# The spirit of the game of football

Football is more than a simple game. It is an emotional experience.

The mechanics of play amount to the movement of a ball, about the size of a man's head, between two targets set some distance apart.

But, during the course of just one game, the whole range of human emotions, from the depths of despair to utter joy, can be touched in the hearts of those who play, or watch.

Somewhere in these emotions lies the key to the "Spirit of the Game", a term often mentioned but seldom defined.

Merely to present a series of written rules or laws, without considering the spirit in which they are intended to be applied, would be a grave omission.

Few major alterations to the original laws have been found necessary, which em-

demonstrate individual skills without undue interference from opponents.

Physical size is not an essential requirement for success. A small player can contribute as much by quick reactions and great manoeuvrability as one whose assets include height and strength.

Many players of small physique have achieved worldwide fame by demonstrating their exciting skills.

• Secondly, much stress is laid on the safety of players in normal match play.

In specifying the size of the playing area, components used and equipment of players, care is taken to eliminate anything which may prove dangerous.

• Thirdly, the laws are specific on punishments for infringements and misconduct.

It is clearly implied that the game is to be played within a code of conduct based on accepted principles of mutual respect between people from all walks of life.

Only by observing these principles can the game be played with maximum enjoyment.

• Summarising then, the main features of the "Spirit of the Game" are simply **EQUALITY, SAFETY AND ENJOYMENT.**

From time to time the International Football Association Board receive suggestions for improving the game and alterations to the laws. Recently the board made the following statement which needs no further comment:

"It is the belief of the board that the spirit in which the game is played is of paramount importance and that changes in the laws to improve the game as a spectacle are of little value if 'fair play' is not universally observed."

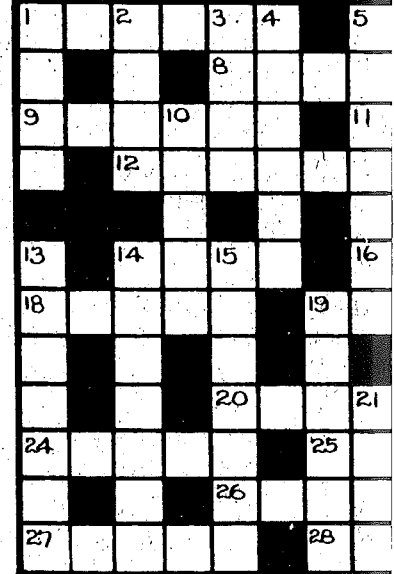

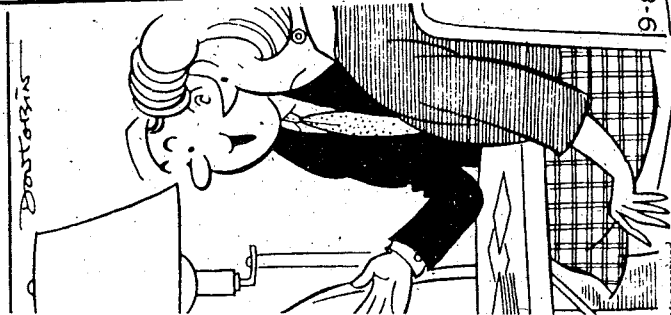

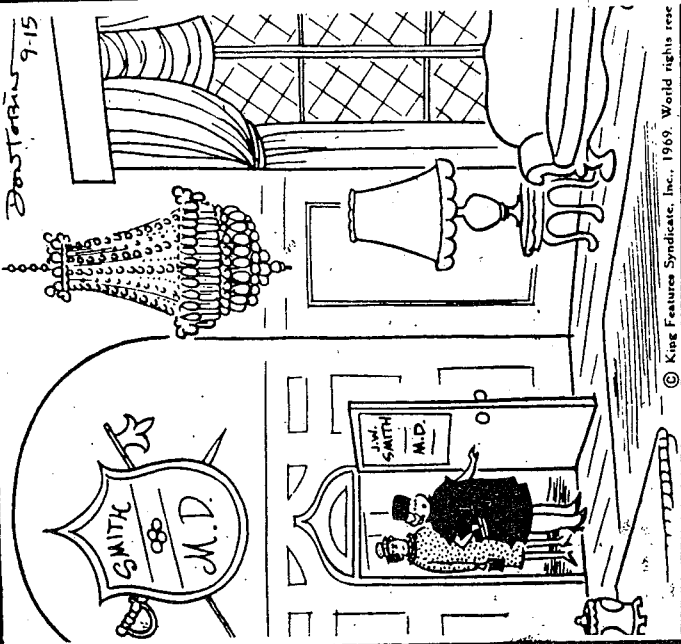

Many times the ball hit the uprights and crossbar but only four more goals were added.

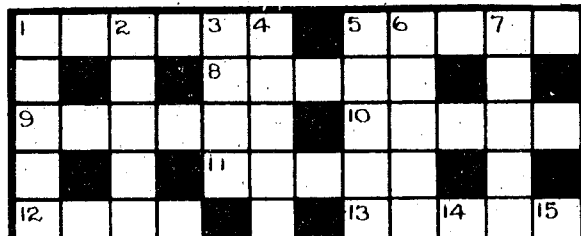

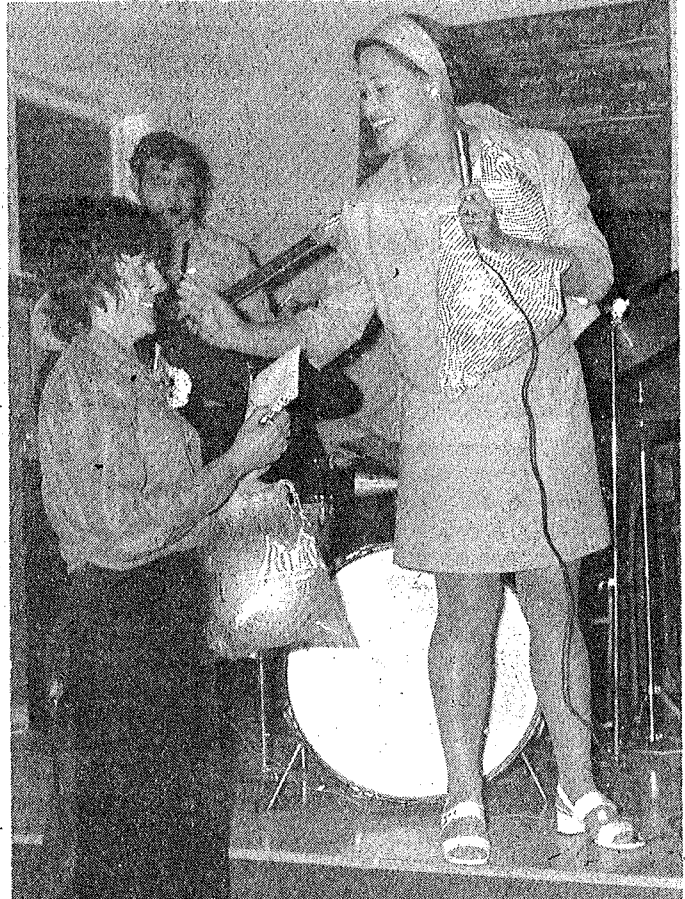

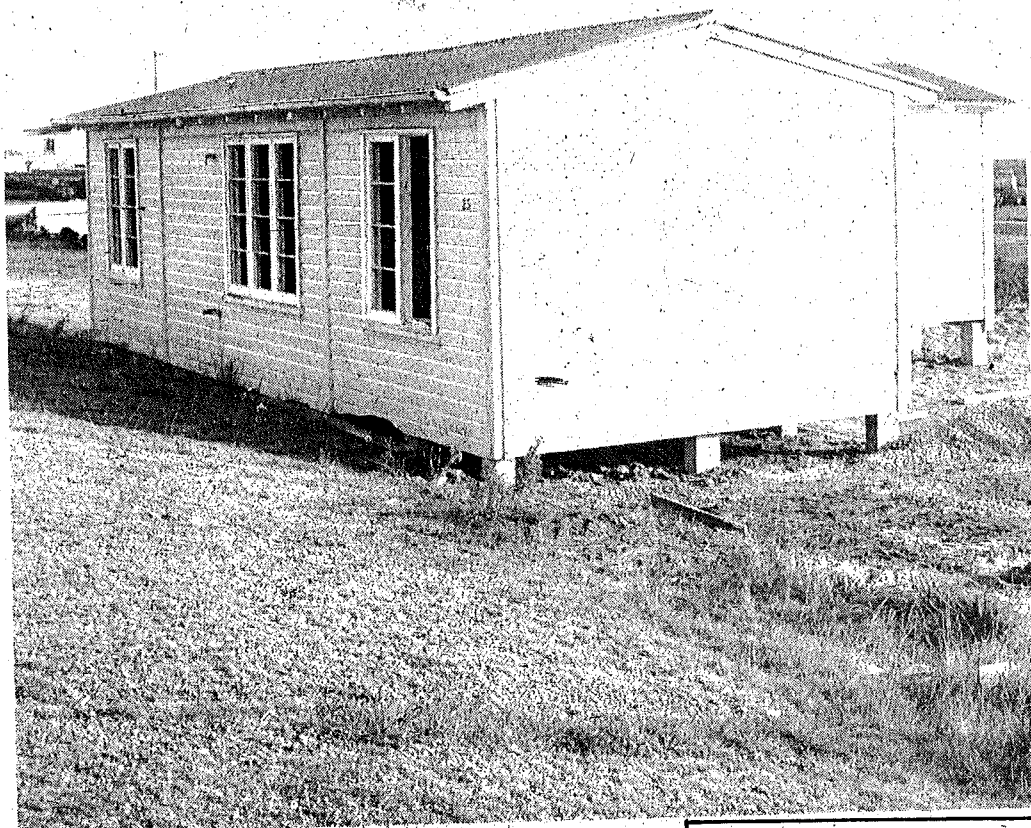

The place at which the ball is to be thrown in is:

(a) When the ball is kicked out from a penalty kick or from behind the kicker's 25 yard line, at the place where the ball went into touch.  
(b) When the ball is kicked out on the full from outside the kicker's 25 area opposite the place from where the ball went into touch if that place is nearer the kicker's goal line. - This applies to all kicks (except the penalty kick) and includes the "fly" kick and the free kick (mark).

(c) On all other occasions the ball is in touch (ball bounces out, or ball hits a player or the referee before it goes out, or a player with the ball runs or is pushed out) at the place where the ball went into touch.

If the ball goes out on the full from the kick off at halfway or from the 25 yard drop out, the touch judge should give a "wash out" signal to the referee.

The touch judges' duties include the touch-in-goal line, as well as the touch line. The corner posts and the touch-in-goal lines are in touch-in-goal. When the ball goes into touch-in-goal, or a player carrying it goes into touch-in-goal or hits the corner post, the touch judge should give the "wash out" signal.

When the kick at goal is being taken the touch judge must:

- (a) Stand immediately behind this post so that he can look straight up it.
- (b) Raise his flag if the ball goes over the cross bar.
- (c) Raise his flag if the ball goes over the cross bar even though it hits a defender on the way.
- (d) Don't raise his flag if the ball goes over the top of the upright.

The referee is the sole judge of fact and law, and as stated at the outset of this discussion he may overrule a touch judge's decision. The touch judge is there to assist the referee.

The touch judge's job is a very important one, especially with the kick into touch law. The work of the touch judge is greatly appreciated by the referee and a confident and accurate display by the touch judge will earn the referees' gratitude and co-operation.

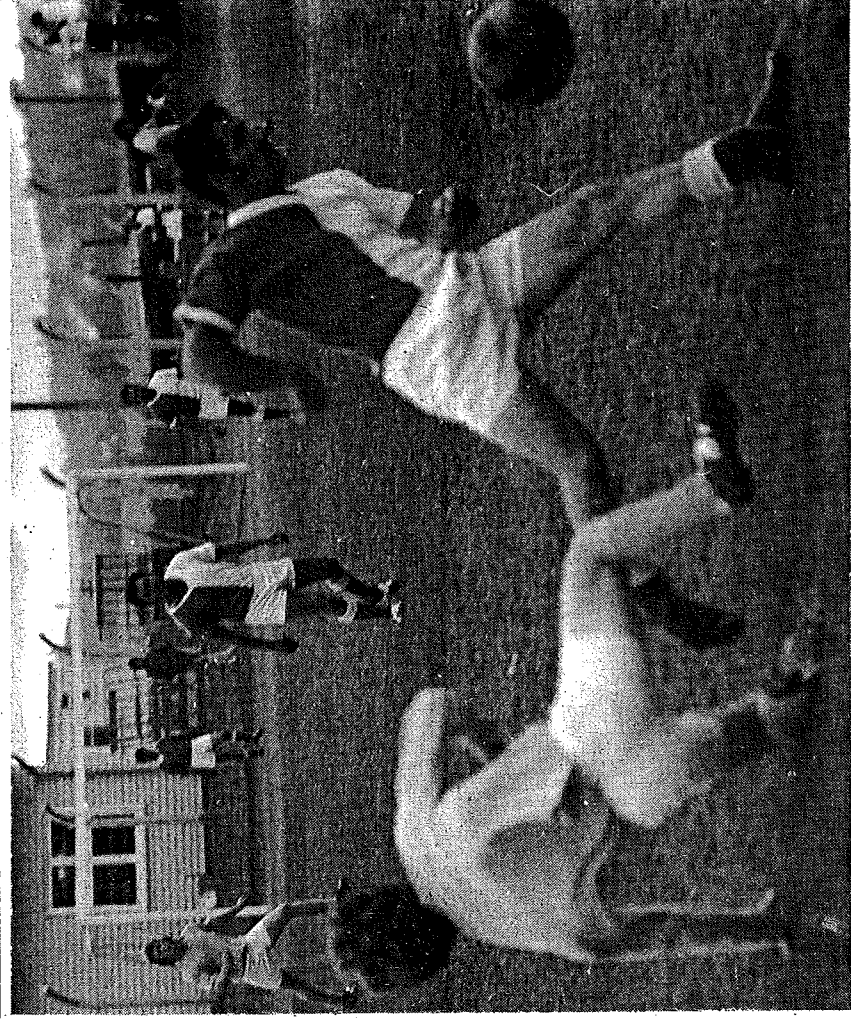
