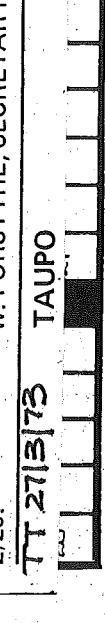

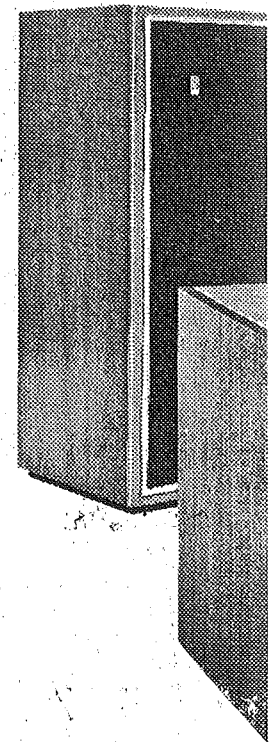

SOCCER TEAM SHOWS SKILL AND COHESION

Following the shock 4-4 draw last week against Rangipo, the Taupo Soccer Club's senior XI showed much more skill and cohesion in defeating Turangi B at Taupo on Sunday by 8 goals to 1.

Taupo's passing and running was obviously improved on last week's poor showing and they quickly rattled up the goals.

After only seven minutes a Turangi defender handled the ball inside the penalty area and from the spot B. Ruck made no mistake.

Only three minutes later A. Mansfield found a gap in the Turangi defence and scored with a low angled shot from close range.

Turangi were then unlucky not to score, also from the penalty spot after an infringement, when the ball was badly placed, for goal keeper L. Taylor to make an easy save.

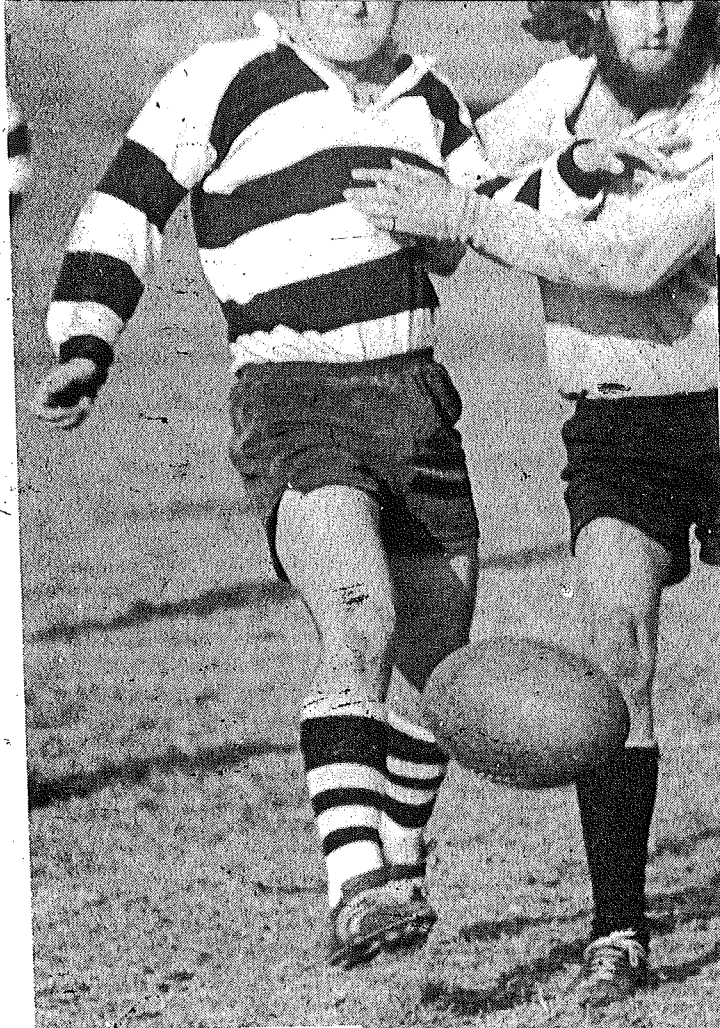

Taupo came back into the game within minutes after another foul inside the Turangi penalty area and again R. Norman made no mistake from 10 yards out.

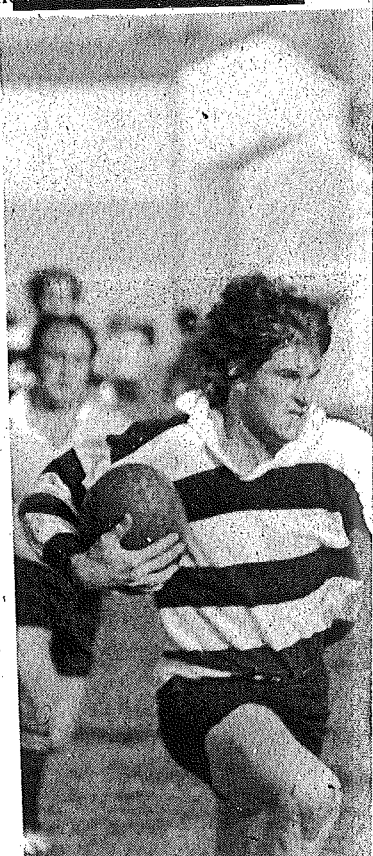

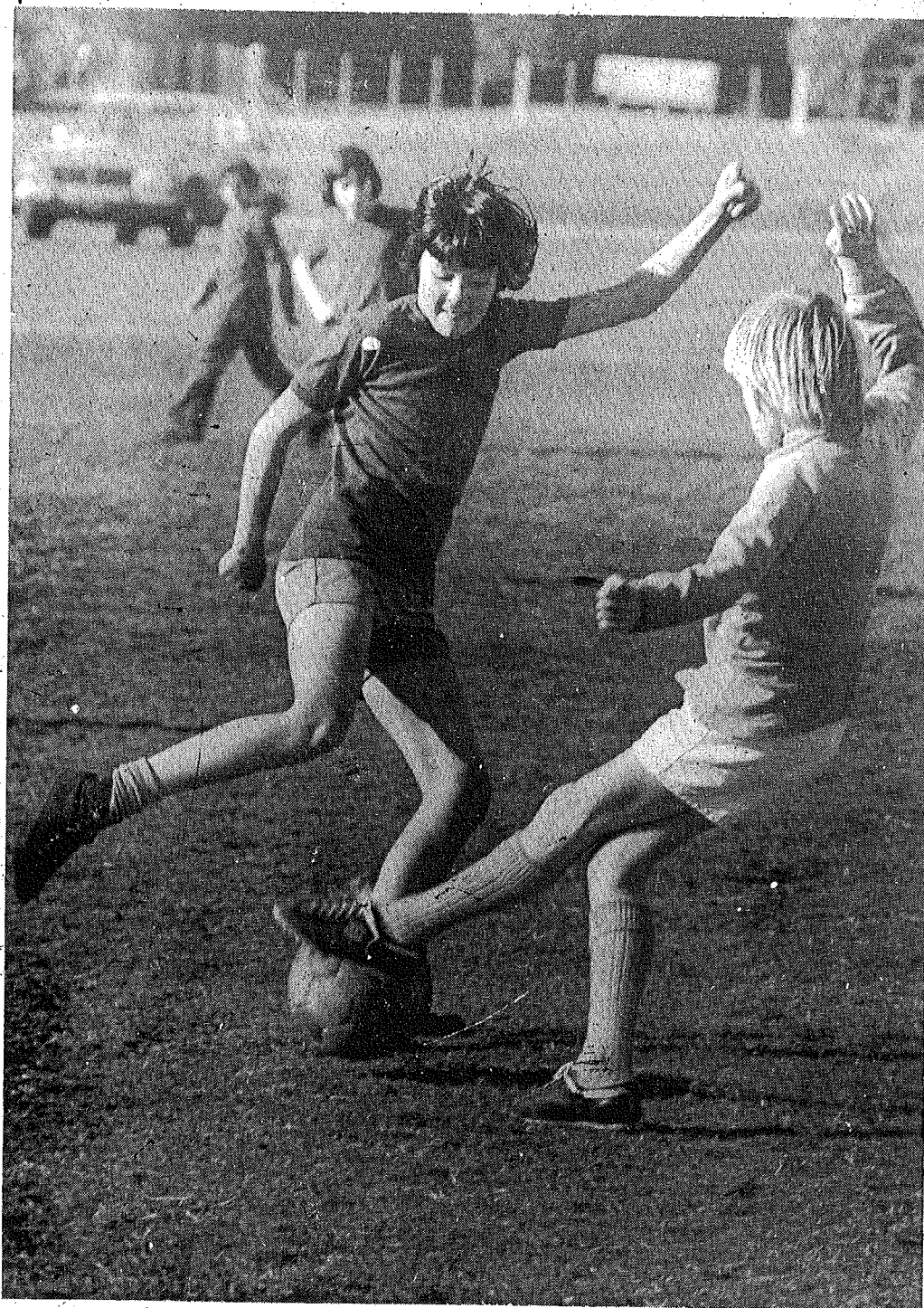

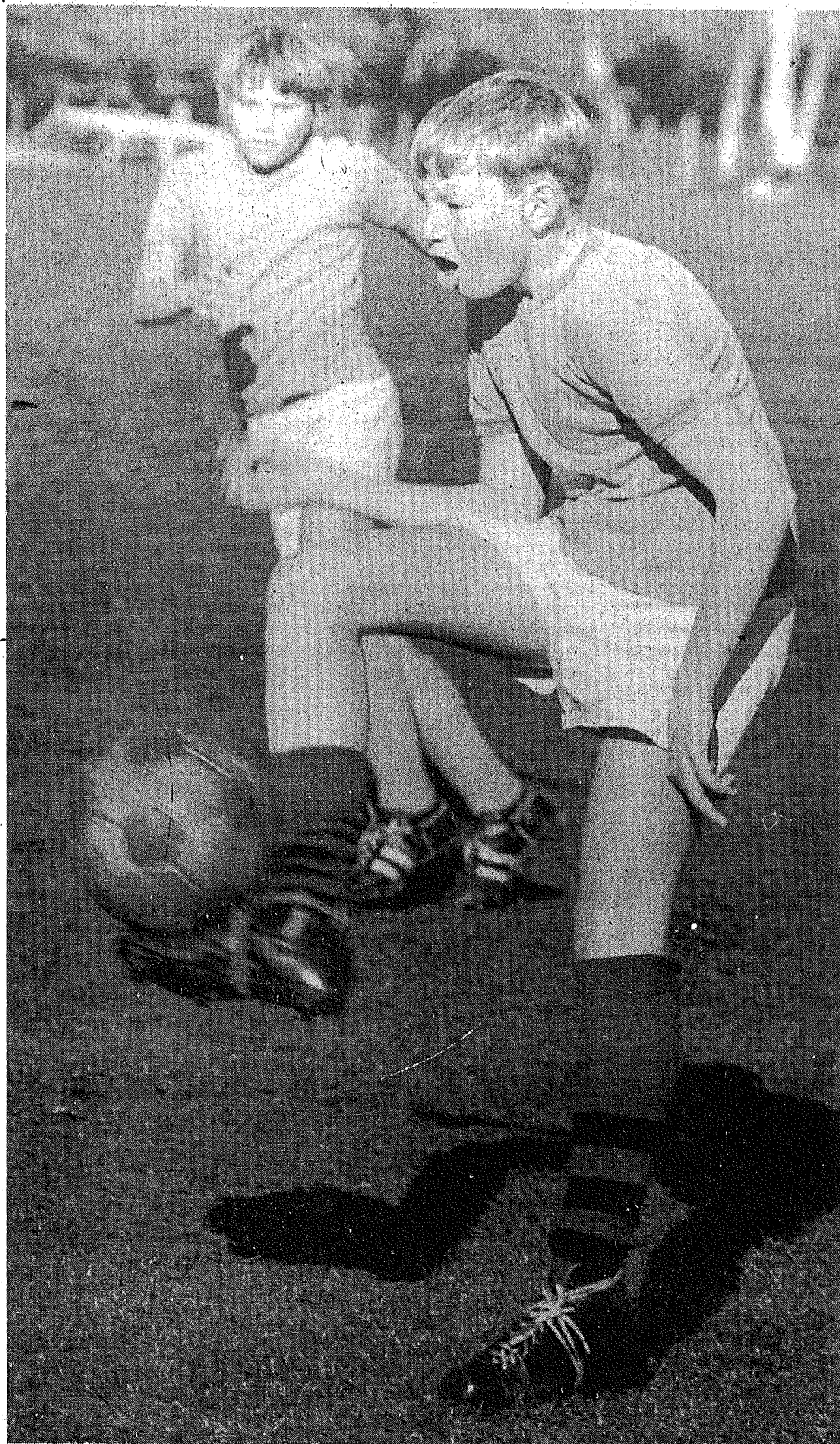

Rangipo replied seven minutes later following a determined break up the middle of the field which split the Taupo defence.

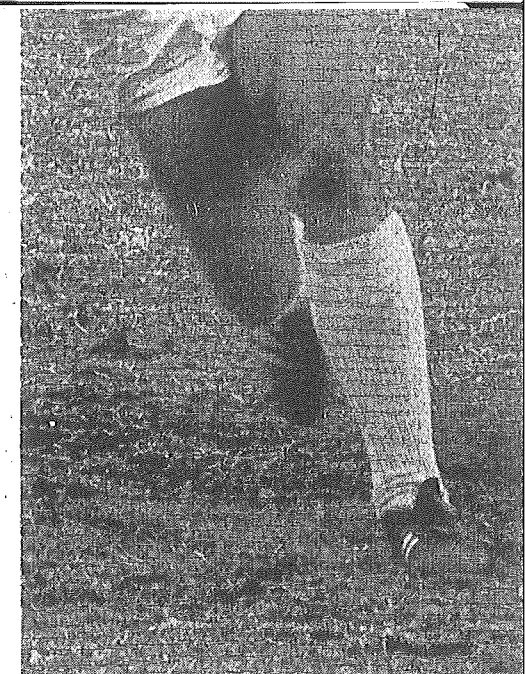
The second half saw an even worse display by the Taupo side than at the start. Taupo managed to monopolise possession of the ball but the goals wouldn't come.

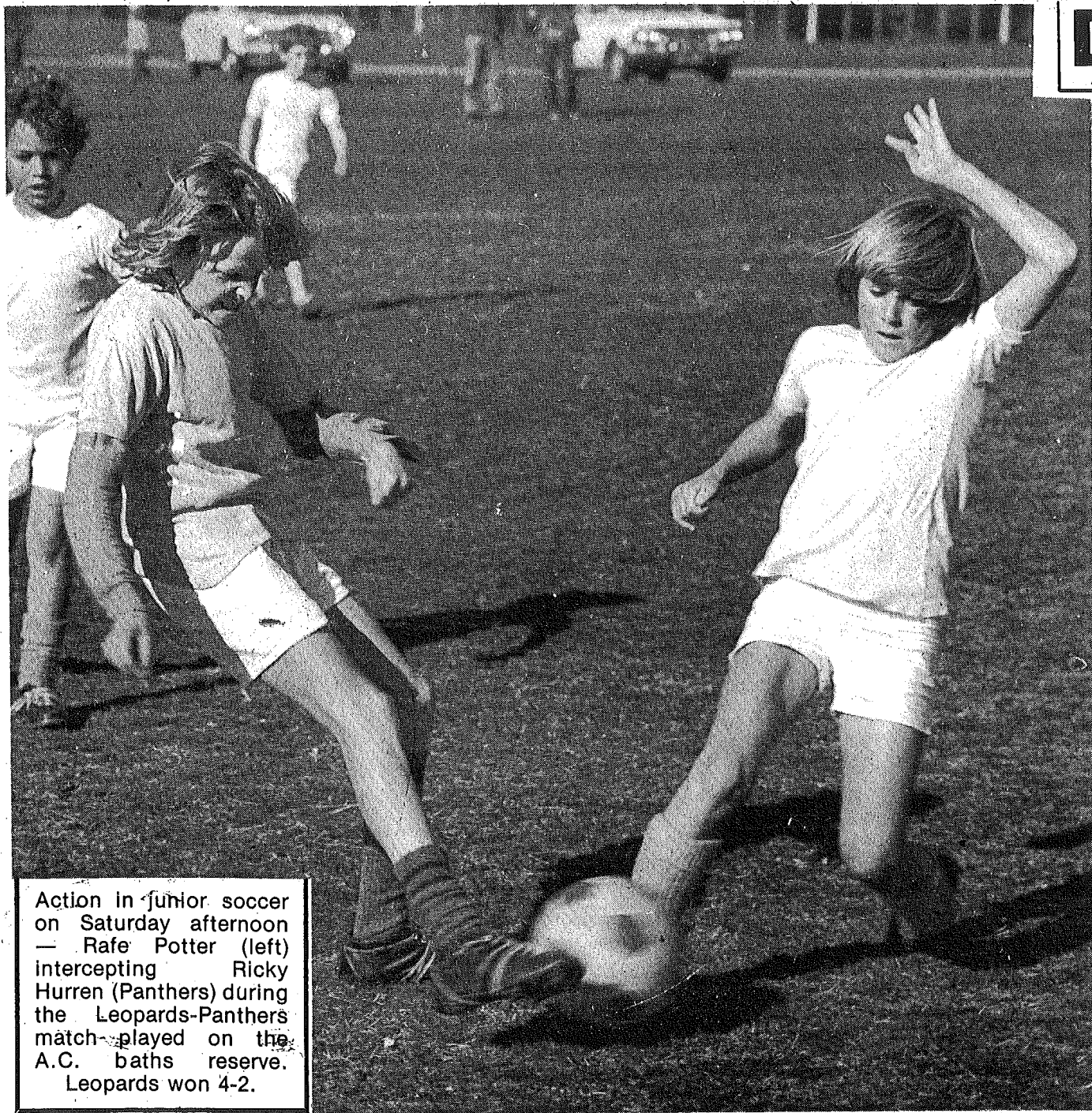

FIREMAN HAS COMPLEX TASK TO PERFORM TODAY

These are the days when a fireman was just someone who carried water at a fire. Today's fireman has a more complex task to perform.

when they only had to use water on a fire. A fireman today needs a knowledge of chemistry, physics and hydraulics. Today, when there are so many dangerous and noxious chemicals around,

water cannot always be used to put out a fire. In some cases adding water can make an explosive situation. Some chemicals may be all right by themselves but when another chemical is added it can be dangerous.

So a fireman has to know what to use on each fire he goes to.

Taupo's chief fire officer, Mr S. K. Christensen, said groups of both school pupils and adults often visited the fire station. They are taught about fire safety, and the role of the fireman.

Mr Christensen and other fire officers often go outside the fire station to speak to meetings. This is the public relations role of the fire officer.

Sometimes the fire brigade is called on to rescue people in distress. And they are also called on to cut people from mangled wrecks of cars.

Mr Christensen said the percentage of fires in vehicles is rapidly overtaking the percentage of fires in buildings.

With the high fluctuation of population of Taupo, Mr Christensen said the hazards the firemen have to cope with are higher than other towns of the same size.

"Taupo is the place where the industrial traffic from Penrose to Lower Hutt meets the traffic from the Bay of Plenty and Waikato to the Hawke's Bay," said Mr Christensen.

"This means there are always a lot of people on the roads in and around Taupo.

"In the holiday season people are building extra fires around the area. But so far we have had no special problems with camping grounds."
