Taupo Soccer Club now in BOP league

The Taupo Soccer Club has taken what could well prove to be one of its biggest steps in its history.

At a meeting of the executive of the Bay of Plenty Football Association held on Monday night, the Taupo senior club side was accepted into the Bay of Plenty senior league.

Three committee members from the club travelled to the meeting held near Tauranga to support the club's application to join the league.

A motion which was placed to the meeting to accept Taupo's application was strongly supported by clubs from Rotorua and Whakatane and was accepted unopposed.

This means that for the 1974 season, the Taupo senior side will play in the Bay of Plenty league. Also in the competition are teams from Rotorua City, Rotorua suburbs, Ngongotaha, Tauranga City, Kawerau, Whakatane and Te Puke.

By joining the Bay of Plenty League, Taupo will be leaving the Tongariro Association competition in which it has played for the past two years.

At recent committee meetings held in Taupo, plans had been laid to improve the standard of competition of Soccer that Taupo will expect to take part in in future years.

The Tongariro league now includes six teams from prison farms and Waiouru Military Camp. It has been felt that the standard of competition provided by these teams which varies so markedly from year to year, has not been conducive to improving the standard of Soccer in Taupo.

In fact, criticism has been levelled at the club for playing in this type of competition which tends to be of a recreational and social nature. An exception to this suggestion would be the Turangi Club which is also believed to be attempting to join another regional league.

It is therefore for the future of Taupo Soccer

that the step to join the Bay of Plenty league has been made.

The prospects within the present junior ranks in Taupo Soccer can only be described as exciting and in one and two years, as these boys leave College, it is important to the present club committee that a good standard of competition is available for them.

Whether the Taupo side has a successful season or not may be immaterial — it is important that an entry into the league has been made.

The Taupo team has been allocated a place in Division I of the league. The club will have several trips away this season, but it has to be remembered that the club had already been making trips to Tauramarunui, Turangi and Waiouru in the Tongariro league.

The competition will begin on the weekend of April 20 - 21 with a home game against Rotorua City.

Present indications are that Taupo will field a well-balanced team of average strength.

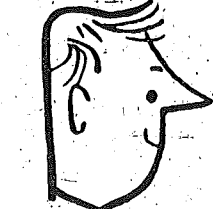

TAUPO BEATS ROTORUA CITY 6-1 AT SOCCER

The Taupo senior Soccer team made a tremendous debut in the Bay of Plenty first division league on Saturday when it defeated Rotorua City 6-1.

In a new league of unknown quantity against Rotorua City — a team of unknown strength — Taupo set out at a fast pace in the first session of play.

Taupo took the game into the Rotorua half on numerous raids down the wings and it was from a right wing corner that Peter Henry rose high to send a header into the top corner.

One goal up after 10 minutes was a good start, but better was to come when, from another right wing attack, Phil Henry slid the ball home.

Eight minutes later Taupo had a 3-0 lead when Rotorua City conceded an own goal from more Taupo pressure.

Three goals down it appeared as if Rotorua was wondering what had hit it and the side had a struggle on its hands to get back in the game.

Rotorua partly did this when it scored 10 minutes before the interval, but Taupo still held control, particularly in mid-field, and looked in good shape as half-time approached.

Rotorua was surprisingly becoming shaky in defence as Taupo probed all

avenues of attack.

In one incident the referee took the names of five or six Rotorua City players when they would not move back 10 yards for a free kick.

Taupo nearly went into a comfortable lead when seconds before half-time Chris Gilfoyle crashed the ball on to the underside of the bar and Kerry Hurren lifted the rebound over the top.

The half-time score was: Taupo 3, Rotorua City 1.

The second half started with Taupo resuming control of the game.

The two young mid-field players were getting through a lot of hard work. These two boys, Peter Henry and Kerry Hurren, were often yards faster than their opponents.

Taupo was looking for goals all the time and 10 minutes after the interval scored.

A Rotorua City defender handled in the area and Brian Ruck made no mistake from the penalty spot to put Taupo 4-1 in the lead.

Taupo substituted both wingers shortly after and, although this somewhat restricted their attacks to down the middle, Taupo

never lost control.

It was from down the centre that Taupo became dangerous and striker Robert Hindle scored identical goals in the 74th and 82nd minutes from strong shots into the far corner, which left the Rotorua goalie helpless.

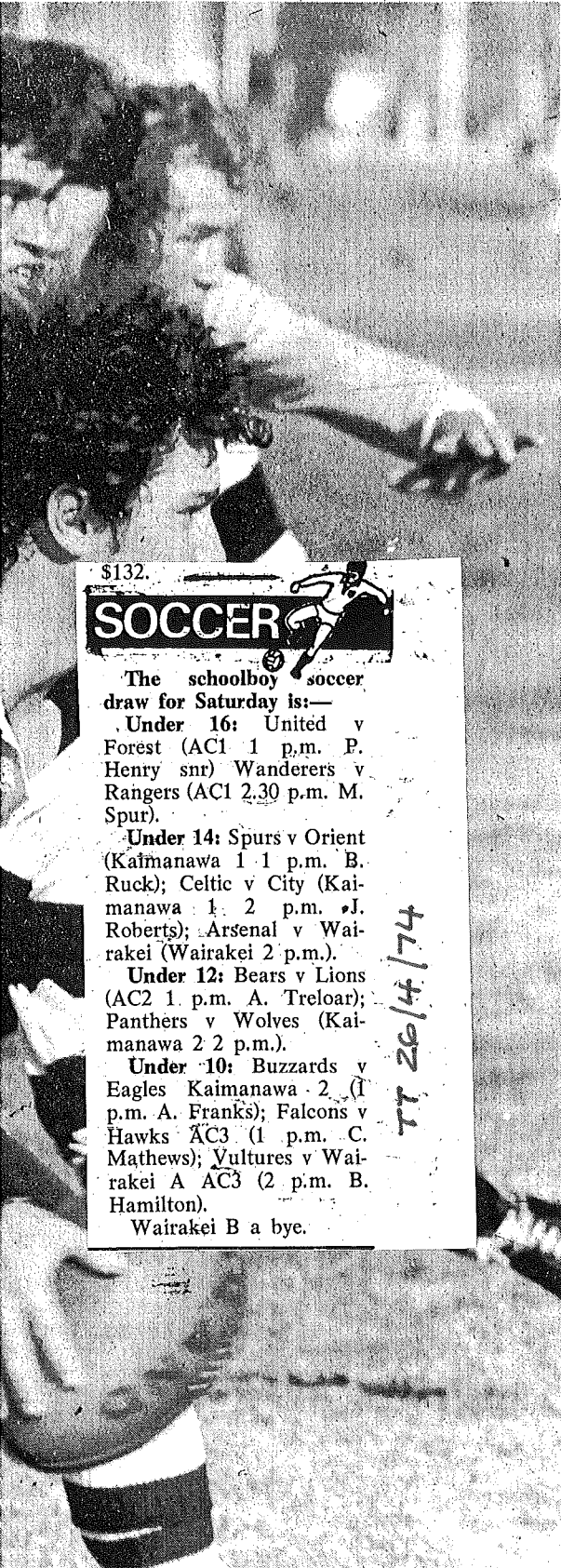

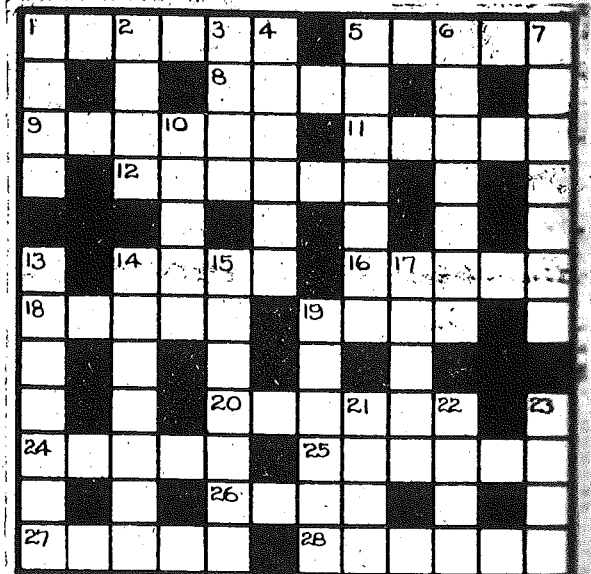

Taupo loses form — and goes down 4-1 to Te Puke

The Taupo senior soccer team lost its second game of the season 4-1 when it played Te Puke at Te Puke on Saturday.

This was a set-back after the fine beginning to the season the week before.

However, Taupo was never really in the game and at no time could it dictate the run of play.

Te Puke kicked off with a gusty cross-wind behind it and soon had the Taupo defence stretching.

After only 12 minutes, Taupo goalie D. Bowles could not hold a hard shot which slipped high into the top corner of the net.

Taupo was trying hard in mid-field to gain possession to enable it to get attacks going but the Te Puke side was too strong.

Te Puke scored again midway through the half after a defensive error in the Taupo defence and Taupo was not looking comfortable by any means.

However, for a 10 minute spell at the end of the first half, Taupo began to show some cohesion and, with good inter-passing, began to find a method by which it could match Te Puke.

Until then, Taupo had relied on a long ball into a packed Te Puke defence

with no success.

It was during this 10 minute spell that Taupo scored.

From another long through ball the Te Puke defence was harassed and the right back conceded an own goal.

Captain I. McCutcheon also went close having a shot cleared off the line.

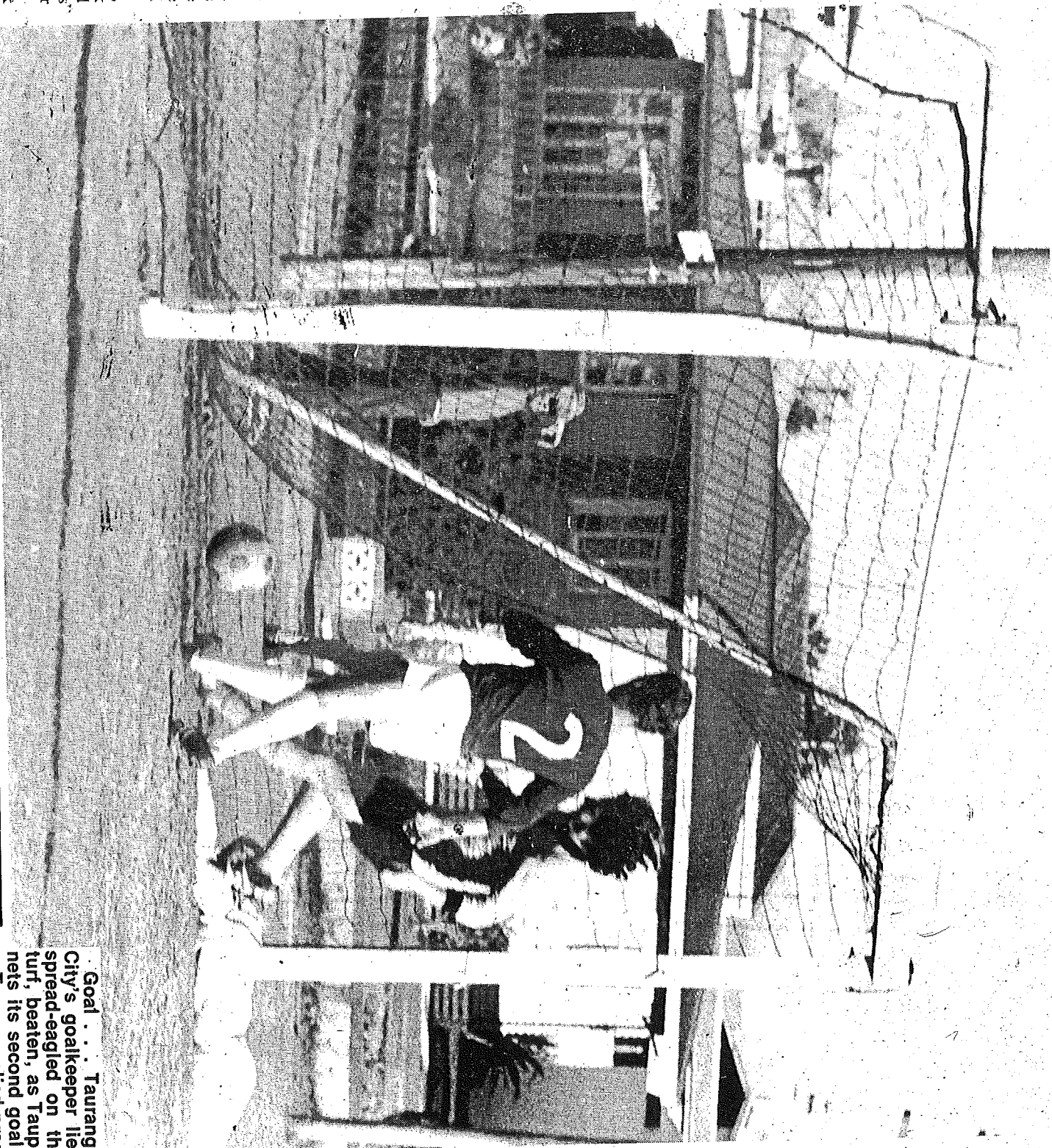

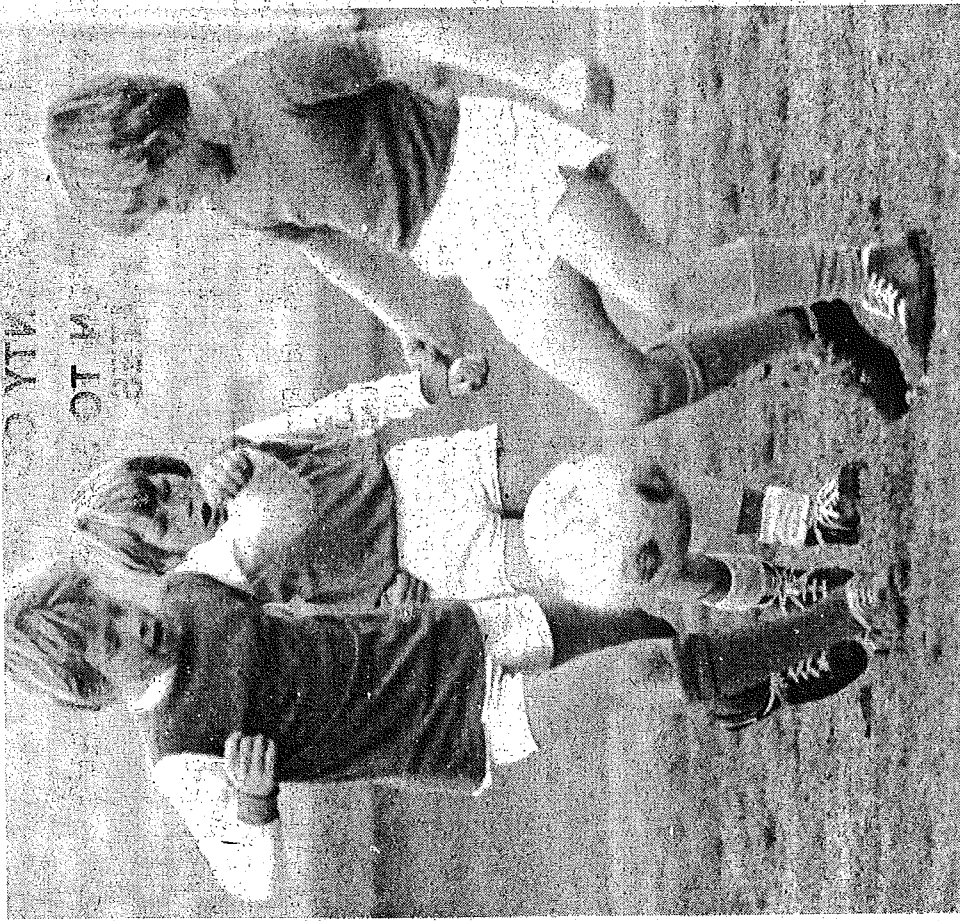

Reasons for their joining the fire police as volunteers are two-fold.

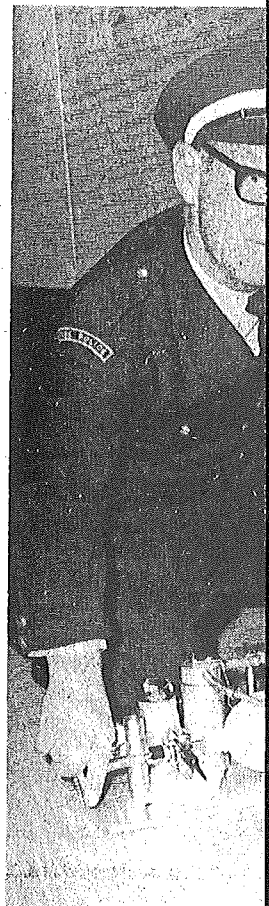
They say it gives them the chance to serve the community.

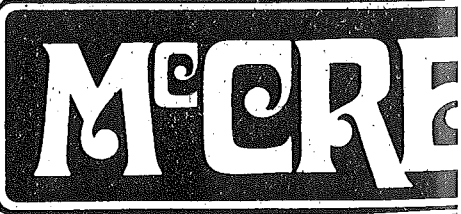

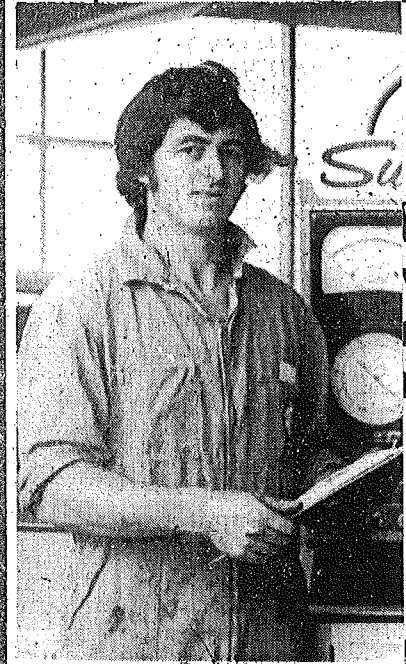
