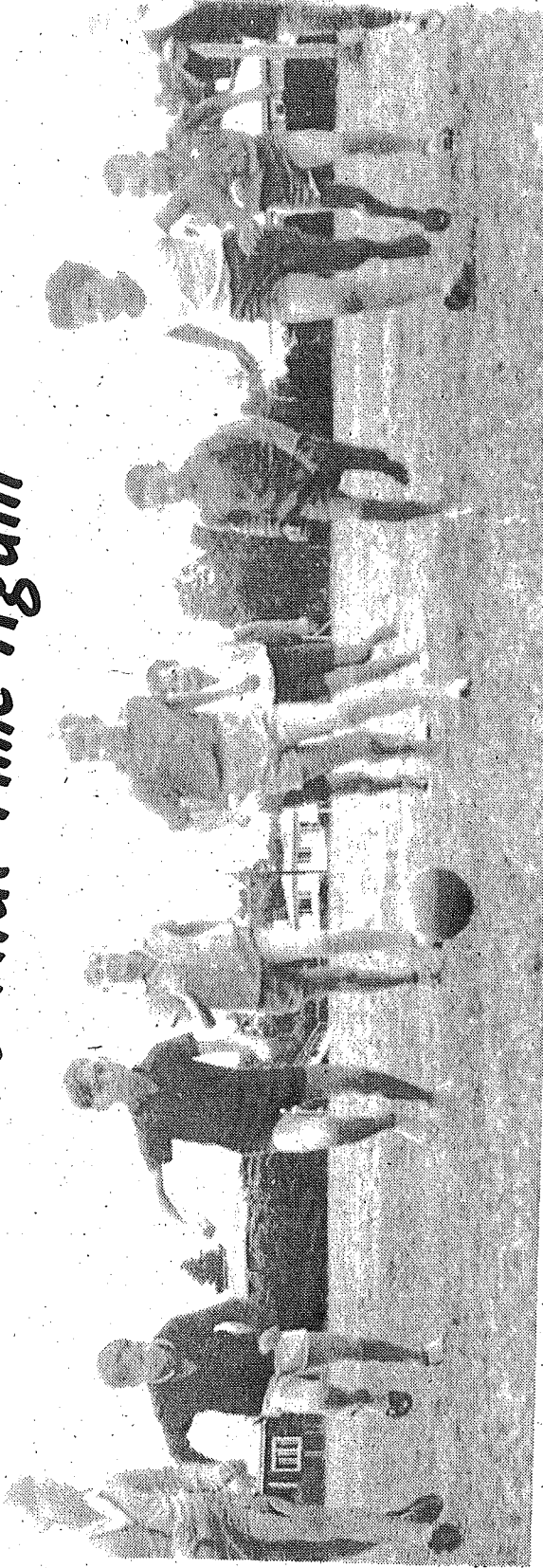

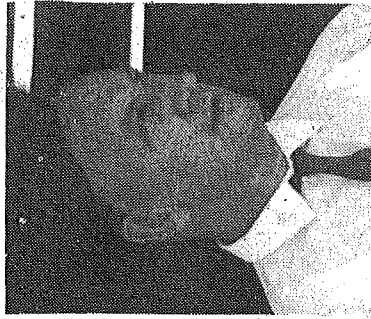
Search For Taupo Minerals

ROTARY ANNIVERSARY

Taupo Rotary Club will join with nearly 14,000 Rotary clubs in 147 countries in celebrating this week's 65th anniversary of the founding of the world-wide service organisation.

Taupo president, Mr K. G. Stewart, said the club's publicity officer, Mr D. E. Morgan, will address tonight's meeting on the anniversary.

Rotary was organised by Paul P. Harris, a Chicago lawyer from Vermont, on February 23, 1905. As a cure for loneliness in the big city, he proposed his idea for a club to three other men, a coal dealer, a mining engineer and a tailor. Because subsequent meetings were held in members' office in rotation, Harris suggested the name Rotary.

Today, there are more than 658,000 business and professional men around the world who wear the distinctive cog wheel emblem of Rotary International.

Play now sea-sawed back and forth, both teams setting up chances which neither forward line could finish off. Both sides hit the woodwork on several occasions, a shot from Ellis (Taupo) hitting the crossbar as the final whistle sounded. During the match, the Mangakino goalkeeper gave a competent display, handling safely and making many fine saves.

Taupo used the match in the nature of a pre-season trial and several players were substituted during the game; many new players being on view.

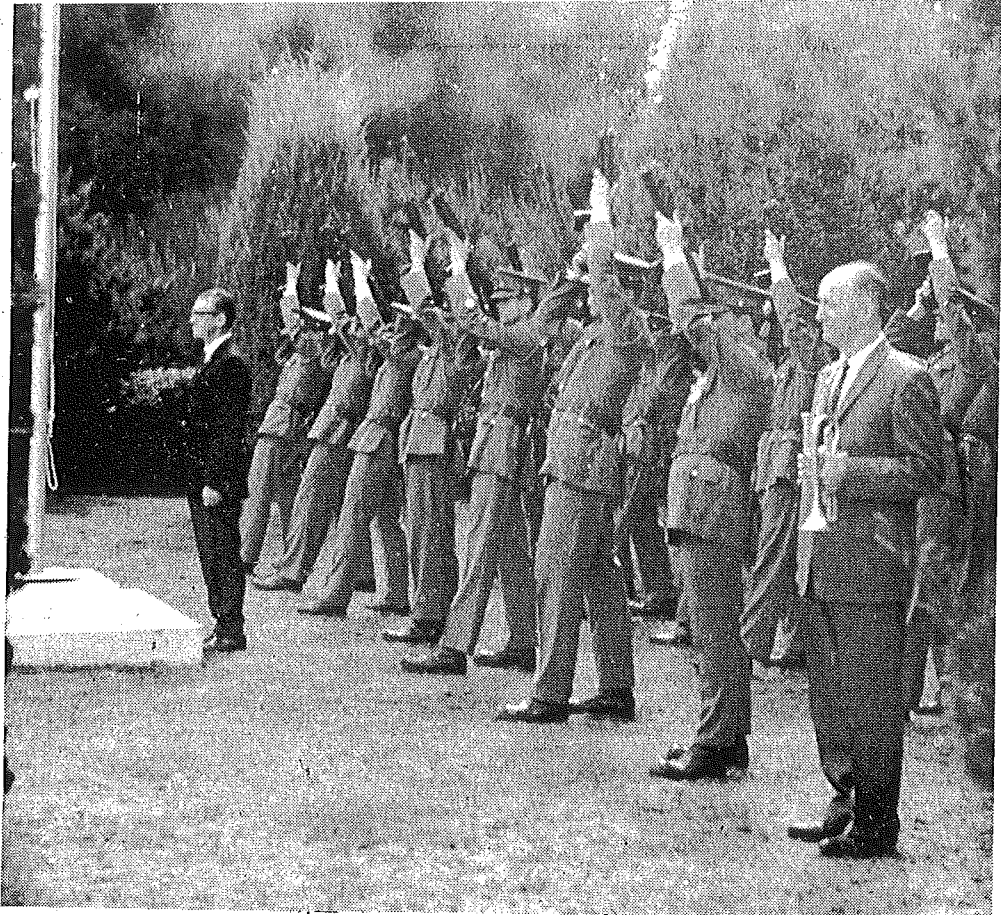
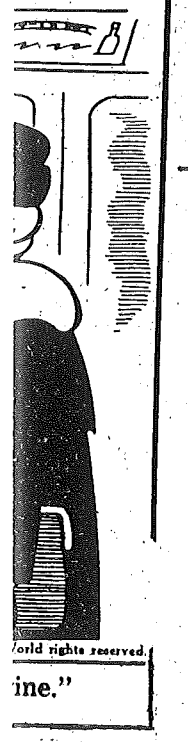

TT 19/3/70 TAUPO LOST PRE-SEASON SOCCER MATCH

The Taupo Soccer Club's appearance in the Cambridge pre-season knock-out tournament was short-lived, Hamilton eliminating them from the contest in the first round by a 5 goals to 1 win.

The local side was handicapped by being without the services of three experienced players, all suffering from training injuries, from the thirteen selected to represent the club.

The game opened at a fast pace, and although the seasoned Hamilton team combined better, Taupo matched them in the early exchanges.

With centre-half Kelsey playing coolly in defence, the locals fought strongly, if at times, spasmodically. Taupo scored the opening goal of the match through inside left Allmark, who sent in a beautifully judged "lob shot" over the Hamilton goalkeeper's head into the net from 18 yards.

This goal came in the 20th minute, but two minutes from half-time, Hamilton equalised. They attacked, down the right wing, a long ball was crossed to the outside left, and, unmarked, he shot in from ten yards.

The second half was only three minutes old when Kelsey saved a certain goal by kicking off the goal line after Taupo goalkeeper Austin had fumbled the ball from a right-wing cross.

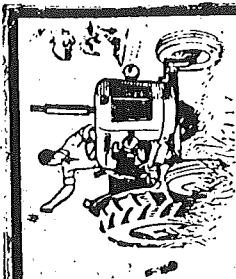
Following this narrow escape, Hamilton piled on the pressure and in a spell of 15 minutes crashed four more goals past the unfortunate Taupo 'keeper.

The under-strength Taupo team had no answer to this onslaught, although they fought back gallantly. Allmark sent a shot narrowly over the bar from a corner kick, and

three minutes from the end, goalkeeper Austin brought off a fine save from the Hamilton centre-forward's shot.

Although re-shuffling of the team and the inexperience of some players in unfamiliar positions contributed in some degree to Taupo's losing this game, it also showed the standard of opposition likely to be met this season in higher grade football.

For Taupo, Kelsey and Trengrove shone in defence, and Allmark worked tirelessly in an endeavour to get his makeshift forward line moving.

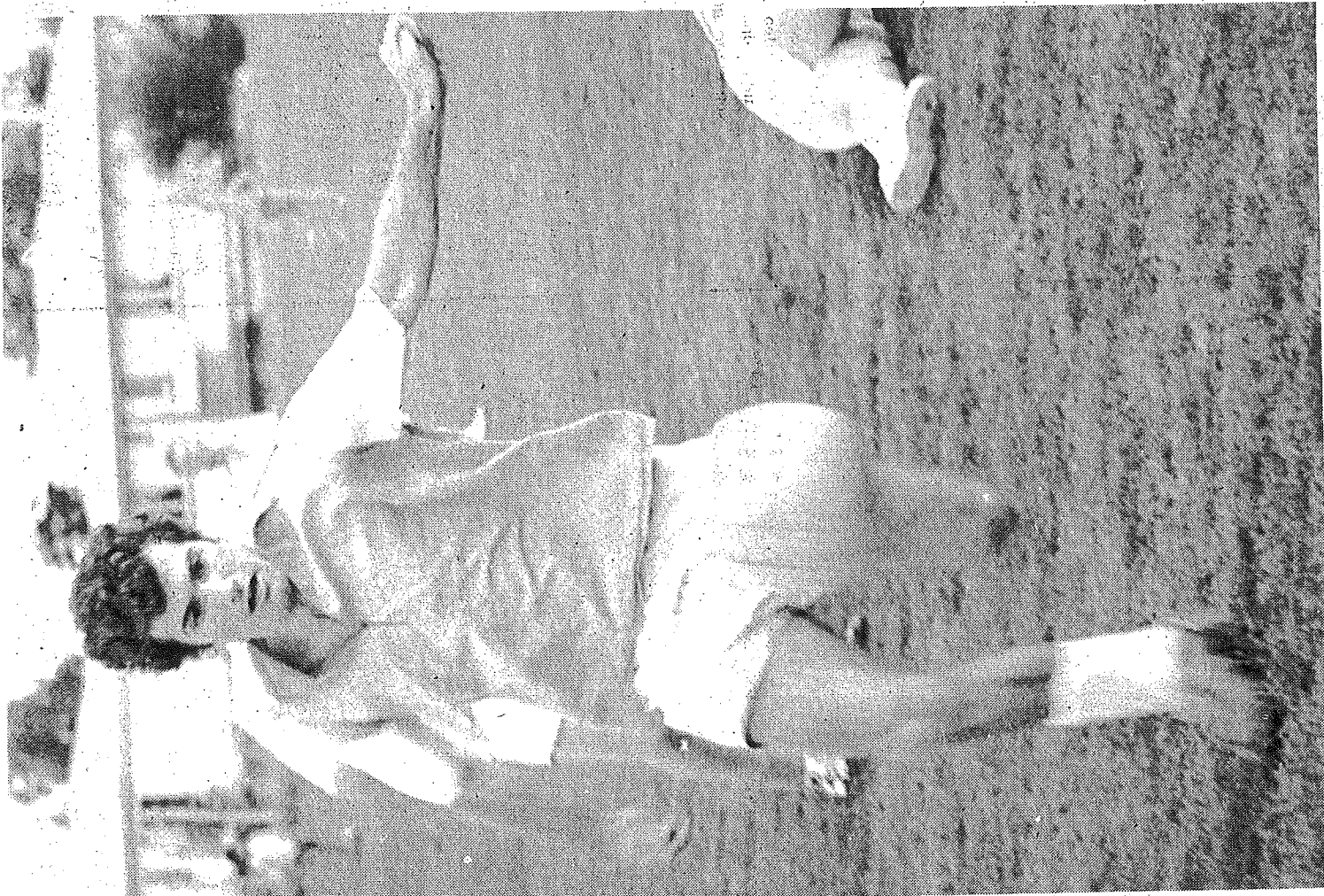

TEMPORARY SPORTS GROUND IS PLANNED

Topsoil at present stockpiled on the Taupo borough depot site adjacent to the A.C. baths is to be spread and the area grassed to provide a temporary sportsground.

The work on the new grounds is to be completed in readiness for the 1971 winter sports season.

The council's decision to level the ground and provide the facility was made after several applications for sports grounds were heard by the council's general purposes committee.

Applications had been received from both the Taupo Women's Hockey Association and Taupo Soccer Club for use of the Kaimanawa Reserve during the 1970 season.

The council decided to allocate the ground to the hockey

association and the soccer club have been advised to approach the Taupo Primary School with a view to using the school's football ground.

SOCCER CLUB DREW WITH ROTORUA

Taupo Soccer Club's opening game of the 1970 season was a closely contested draw with Rotorua Suburbs. The home side had the better of the opening exchanges, although the visitor's centre-forward opened the scoring with a well taken goal from sixteen yards, this being against the run of play.

For Taupo, Kelsey at sweeper centre-half played a fine game, scarcely putting a foot wrong. Allmark and Van Meir showed splendid ball control, and worked hard throughout. Young forward Williams made many

strong dashes, and on several occasions went very close to scoring. The game was well controlled throughout by referee Mr R. Milne of Rotorua.

Final score: Taupo 2, Rotorua Suburbs 2.

Though Taupo responded with a strong attack, and Williams shot just over the bar, a series of attacks by the visitors ended in their inside-right adding a second goal with another well placed shot. This was a result of hesitancy in the home defence. Then, just before half-time a corner was forced on the right. Van Meir crossed the ball well, and Williams lobbed the ball over the goal-keeper's head, only to see it hit the cross bar and bounce down on the goal-line. Allmark, running in strongly, headed the ball into the net between two defenders to notch Taupo's first goal.

The half-time score was: Taupo 1, Rotorua Suburbs 2.

Taupo's wingers Austin and Tapalaga were replaced at the beginning of this half by substitutes Maeson and Vouk, and the Taupo defence was reshuffled to contain the lively visitors' forwards. These moves took effect immediately, and the home side looked a much better combination, mounting many strong attacks, whilst containing the visitors' breakaways far better than in the first half. In the seventh minute of this half, Taupo drew level. Williams was fouled in the penalty area, and the referee had no hesitation in awarding a spot kick. Allmark coolly crashed the penalty shot into the corner of the net, giving the goalkeeper no chance. The home side now pressed hard to take the lead. Taupo forced three corners within a minute, but the desperate visitors' defence somehow scrambled the ball away to safety on each occasion. But, back came Taupo, and Allmark, dribbling in to the Rotorua penalty area, had a shot blocked but regained the ball from the rebound and netted. Taupo's joy was short lived, however, as he was adjudged to have handled the ball, and the goal was disallowed.

NEW DIRECTORY

Entries, alterations and advertisements for the Taupo section of the Bay of Plenty 1970 telephone directory are to close on June 5.

Members of the Taupo post office staff have already received more than 2000 alterations for the Taupo section since the last directory closed, and they expect at least several hundred more from the 3169 Taupo telephone subscribers.

According to Taupo's postmaster, Mr C. K. Say, it is the responsibility of the telephone subscriber who is entitled to a free listing and a free directory for each phone he subscribes to, to notify the post office if his present directory listing is incorrect.

Mr Say pointed out that this was in the subscriber's own interests as unless the incorrect

listing is changed, it will be reprinted in this year's directory, which is expected to be distributed near the end of this year.

The exact date will depend upon the printing dates of New Zealand's 18 other regional directories.

When the post office receives an alteration or a new number is listed, it undergoes an extremely thorough cross-reference check.

At Taupo, it is checked through three processes before being included in the list to be sent to Wellington for printing, where it is checked at least twice more.

More than 4000 directories will be distributed in Taupo and each, with more than 3000 Taupo listings, will represent several month's work by the Taupo post office staff.

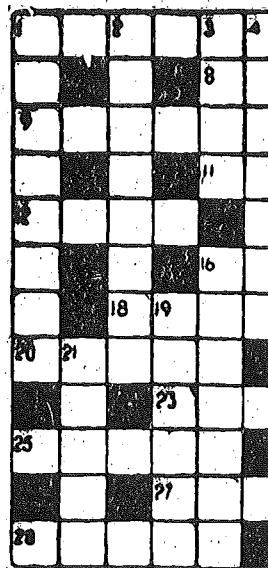

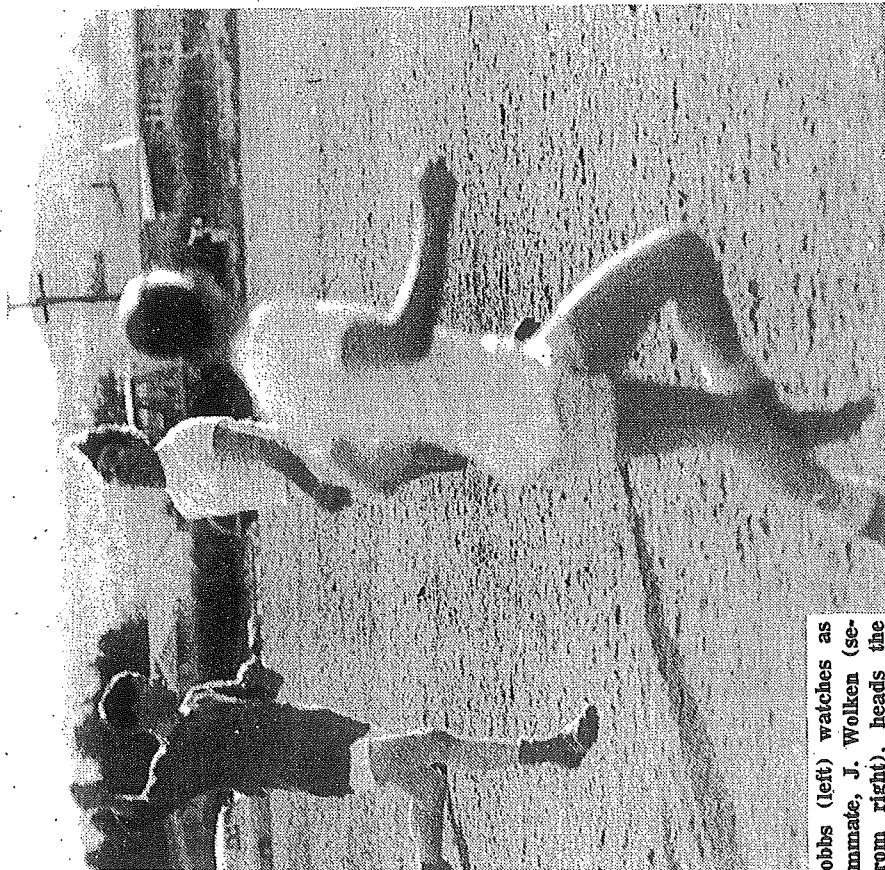

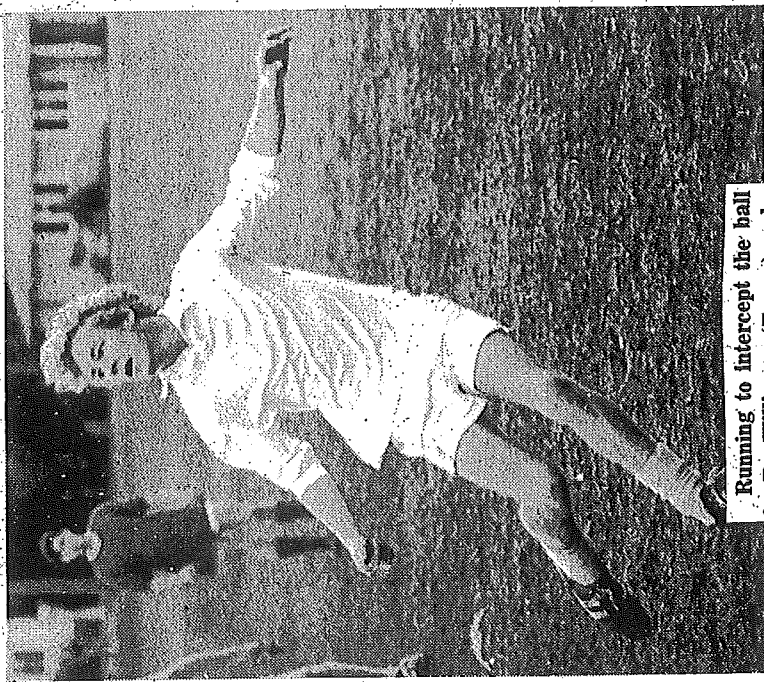

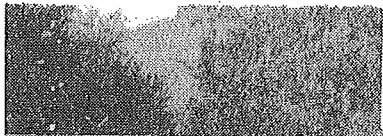

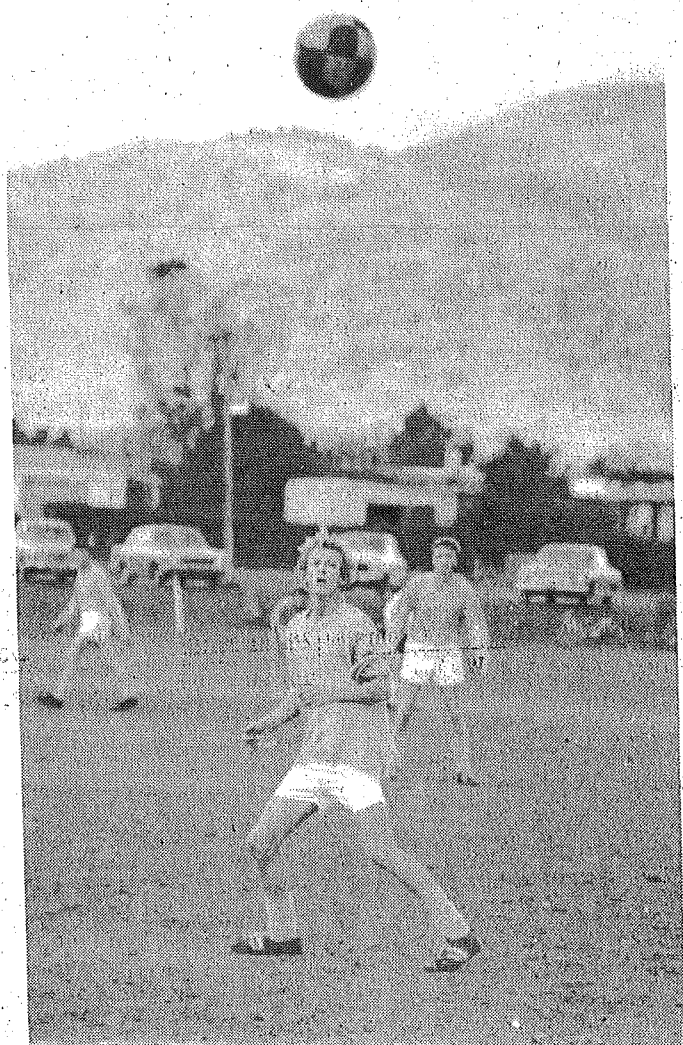

has followed Auckland bakers in putting up the price of cakes and buns, but this is the first time it has raised costs in about three years.

A spokesman for Savery's Bakery put the increase down to rising costs for ingredients. Sugar had gone up twice in a month, and everything else was dearer too.

Tourist officials to visit

A school on wheels for members of the Tourist and Publicity Department will be visiting Wairakei on Friday, October 2.

The school is conducted regularly to enable staff of the department's bureaux to familiarise themselves and update their knowledge of tourist resorts, sightseeing facilities and hotel and motel accommodation.

Personnel from bureaux in Auckland, Rotorua, Wellington, Christchurch, Dunedin, Invercargill and Queenstown are included in the group.

The group will arrive at the Wairakei Hotel on Friday, October 2, and depart the following day.

The firm could not absorb this and had had to raise its prices, the spokesman said. Doughnuts are up by about 8c a dozen, small cakes cost 3c a dozen more, and large buns have gone up 1c each.

A Taupo cake shop which is supplied by the bakery has put up its prices accordingly. Small cakes now cost the public 6c instead of 5c each and large cakes, mostly supplied by Auckland bakeries, are up in price by about 5c a pound.

With sliced, wrapped bread costing a cent a loaf more from the beginning of this week, some sandwiches, depending on the filling, are now 8c instead of 7c.

All sliced and wrapped bread and some other bakery products have gone up in price in Auckland, where bakers are now paying a 20 per cent award wage increase for bakery tradesmen. This

came into effect about two weeks ago.

Taupo bakers are not heavily affected by the award increase as they all own small firms. Most bakeries are staffed only by the owner with some part-time help.

Apart from Savery's Bakery, other bakers approached by the Taupo Times said none of their products had gone up in price recently. But they warned that this would probably come.

"We are trying to absorb increased costs, and the wage rise, ourselves, but this cannot last much longer," said one baker.

"We have not decided to increase our prices yet, but our expenses are rising something terrific."

Tariff charges for electricity for Taupo consumers are not likely to be raised for a considerable time according to the municipality's electricity department's officer, Mr K. G. Stewart.

not been any changes considered recently and no alterations to tariff charges were likely to be made in the immediate future.

Recently the King Country Electric Power Board decided to reduce its tariffs.

Mr Stewart said that the tariff for Taupo had not been reviewed since 1967 and would not be reviewed again until it was known at what price the electricity supply would be made available from the State.

The next bulk supply tariff from the State is not due to take effect until March, 1972.

The department's own generator at Hinemaiaia was now generating about 30 per cent of the total amount of electricity consumed in Taupo and this percentage would continue to decrease as the total consumption increased.
