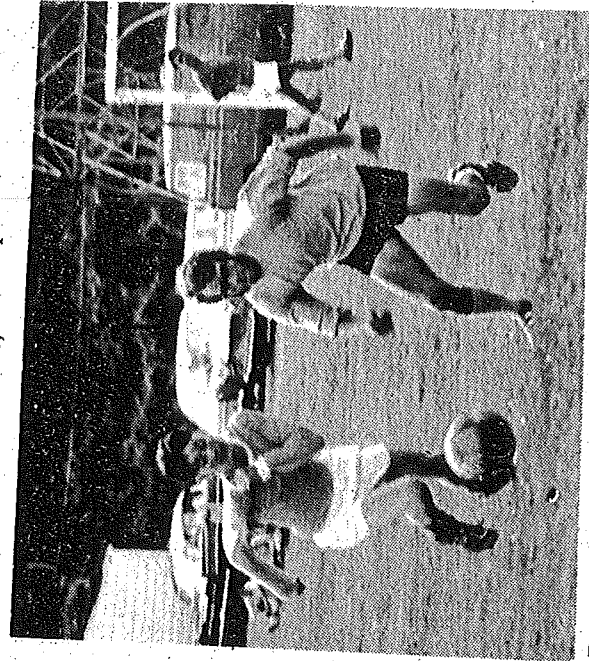

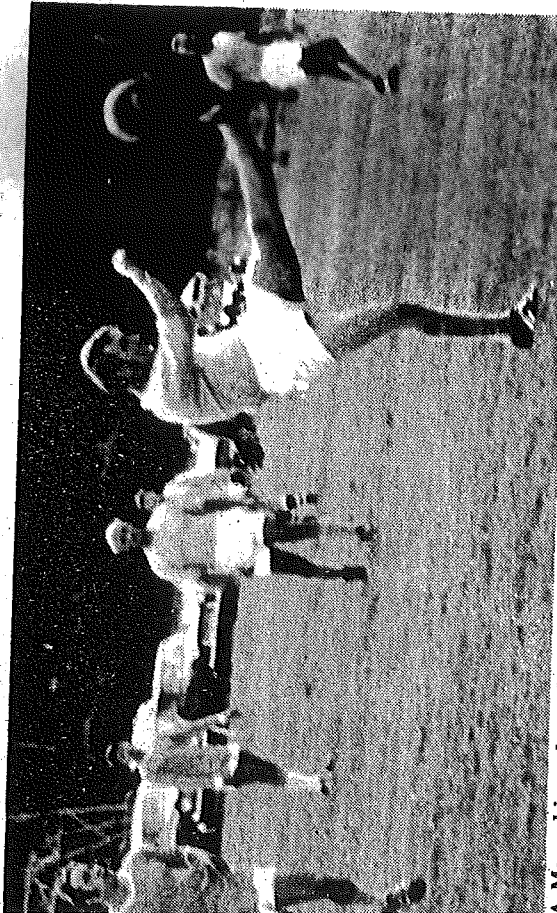

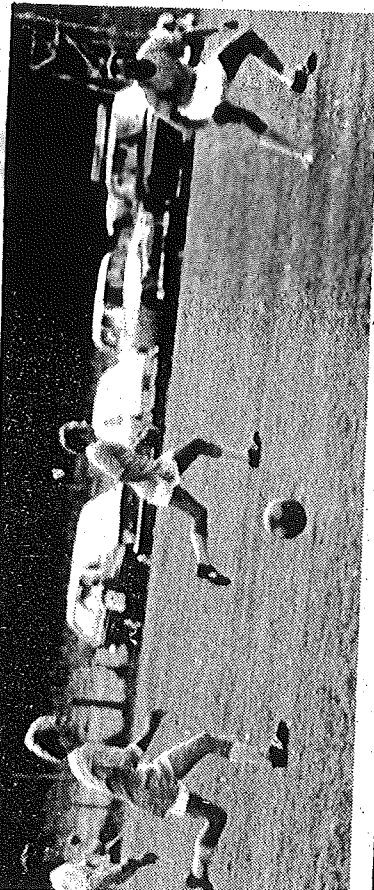

Goal scorers for Taupo were B. Hobbs and J. Wolken.

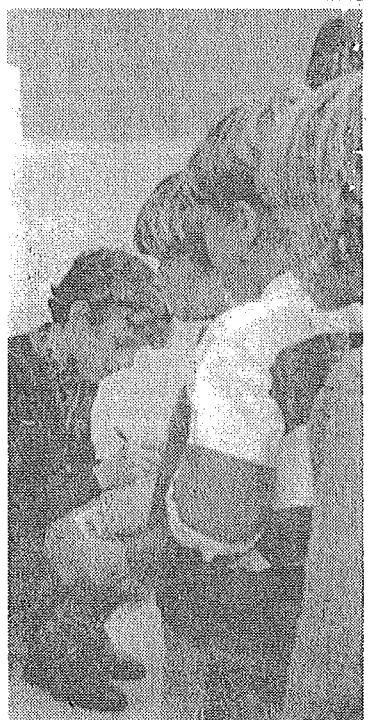

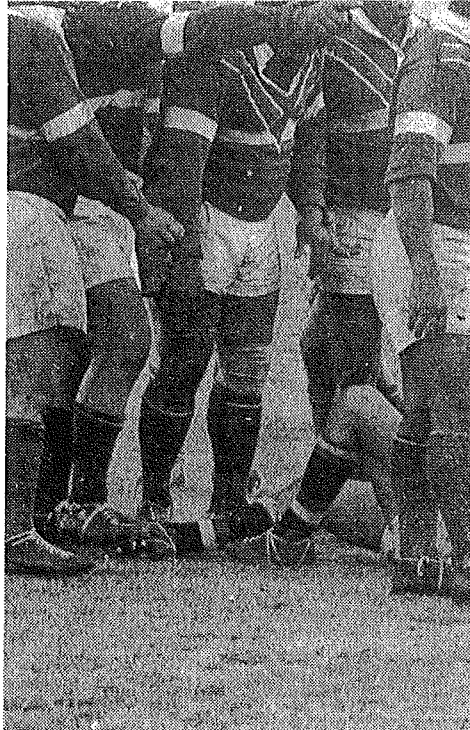
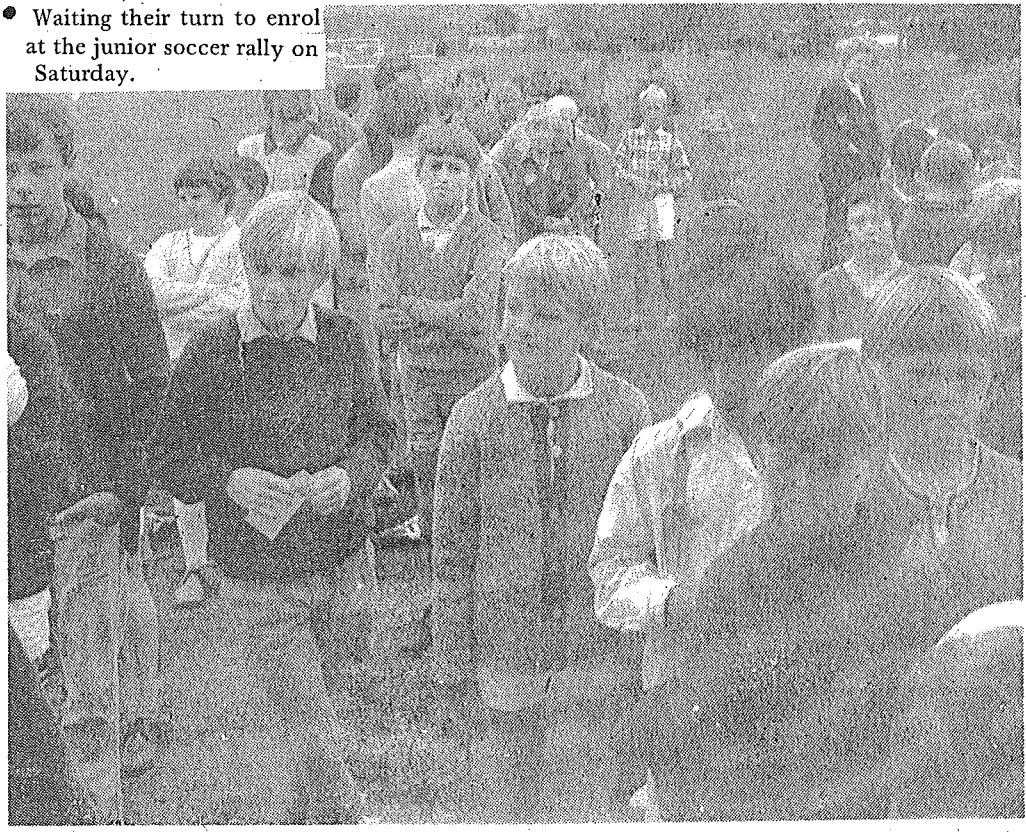
## JUNIOR RALLY

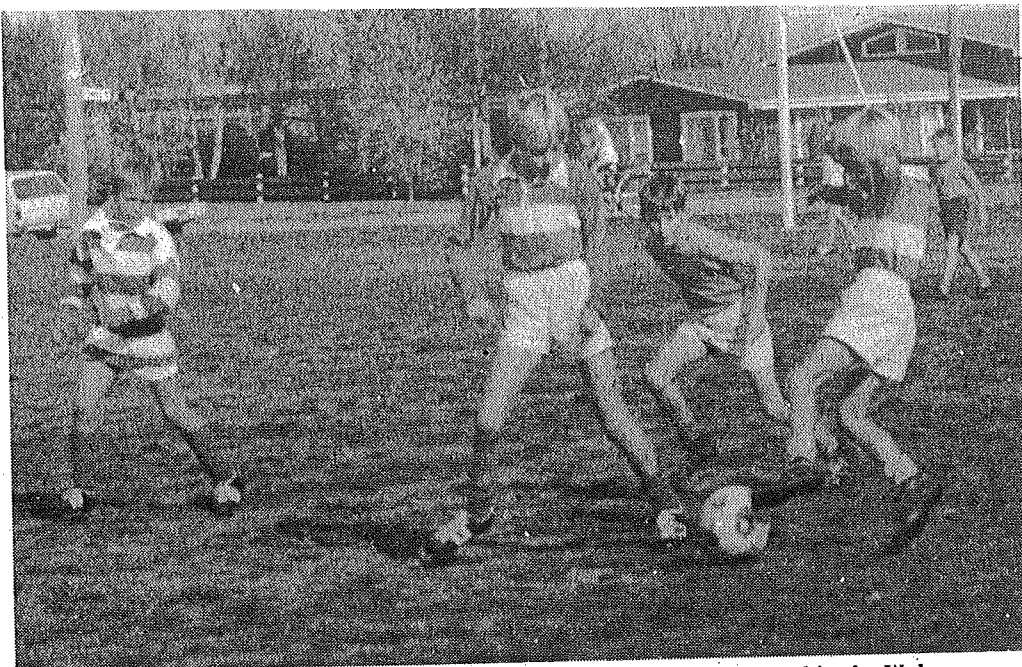

**Tracking opossums**

Developmental work by the ecology division and the physics and engineering laboratory of the Department of Scientific and Industrial Research has enabled biologists to track the movements of opossums carrying miniature radio transmitters, states the Department's annual report to the House of Representatives.

Opossums are easily trapped and marked, but are difficult to observe at night in dense lowland forest at the ecology division's field station in the Orongorongo Valley, Wellington, where movements and feeding habits of the opossum are being studied.

The onset and cessation of nightly activity and the trees used for nesting and feeding, are being recorded by radio telemetry through the year.

The life history of the opossum needs to be known as a basis for devising control operations.

All of these conditions were apparent at the beginning of the season and despite requests for attention they still remain in a poor state.

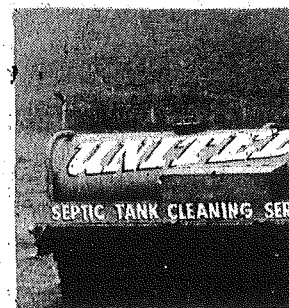
All visiting teams have commented adversely on the state of the dressing rooms.

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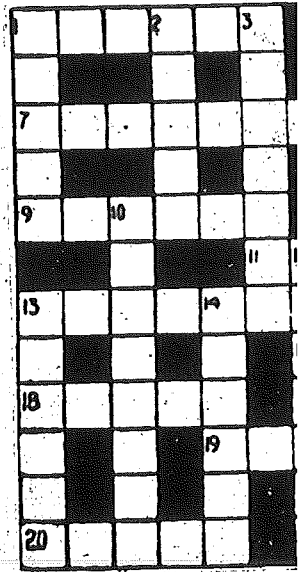

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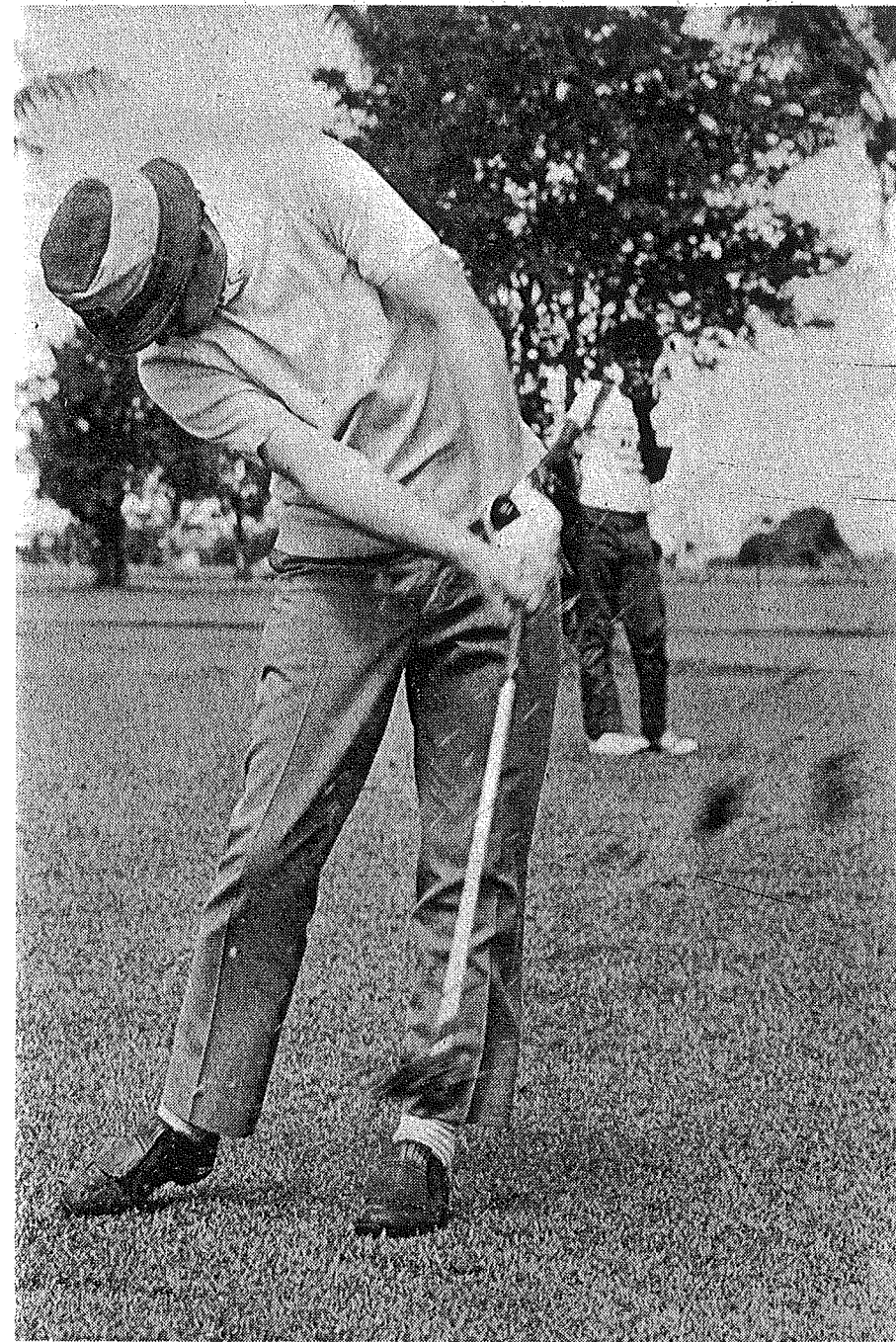
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# EARLY GOAL, BUT STRUGGLE TO WIN

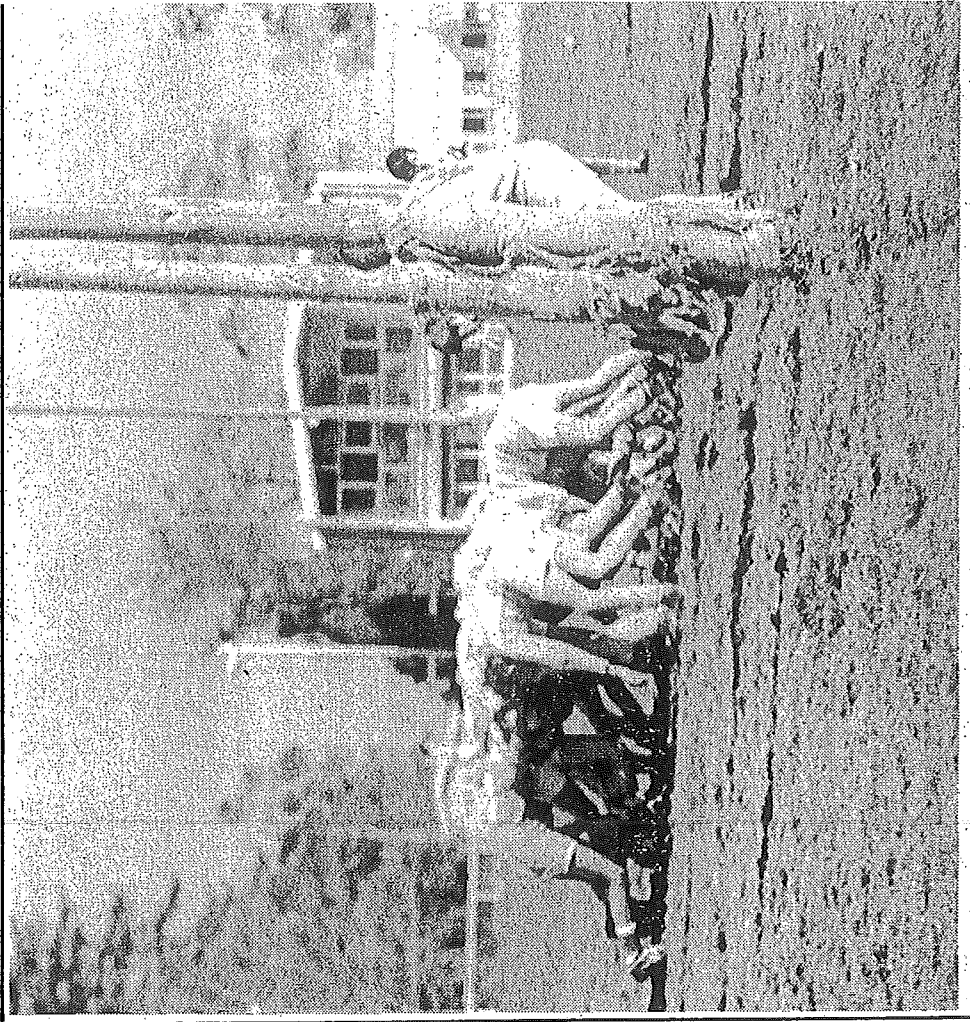

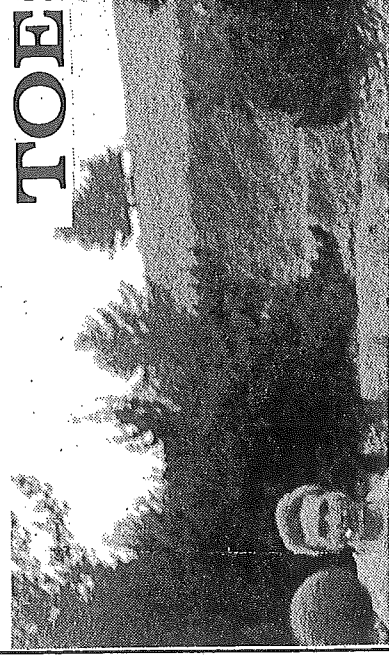
