Taupo kicks off soccer season in fine 8-3 win style

The 1975 soccer season for the Taupo senior team began in good style on Sunday with a convincing 8-3 victory over its Bay of Plenty league rival, Rotorua City, at Rotorua.

The players showed the benefit of four or five weeks' training before the first match.

The game began at a fast pace, with determined end-to-end play, and Rotorua scored first after only three minutes. However, two minutes later D. Scott, of Taupo, was left unmarked on the goal line from a corner and scored easily.

The pace of the match increased and the goals continued to come. Rotorua scored and R. Hindle took a good chance to equalise again. About midway through the half Rotorua struck the lead for the third time, but Hindle put the scores level again within a minute.

Taupo now began to take command of the game. The defence was playing well and the mid-field and forward play was crisp and accurate.

P. Henry put Taupo ahead for the first time and as his team gained the upper hand further goals came before the interval from Henry and Hindle. The half-time score was Taupo 6, Rotorua City 3.

Play slowed down not surprisingly in the second half, but Taupo remained in command. B. Ruck accepted an easy chance to put Taupo further ahead and although Taupo did not score again until near the end the team had several chances.

A new player, J. Scott, finally sealed the victory with the eighth goal.

Taupo took the opportunity to field several sub-

stitutes in this pre-season friendly game and the full side was: A. Franks, A. Forrest, S. Lochrie, T. Treloar, I. McCutcheon (captain), C. Gilfoyle, B. Ruck, D. Scott, R. Hindle, P. Henry, L. Babbington, substitutes, K. Hurren, R. Forrest, J. Scott.

Scores for Taupo were R. Hindle (3), P. Henry (2), D. Scott, B. Ruck and J. Scott, one each.

This weekend Taupo will travel to Auckland for a return fixture with the Te Atatu club. Last season this side lost to Taupo a Taupo, 5-4, in a very interesting affair, so a good match is expected.

Attendance at baths again 'disappointing'

Warm weather and daylight saving have been blamed for the "disappointing" attendance at the A.C. Baths in January.

A total of 56,661 admission tickets were sold in January, compared with 62,587 in January last year.

The revenue collected was \$12,148, compared with \$14,021.

"Another disappointing month," said the baths manager, Mr P. B. McKenna.

The baths had not been closed for maintenance for two years, he said in his report received by the council.

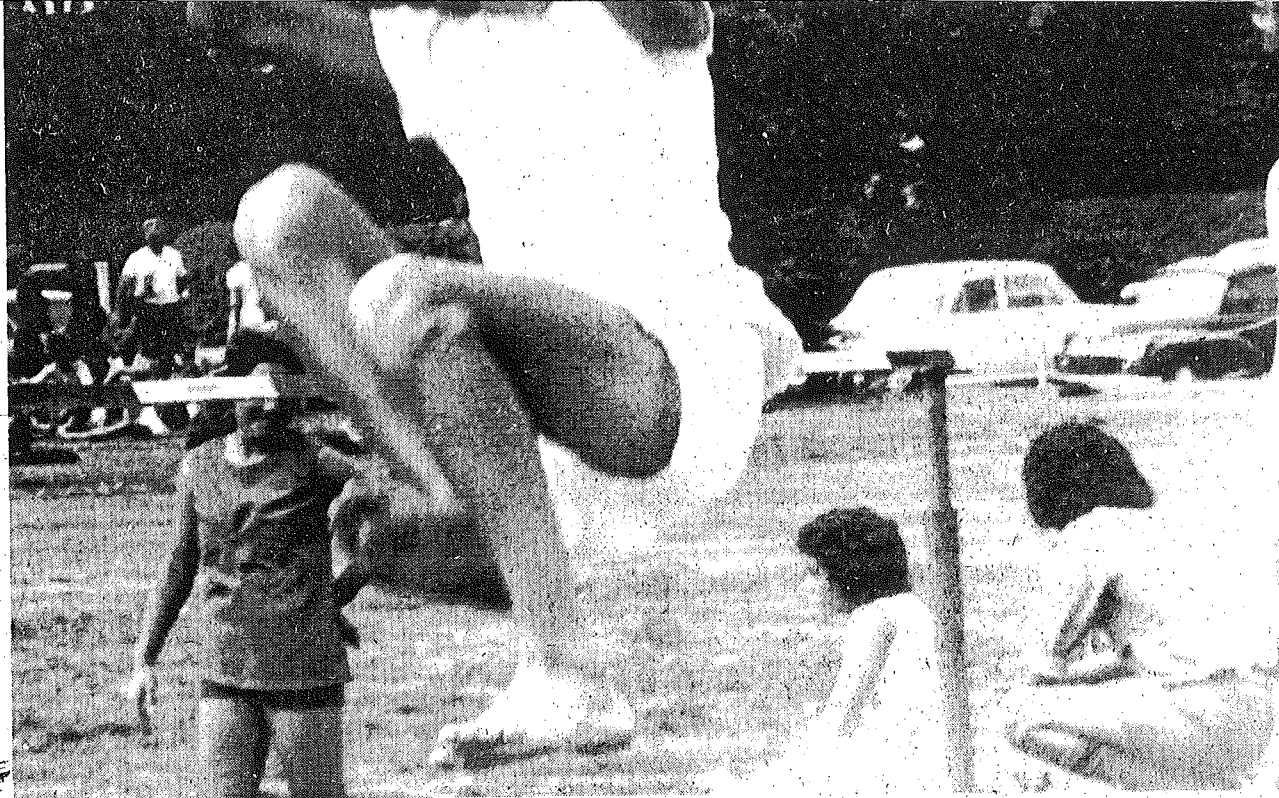
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Team enjoys second big pre-season win

The Taupo senior soccer side travelled to Auckland last weekend to play the Te Atatu side and had a comfortable 7-4 win.

It was the side's second large scoring performance, with an 8-3 victory the week before.

At this stage it is encouraging to see a forward line that makes ample opportunities to score plenty of goals.

But it must also be realised that the Taupo defence has conceded seven goals in two comparatively easy wins.

Saturday's game was one of fluctuating fortunes in differing conditions on an uneven pitch.

The game started on a bone-hard pitch in humid weather and finished in torrential rain, which turned the pitch into a treacherous state.

Taupo scored first

through winger L. Babbington but Te Atatu equalised when Taupo failed to clear from a corner and left an opponent with an easy shot from close range.

Taupo regained the lead when Taupo's attack left the Te Atatu's defence spread-eagled and K. Hurren scored.

Peter Henry netted next with a great long shot to give Taupo a 3-1 lead.

The next period of play brought a sudden change around when, in heavy rain, Te Atatu scored three quick goals to take a surprise 4-3 lead.

Taupo recovered and began to adapt play to the rain-sodden pitch and gradually took control.

R. Hindle, the Taupo striker, put Taupo back on level terms, then scored two more to complete a fine hat-trick and give Taupo a 6-4 lead.

Before the end J. Scott,

for the second week running, sealed Taupo's victory with a final goal.

The Taupo defence had taken control over the opposing forwards and were well marshalled by skipper I. McCutcheon.

T. Treloar, playing his first game for Taupo in goal, also had a good game and showed excellent handling in the trying conditions.

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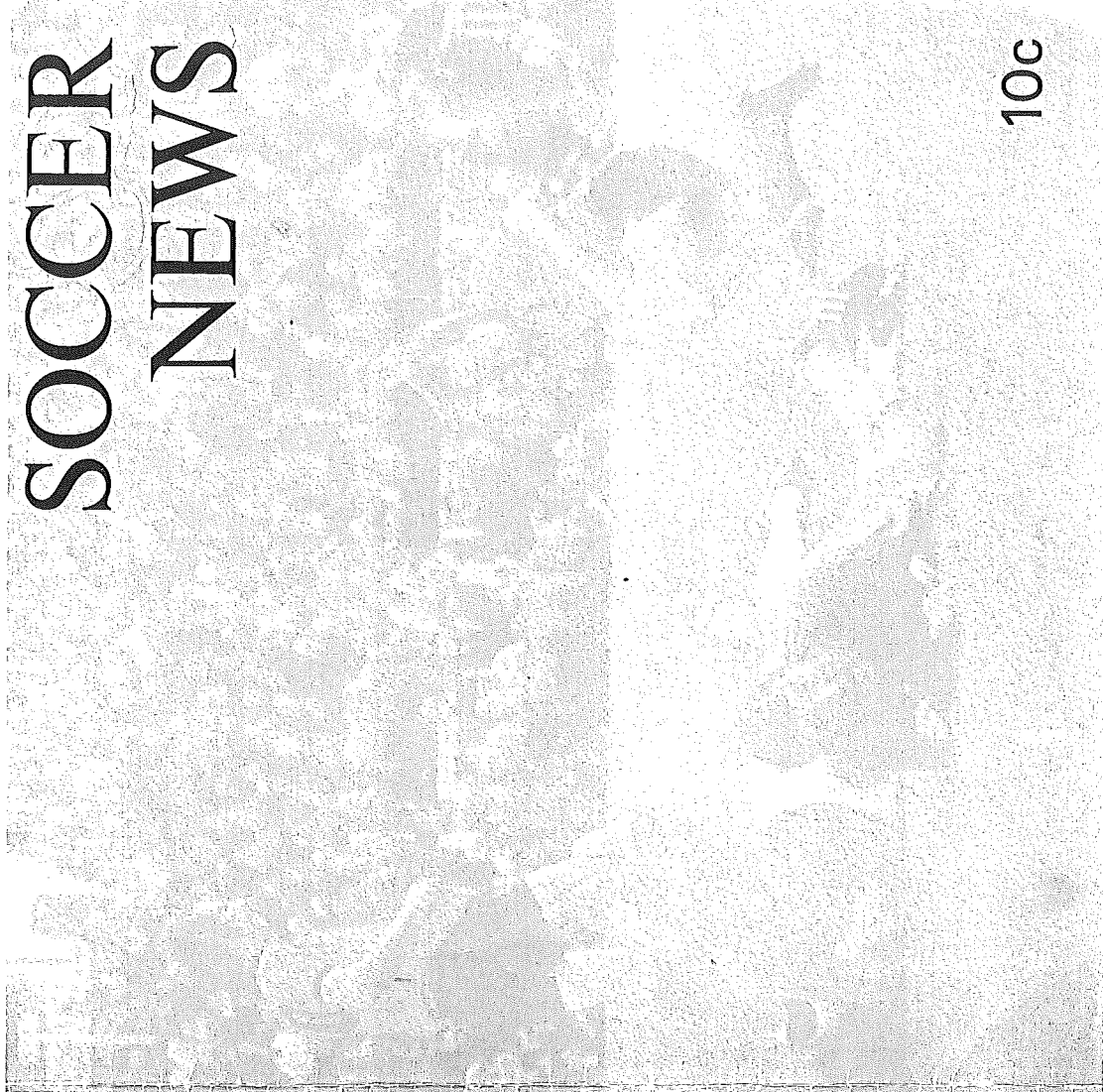

The next week-end two games were arranged to be played at Turangi but due to some confusion only one team turned up as opponents. The result was another big win by 7-1 this time.

The most recent pre-season game was at the Cambridge pre-season tournament where Taupo met strong Northern League opponents in Mount Roskill and were beaten but not disgraced in losing 3-0. The first team will play Kawearu on April 5th and the reserve side entertain Tauranga City on the 6th April.

WHERE TO IN FUTURE YEARS

Taupo is now playing it's second year in the Bay of Plenty League. The Club has made application to the New Zealand Football Association to play permanently in this competition. The N.Z.F.A. have ruled that the Club will be allowed to play in the B.O.P. League on a year to year basis. Our Club actually belongs to the Tongariro Association which has only been formed for three years. At the moment Tongariro Soccer is in the doldrums and is very much out on a limb. This is why Taupo has literally turned north for a better standard of Soccer. Our junior teams have always been under Bay of Plenty wings for representative fixtures etc. and the position is not likely to change in the immediate future.

GROWTH OF THE JUNIORS

Enrolment Day was held recently and the trend of recent years was maintained with many new registrations being recorded. Two new features are prominent. Firstly an Under 8 grade is being introduced and many boys in this age group have already registered. Our Wairakei section also expects to have good enrolment in this age group. Secondly and for the first time girls have been allowed to enrol as players. The Club has not made this move as a joke. Already girls Soccer has caught on in a big way in the bigger cities and is likely to continue to do so. In this respect any young girls who would like to try Soccer as a sport will be encouraged to do so. It is not known as this stage whether the girls who have already enrolled will play as a separate team or be mixed into other junior sides. This will eventually depend on the number of girls who enrol.

CLUB FUND RAISING

Raising funds is always a prominent matter for discussion with the Club Committee. Subscriptions alone no longer cover the cost of running the Club. The Club has received very good support from Senior and Junior players and parents over recent seasons. The recent raffle was a good success and during the season the Club will operate other fund-raising efforts. We are determined within the Committee that Taupo Soccer players will continue to get the best opponents and competition that we can get them. Senior travel costs have soared. There will be no cut back in Junior Representative fixtures being arranged and bus hire costs have also risen. For those boys who don't make the rep. sides they must still have equipment and we plan for them to have the best we can offer. Maybe you would prefer to assist the Club in just one avenue of Club fund-raising so you will have the chance to make a choice.

HOUSIE EVENINGS.

After consultations with local hotel management the Club has stopped running Housie for the time being. We are now expecting to start up again shortly and this time it will be outside the hotels. We hope that when the time comes that those of you who have chosen not to attend while these games evenings have been held in hotels will be able to give us your support.

SNIPPETS FROM OVERSEAS

Some overseas Clubs from Britain are coming to N.Z. this year. Glasgow Rangers and Manchester United are playing in Auckland, Middlesborough, under Manager Jackie Charlton, will play one game in Wellington and we have just heard that the English 2nd Division side Fulham who have recently reached the semi-finals of the F.A.Cup will be playing in Taranaki.

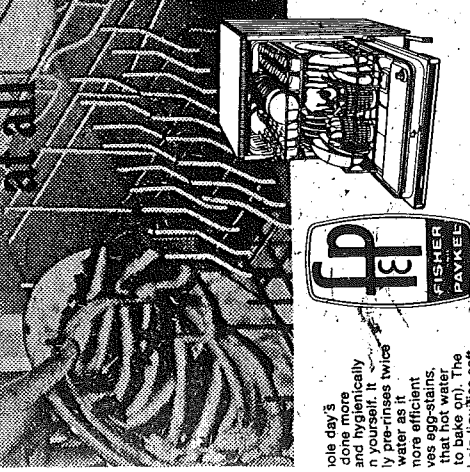

We would be silly to say it hasn't increased but on the other hand we could not say there has been a massive increase."

There were two types of lakeweed causing the major problems — elodea canadensis, Canadian pond weed, and potamogeton, a pond weed.

These weeds existed in the tail-race and the marina as well as Lake Rotoaira.

"Over the last year elodea has been coming down from Lake

Rotoaira and causing a major problem by blocking the screens," said Mr Pike.

"And the increase in nutrients accompanying this weed is a concern."

The weed was already established in the Tokaanu Bay area so there was no new species being introduced.

Mr Pike did not think the "actual increase in weed beds would be aggravated by the bits of weed coming down."

"It would be the nutrients in

these bits which would be the problem."

Apart from blocking up the screens, the weed was causing trouble in powerhouse operations and boaties were finding it impossible to move in the marina.

"The weed had been in the marina before but now that it is being used for that purpose people are striking problems.

"There is nothing to suggest the weed is new to the marina," said Mr Pike.

This would be a reduction of its normal growth. The NZED usually cleans out the tail-race.

Mr Ridley said he had field discussions with the Minister for the Environment, Mrs T. Sullivan, about the problem at Tokaanu Bay.

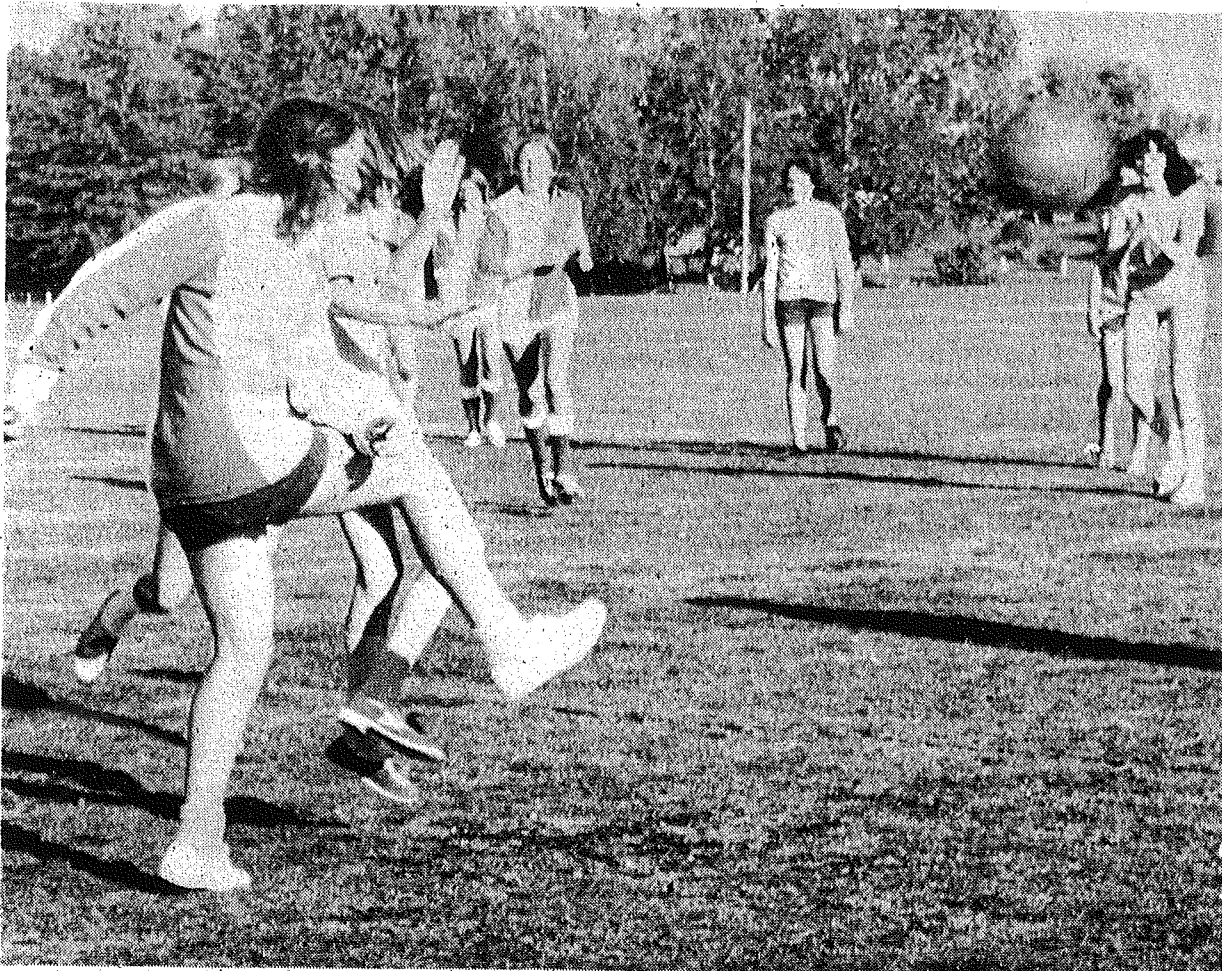
"Around the Taupo, it is a problem of urbanisation," he said.

Taupo still had the chances in the second half to give it victory.


Despite a solid game by centre-half P. Henry there were times when the Taupo defence looked shaky but the goal was held intact.

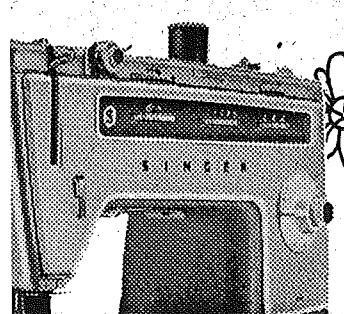

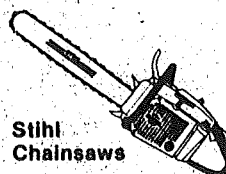

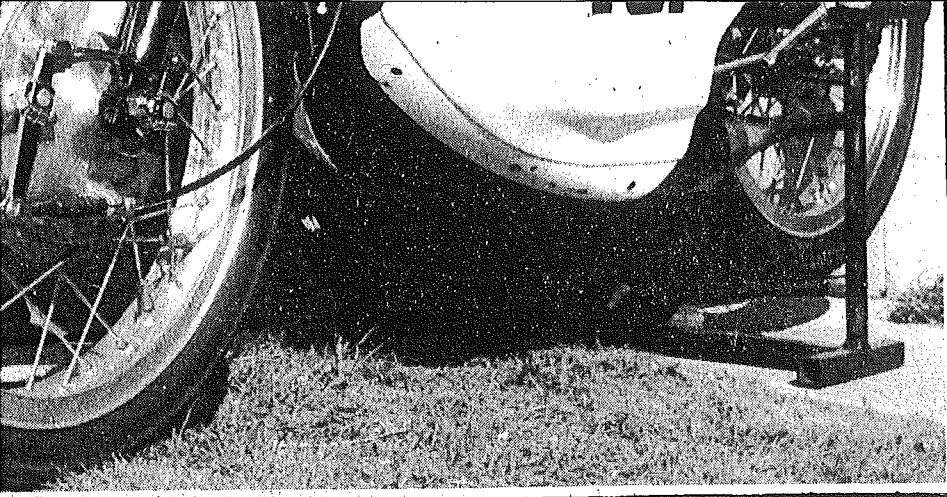
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Taupo still has chance to make top four

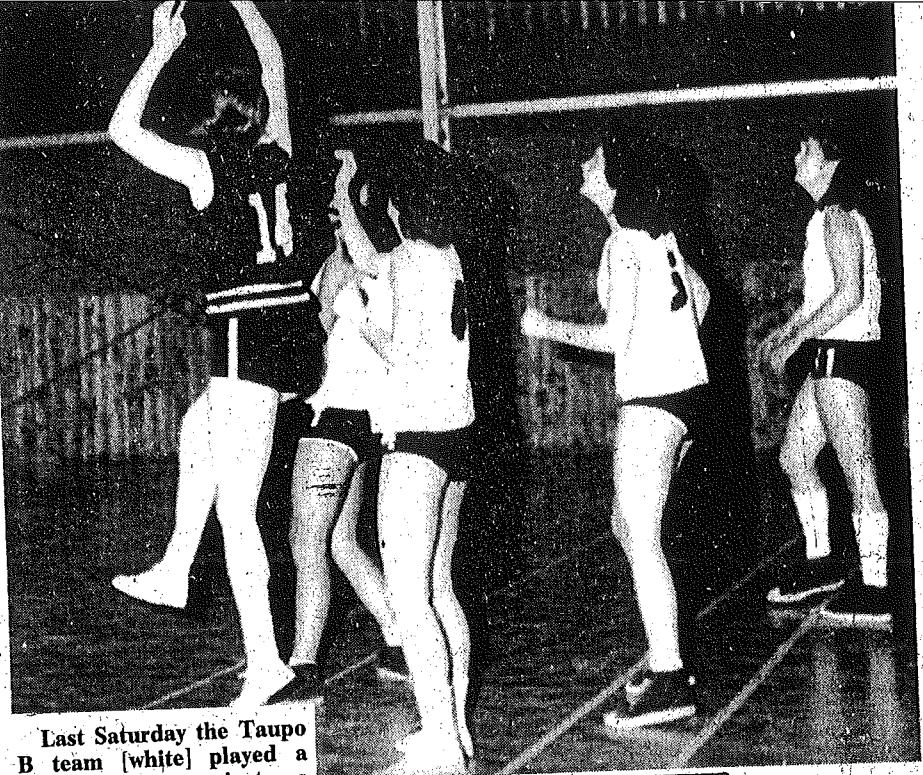

Clean sweep at Tokoroa soccer tournament sought

If a ministry of sport grant is made the association hopes in the future to build changing rooms at the AC Reserve.

The time was also fast approaching when the club would have to ask the borough council to make provision for soccer fields in the new sports complex near the airport.

The association was one of the fastest growing organisations catering for Taupo's youngsters and the numbers would soon outstrip the facilities and efforts of senior and com-

mittee members.

"It is worth noting, though, that great efforts can be made by so few provided they are willing," said Mr Treloar.

"This will be highlighted by the Labour weekend New World tournament the seniors will hold at Centennial Park.

"Prize-money will total more than \$600, and the tremendous amount of work in organising this near-national event with 16 visiting teams indicates what can be done by those willing to help themselves.

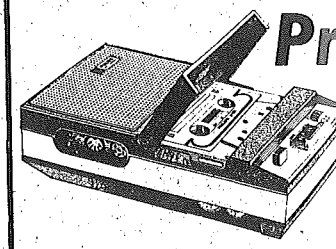
"More than 250 players and an estimated 500 supporters are expected in Taupo for the event."

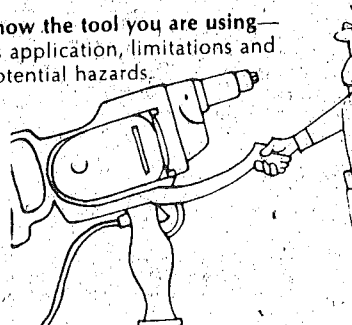

Air facility is criticised

Taupo continues to be poorly treated by NAC, said the National Party candidate for Taupo, Mr Ray LaVaris, yesterday.

"Taupo's tourist industry is suffering from NAC's inconvenient timetabling," Mr LaVaris said.

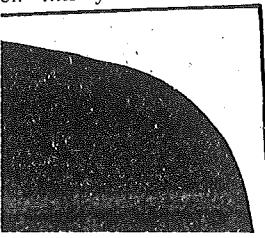

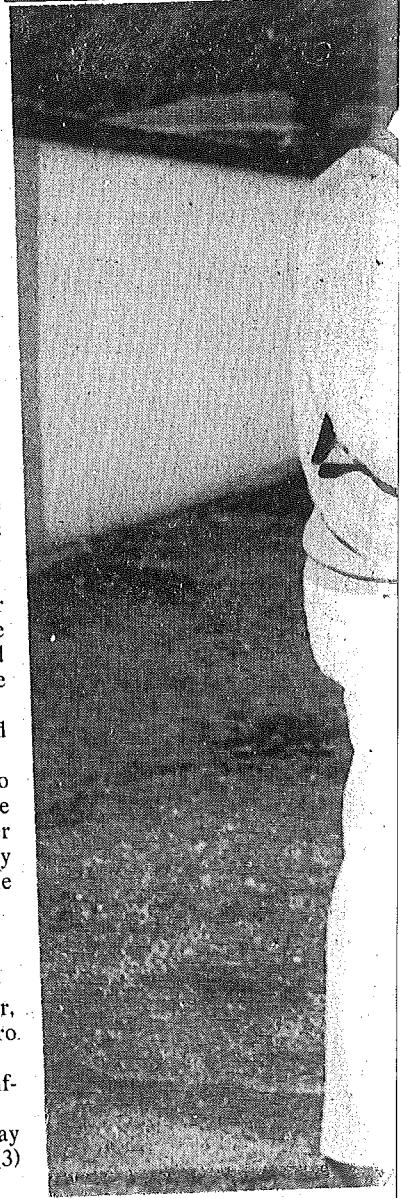

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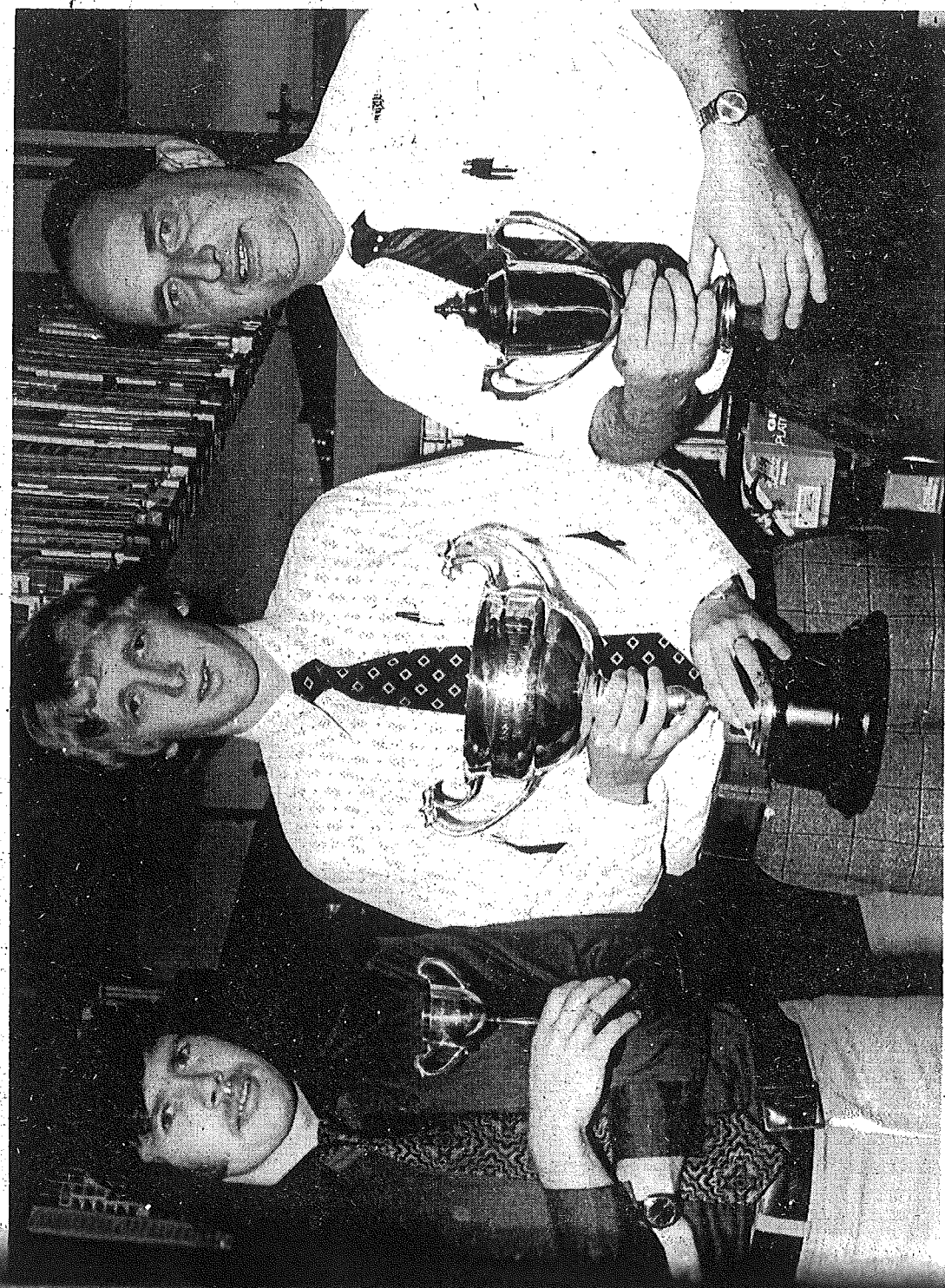

There will also be a consolation shield at stake. This will be contested by the losing teams in the second round of the New World Cup.

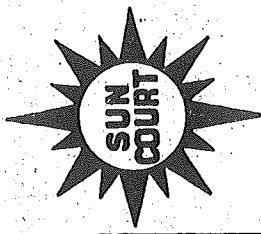
The entire tournament has been planned so that all teams will have at least two games, and also ensure that every club has a game on both days.

The presentation of trophies and wind-up will be held at a social to be held in the Taupo Memorial Hall at 7.30 p.m. on Sunday.

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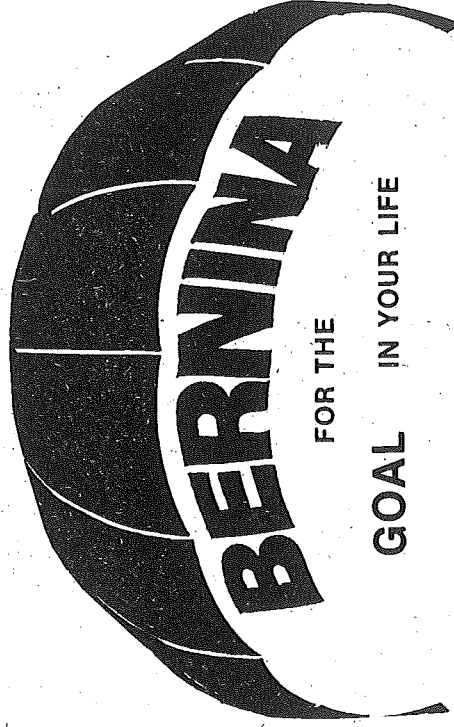

Sport groups get \$18,600 in grants

Sport and recreation organisations in the Taupo district have this year been granted a total of \$18,690 from government funds.

The Taupo Sport and Recreation Allocation Committee last week received confirmation of the approval by the Minister of Sport and Recreation, Mr Walding, of the committee's recommendations.

Mr G. A. Thompson, the committee chairman, said: "I believe there has been

a very fair distribution to the borough, to the county and to Turangi and Mangakino."

Clubs throughout the area applied for a total exceeding \$22,000.

However, under the rules of the sport and recreation fund, it was necessary to reduce claims in some cases.

In announcing the subsidies, Mr Walding said that the response from local recreation and sport organisations was a positive indication of the need for government's recreation and sport programme, now in its third year.
