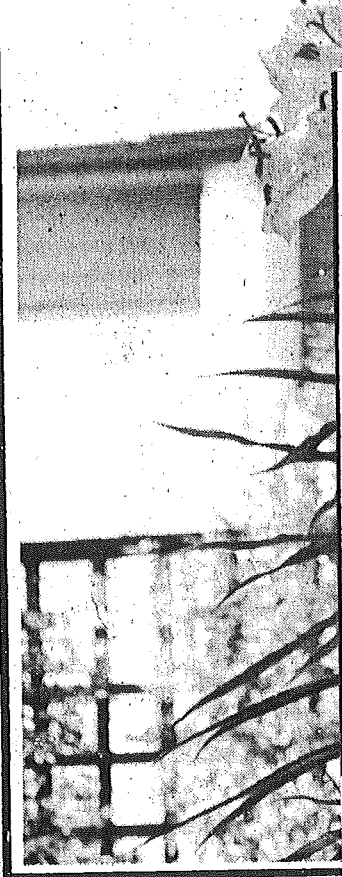

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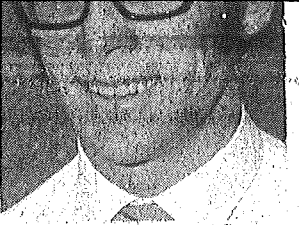

In the first half of the year there were 62 sales at an average price of \$26,760, compared with 96 sales and an average of \$29,258.

A reason for the increase of property sales in the second half-year was offered by a Taupo estate agent, Mr Jack Lewis.

He said that by this time many properties may have become exempted from the Labour government's property speculation tax, which set a two-year term of ownership before exemption from tax.

Six fields proposed

The Taupo Borough Council's works committee has recommended that Crown Park should be developed into six playing fields — although the work will cost double the original estimate.

"Taupo urgently needs further playing fields," the borough engineer, Mr W. K. Kiddle, said in a report to the committee meeting on Monday.

"Furthermore, ample

finance is held in the land subdivisional reserve account."

It now seems likely that the development, involving clearing, filling, levelling, topsoiling and sowing of the 10-hectare park, will cost around \$30,000.

Just before the council meeting last month, Mr Kiddle received a notice from the department of lands and survey that 10 acres of land on Crown

Road would be vested in the council once the boundaries had been set.

An estimate, based on very little information, was prepared for the council so that if the park development was approved at the council meeting work could begin immediately.

That estimate was \$15,000.

However, the area has now been cleared and surveyed and the new estimate prepared.

"The quantities of earth works are far greater than envisaged in the first instance," said Mr Kiddle.

"To keep within the original preliminary estimate would necessitate halving the development area.

"This is undesirable taking into consideration the urgent need for playing fields and the fact that we have ample finance in the subdivisional reserve account."



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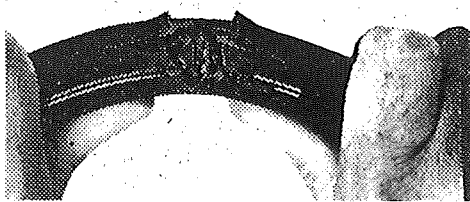

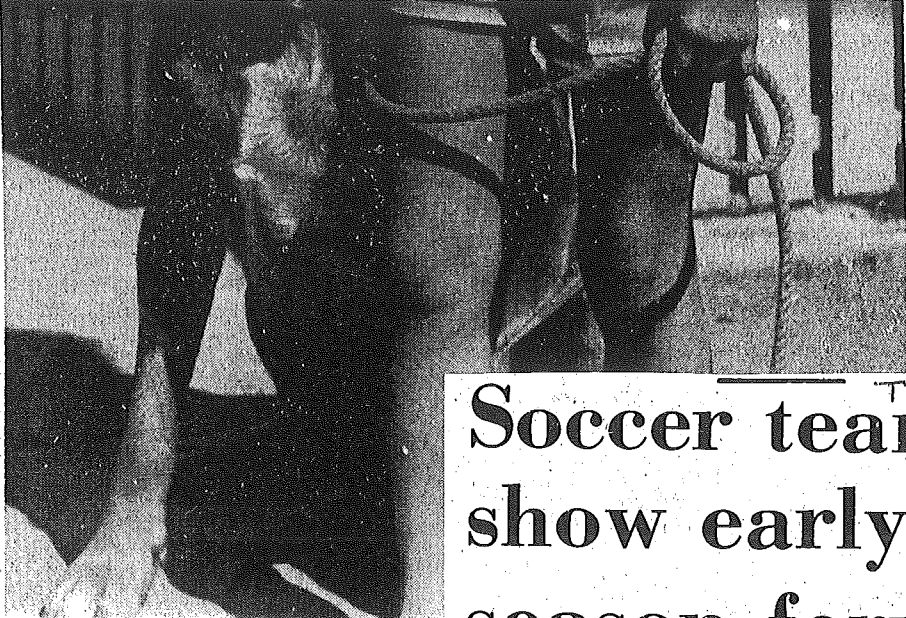

Borough should give more aid — councillor

It was up to the borough council to give all the help that could be given to sporting bodies, said Mr N. Gray at a town planning committee meeting on Monday.

Mr R. K. Ponga suggested the club be asked to

make the building more attractive.

This suggestion was accepted by the committee.

Mr Jarvis said the council should make it clear to the club that the building's life would be limited.

Double number of fields needed

The basic frame was donated by E. and J. Pardon Limited. The club spent the last two years locating an engine and accessories.

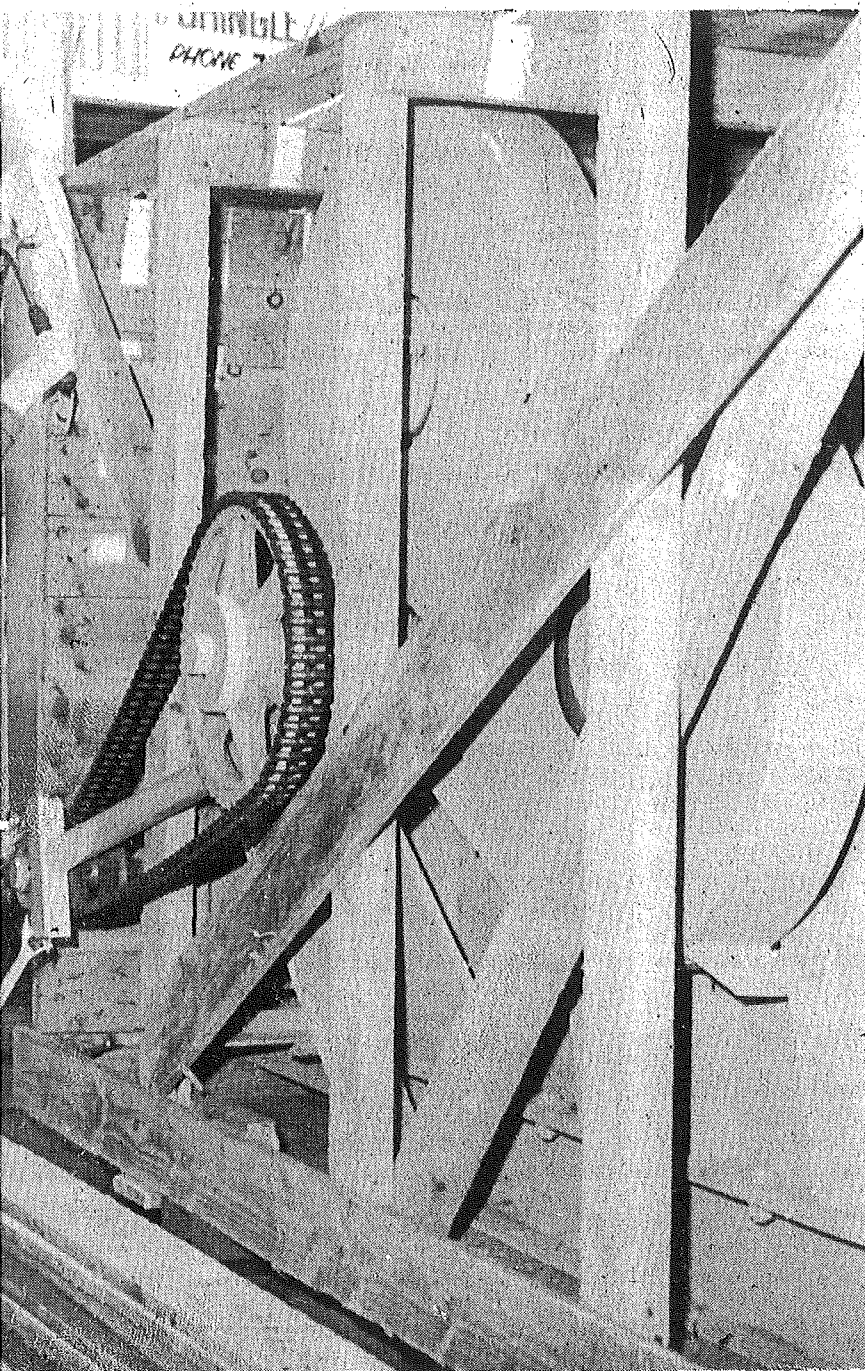
Much of the mechanical

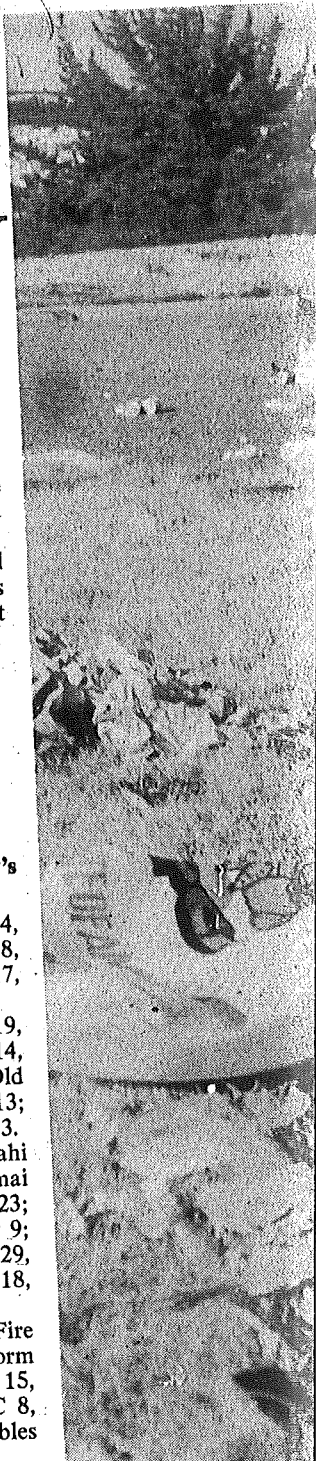

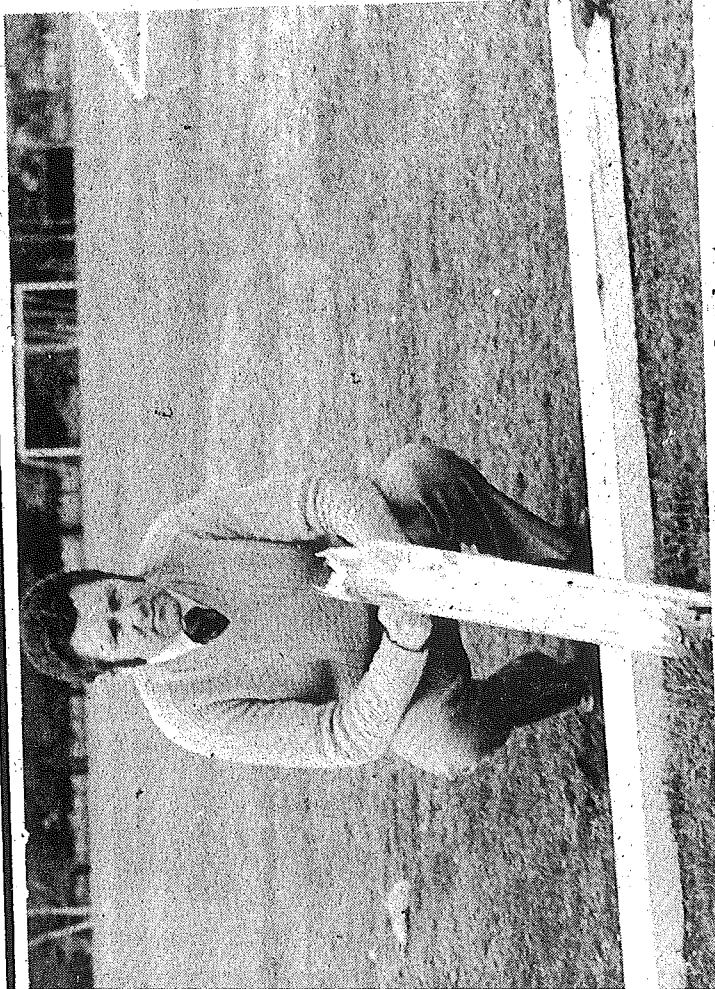
Taupo soccer club members arrived at the reserve on Sunday to play and found car tracks all over the grounds and through the smashed goal post.



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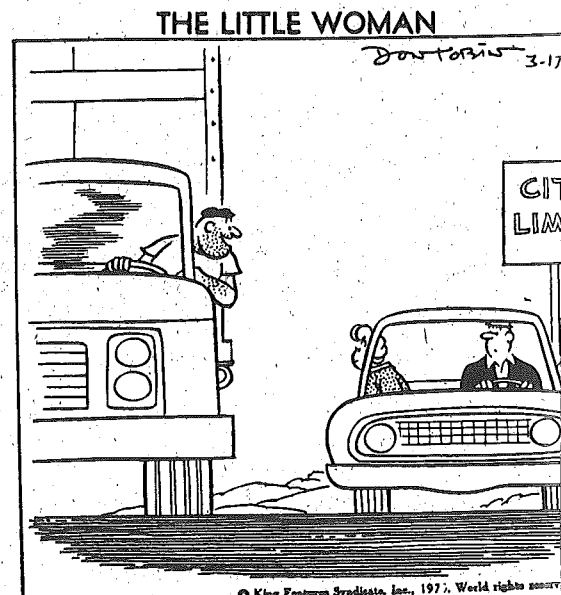

The police have so far not caught the offenders in either incident.

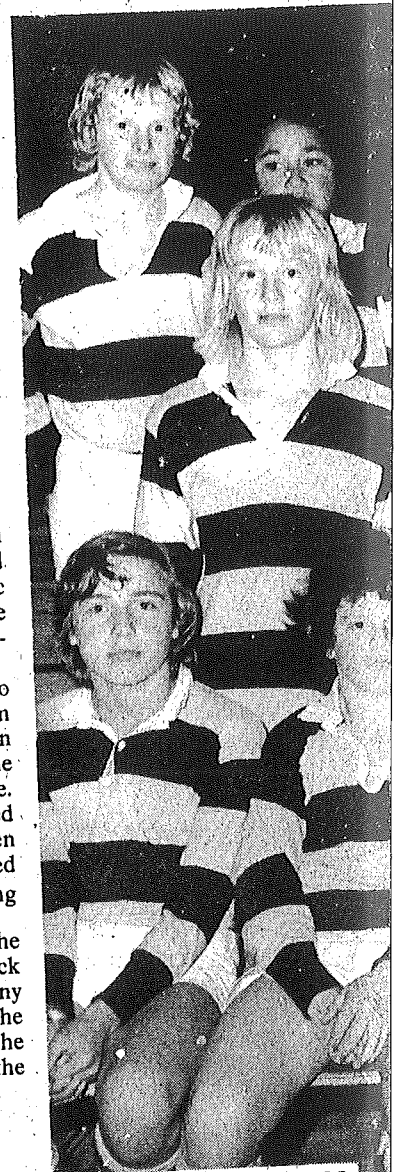
Sergeant R. Jones said that if anyone saw or heard people damaging a public reserve, they should take vehicle numbers and contact the police.

Taupo: Host team. Last year's winners. Finished in mid-table in BOP first division and third in division two. Club has 35 sides in junior competitions including eight girls' teams.

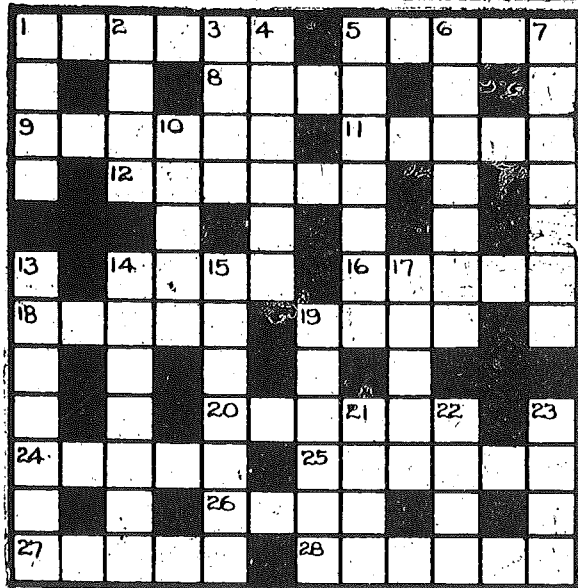
Tokoroa: Has entered northern league and Waikato league sides. Progressive club with wealth of junior talent.

The sea-scout group has permission to sell the tents on behalf of the company.

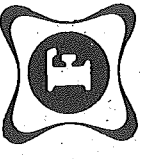
In return, the company has told the council, it will pay the group commission on tents sold and donate the proceeds of a raffle.

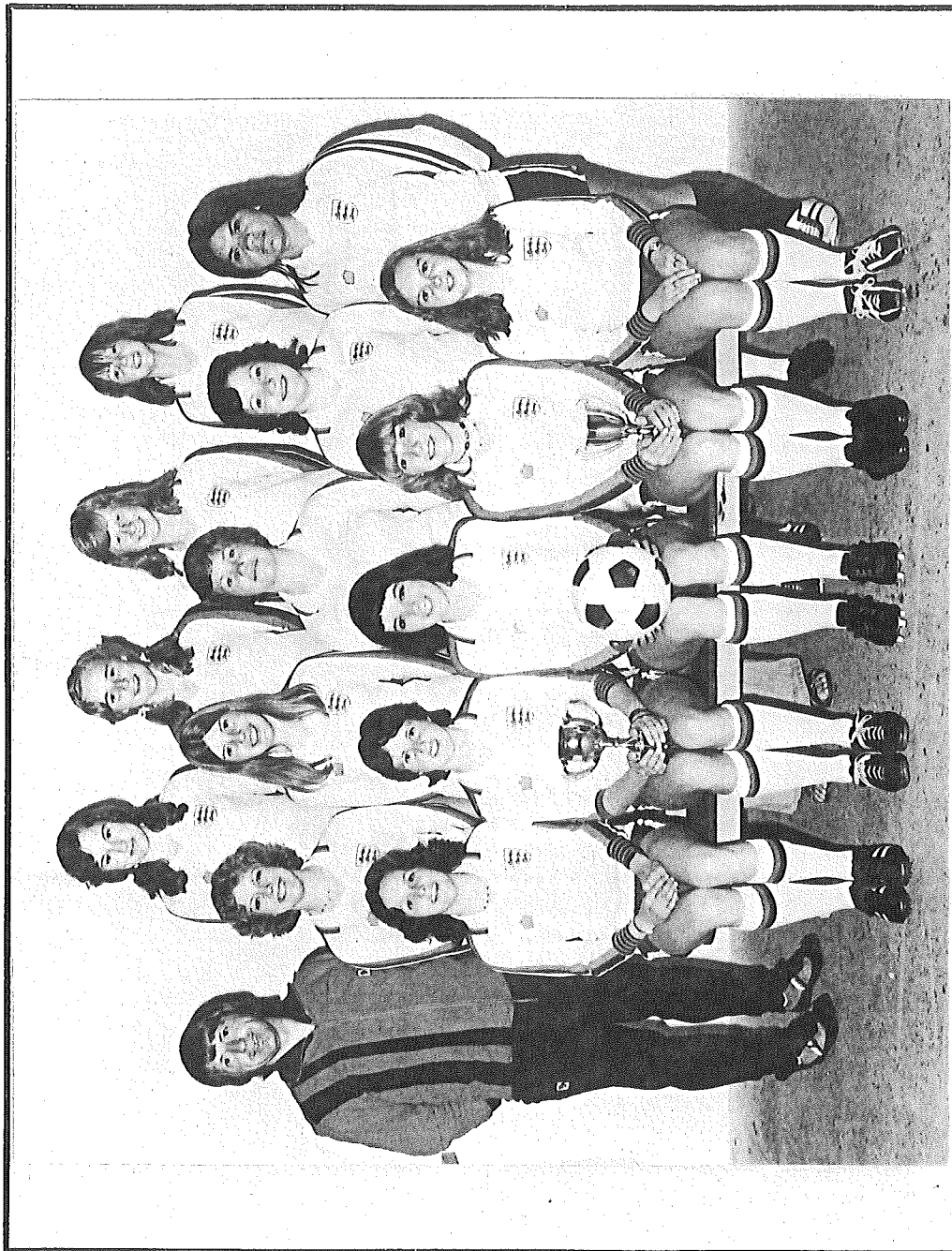

It is ironical to reflect that up to 1979 the only B.O.P.trophy -league or Cup- not won by TAUPO was lost on a corners count-back.

At the end of the season we saw the first of what has become an annual exodus as top players leave the town to attend University studies or to follow other career paths. Sara Matthews and Gillian,both mature players left the team. Both girls 'celebrated' their departure with 2 goals each at Taradale in the last match of the season.

point from those remaining games squashed its hopes and the Hutt Valley side settled for a now familiar bottom half table position. After conceding just 13 goals in the opening 14 matches the remaining four boosted the goals against tally by a further 11.

Eastern Suburbs improved marginally over the previous season, never threatened by relegation and far from being title aspirants. Seventy-eight goals conceded in the past two seasons is without equal and despite the record high of thirty-three for the year, goalkeeper Pravan Jeram was the NZFA's choice of Player-of-the-Year.

Gisborne City finished in the same position three points clear of relegation for the second successive year. After eight matches Gisborne sat in third place but the remaining 10 games reaped a modest four points. All five victories were achieved by a 1-0 scoreline and the thirteen goals netted were the second lowest in the league to date. City operated most of the season with a thirteen man squad.

New Brighton dropped six places from the previous year finishing one place above relegation for the third time in four years. It did not post a win until the 11th match then won three in succession. The side went into the final match needing two points to avoid relegation - after filling bottom spot for 12 weeks - and got them courtesy of Gisborne. A mid-

season change of coach brought New Brighton's count to ten coaches in nine years.

After six years of continual struggle Wellington City finally lost the battle. It was the fourth time in six years that a Wellington team had filled bottom berth. City's 18-29 goal average was the best of any relegated team while no other lowly placed side had amassed more points or suffered fewer defeats.

1976

It took seven seasons for the Auckland-Christchurch monopoly to be broken and it was well worth the wait as Wellington Diamond United added a new dimension to title winning - the bizarre. It is difficult to reconcile a 31-29 goal aggregate with a championship performance yet Diamonds achieved both - an exploit that received scant recognition.

Certainly some of the statistics that arose from Diamond's season were not of what championships are made. The twenty-nine goals conceded were easily the most by a title winner for an eighteen match season while the thirty-one scored were an all time low. The 0-5 away loss to then league leader Caversham remains the heaviest defeat suffered in a championship winning year.

However, other statistics better reflect Diamond's emergence as the best team in the league. No club has exceeded Diamond's 13 victories or the eight won

away. The four point winning margin has been bettered only twice before and all told the team set eleven club and fifteen league records.

An incredibly stable line-up resulted in all but two of the 198 league positions during the season being accounted for by 12 players, 10 of whom were with the club during its relegation from the league two years earlier: a fine reward for their loyalty. Of 13 victories 12 were by the odd goal and several were won coming from behind. It showed the character of the side which had no stars unlike every title winner before and since.

After five matches Mount Wellington was in the unaccustomed position of being the only team without a win. Only two defeats (both at home) in the remaining matches enabled the Mount to fill runner-up spot for the third time. It conceded only five goals away to equal Christchurch's 1973 feat and its overall defensive record was easily the league's best while only Caversham scored more goals.

Caversham looked likely title winners in late June after defeating WDU at home 5-0 to establish a five point lead at the top. Inexplicably it was all downhill from then on with only one win in the eight remaining matches. Four points came from the final seven games just enough for the Dunedin side to hang on to third spot but it still had the league's best home record.

One point from relegation last year to within two points of a runner-up spot sums up New Brighton's up and down form of recent years. Its success was based on a vastly improved away form. After having won four away games in four seasons the Seaside won six on their travels this year and had its home form matched this it would have reached runner-up position. Michael Glubb top scored with 11 goals - the only player in the league to get into double

figures. For the first, and only, time New Brighton finished ahead of city rival United.

Blockhouse Bay maintained its record of having finished in the top half of the table every season - but only just. It required goal average to hoist it above city rival Eastern Suburbs and enable coach Bert Ormond to bow out on a high note as the league's longest serving coach to date.

Eastern Suburbs, struggled to regain its former league glory and finished in a safe middle-of-the-table position despite winning only two home games. Striker Gary Jenkins was back in action after a full season sidelined following a transfer wrangle with Gisborne.

With the league's only goalkeeper player-coach (Sandy Davie) at the helm, North Shore United slipped from runner-up spot to seventh place in a season when the dumping of former coach Don Jones was seen as a grave error. More points were gained away than at home although the home goal tally was exceeded only by Caversham. Shore reached the halfway mark with a six match winless spell to hover just above the relegation area but recovered well in the second half. Ohly Stop Out lost more at home in a season that marked the start of 17-year-old Peter Henry's colourful league career.

What a difference a name makes. As Christchurch United, the club had a record to match any other but a sponsor led to a change of name. Trans Tours United altered the team's luck as well. Before the name change part way through the season Christchurch had won five of its six matches but after it could win only two of the remaining 12. It was the club's second lowest ever league placing and the first to carry a sponsor's name in its title.

United's eighth position was five lower than it had finished before and the lowest ever by a playing

through champion (a record later shared by Mount Wellington 87-88). Nine losses were five more than its previous worst and its position was not assisted by a fixture backlog that resulted in five matches being played in fourteen days.

Despite acquisition of six new players including Derek Gibson-Smith (Sydney-Croatia) and Grant Turner (Hungaria) Stop Out struggled for most of the season to stave off the threat of relegation in the final match. It conceded the most goals in the league and suffered its heaviest defeat in a televised 0-6 away loss to North Shore. Fullback Maurice Tillotson had been ever present for the past six seasons and took over as coach midway through the season.

Gisborne City never recovered from a run of eight straight losses. It won only one fixture at home and three overall and dropped to the bottom after six matches and apart from easing ahead of Stop Out on two occasions on goal difference the threat of relegation was ominous. Gisborne became the third founder member to lose its league status. The season was not totally without reward with the side finishing runner-up (\$500) in the Fair Play Award.

1977

A new name appeared on the Rothmans Soccer League trophy for the second successive year when North Shore United became the fourth Auckland club to reign supreme. It was a personal triumph for coach Don Jones. Axed by the club after taking the team into the league in his first season as coach and then into runner-up spot Jones stayed with the club in an administrative position when many coaches would have departed.

Two extra teams were brought into the league for the second time for a total of 12 and prize-money was simultaneously doubled by Rothmans.

In a season when there was no outstanding team in the league North Shore proved itself the most consistent even if its form at times was anything but championship related. Reinstated as coach after one season's absence Jones guided Shore to the title following a battle with a rejuvenated Stop Out.

North Shore became the first team to lose its opening match and go on to win the title. The opening loss was its heaviest defeat to date (0-4) and was to a team eventually relegated. That defeat underlined the paradoxical nature of Shore's season.

That loss was followed by six straight wins then only one win in the next six games included its heaviest home defeat to date (1-4). Next came a club record, undefeated nine match run that included seven wins to seal the title. It won five of the six local derbies drawing the other while seven away successes was the league's best. Shore won three more fixtures than runner-up Stop Out despite finishing just one point ahead.

From second to bottom one year to second from top the next traces the marked improvement of Stop Out. The club took a leaf out of previous title winner WDU's book and used a small squad. Of 242 league positions eleven players accounted for all but 10.

Stop Out owed much to the contributing skills of newly signed Iain Ormond acquired from Blockhouse Bay after a job transfer, and from the effective strike force of Derek Gibson-Smith and Sam Malcolmson.

They netted 31 of Stop Out's 40 goals between them.

A lean mid-season spell of one win in six matches was a costly sequence for the Moera side. An 11 match undefeated run was six better than its previous best and one short of the league record. Three points were taken off North Shore and only three defeats was the league's best as was its undefeated home record.

Christchurch United returned to its known form as it recovered from third from bottom the previous year to fill third place. United's cause was not assisted by a six week gap between fixtures in mid-season which resulted in six successive away matches. The season was marked by a high proportion of draws and United set a league record at that stage of four in succession. Highlight of the year was undoubtedly the 4-0 away win over long time rival Mount Wellington - the biggest winning margin between the two in league and cup outings.

League newcomer Hamilton had a good year first time up ending with the best goal average (41-22) despite a fourth placing. Had goal difference applied - it was introduced the following year - Hamilton would have edged into third place by four clear goals.

The Waikato side led the eventual champions by three points at the 15 match stage but the final seven games produced a solitary win. Hamilton was the only team to score in every away match and also to escape defeat in Auckland.

Wellington Diamond United ended equal top scorer with Hamilton but a generous defence left the playing-through champions in a safe mid-table position. Diamond began impressively enough netting 15 in the opening three games. The 5-0 defeat of Blockhouse was the team's first ever away win by more than a single goal (total of 28 games). A 7-3 success at New Brighton immediately followed to produce a league record goal aggregate. Two wins in the last 10 matches effectively destroyed any hope of prize-money.

Mount Wellington maintained its record of always finishing in the top half - just. As pre-season favourite the Mount was again affected by players involved in World Cup qualifying play. At the halfway stage the Mount trailed leader Hamilton by one point with two games in hand but only seven points were gleaned from the remaining half including a spell of four consecutive matches without scoring.

Newly promoted Nelson United led the table with North Shore after five matches and suffered just one reversal in the last eight games. However, a mid-season spell of 10 matches without a win and a penchant for draws restricted the South Islanders to a safe final mid-table placing. It drew against every team except Christchurch and managed more than one goal at home on just one occasion. Blockhouse Bay finished out of the top half of the table for the first time. The Bay was not the same force without striker Mike Farac and the Ormond brothers. Duncan collected a title winners' medal with North Shore and Iain helped Stop Out into second place. They were the only team to beat Christchurch away.

Eastern Suburbs avoided relegation on goal average due largely to 5-1 and 6-2 defeats of New

Brighton who finished on the same points total. Those two wins plus a 4-1 win over Caversham resulted in half Suburbs' goals for the season in just three games. They lost a number of players to Courier Rangers but signed the mercurial Peter Henry from North Shore.

New Brighton continued its up and down form to finish 9th, 3rd, 9th, 4th and now 10th and relegated. Of thirty-six goals conceded, Eastern Suburbs, Hamilton and WDU accounted for 25. Graham Dacombe top scored with ten but failed to score in the second half of the season.

Dunedin City just avoided relegation following a marvellous second half season recovery. City made the worst start to a season of any club to date with just a solitary draw to show for the opening nine games. City's form over the remaining 13 matches befitted a championship rather than relegation contender.

The 16 points accrued from those matches were exceeded only by title winner North Shore. Needing a solitary point from its final away match to Stop Out (who required a win to keep its title hopes alive) to avoid relegation, it was a heart rending moment when City conceded a disputed goal in the 90th minute to lose 1-2.

Import Steve Wooddin arrived for the final two games. City scored against every team except city rival Caversham, both encounters ending 0-0. It was ironic that those two goalless matches between Dunedin's two representatives effectively contributed to the elimination of the Rothmans Soccer League in Otago.

Caversham filled bottom spot for the second time although its performance was an improvement on its 1973 showing. Last year Caversham finished as the league's top scorer and at one stage was title favourite. This time the Dunedin club produced the lowest total of goals (14) and failed to find the net in the final eight matches - a league record for a scoreless spell. Finishing seven points adrift of the next team was the largest margin after the eight points league record set by Caversham in 1973.

1978

Another intriguing year with the top two teams finishing level on points for the third time, the last occasion being six years ago. It was another Christchurch-Auckland monopoly, Christchurch United securing its third title and the five Auckland clubs occupying the immediate positions below.

For the first time the team winning the most matches was not the title winner. Second placed Mount Wellington had that distinction managing one more victory than Christchurch but an extra defeat was also registered and United triumphed with a superior 15 goal difference.

Usually points on the board are better than games in hand but Christchurch United again found itself with a fixture backlog and gradually eroded a five-match, nine-point deficit to take the title for a record third time. Once again a championship was won with a small, settled squad with virtually thirteen players seeing United through the 22 match programme.

For the only time in the league's history a team won the title after surviving a change of coach - Terry

Conley replaced after 13 matches by Brian Hardman. The leeway of matches, caused by adverse weather and the visit of the England 'B' side, meant Christchurch United was well off the pace for most of the season. The opening two weeks apart United did not hit the front until a final match draw away to Blockhouse gave it the point needed to unseat Mount Wellington. It had just one loss in the final 17 games which laid the foundation for United's success along with the best home record and best away defence - just six conceded a record for a 22 match campaign.

Mount Wellington finished runner-up for the fourth time in nine seasons and on this occasion threw away an excellent chance of lifting the title. Needing a win in its final match the Mount could only draw at home to Nelson, a result that cost the club \$10,000 in prize-money. Not only did Nelson deny the Mount a valuable point it also ended its unbeaten nine-match run at the start of the season. This result followed on from Nelson's upset Chatham Cup final win over hot favourite the Mount the previous year to establish the South Islanders as the Aucklanders' undisputed bogey team.

The Mount could feel justifiably aggrieved at not securing the title having led the table for 17 weeks and also beating Christchurch at home and away.

Following its lowest ever league placing last year Blockhouse Bay recovered to a creditable third position. It won only four at home, drawing a record equalling six and suffered a single loss to relegated Hamilton. The team scored 15 more than the previous season's record low and an eight match undefeated mid-season spell ended with a record 0-5 away loss to Christchurch.

After avoiding relegation last year by goal average, Eastern Suburbs took the innovative step of importing two professionals from Nottingham Forest for a three month period. The immense influence Steve Elliot and Bryn Gunn had can be gauged by the results. Suburbs won nine of 12 matches (34-13) during the professionals stay but could manage only two victories in 10 (12-11) during their absence.

Elliot in particular made a notable impact netting 17 goals including four hat-tricks in those dozen outings. Nelson United lamented Elliot's presence, the professional netting three and four goals respectively in Suburbs' 8-1 and 5-0 victories.

With five matches to play, Suburbs led the table and were title favourites. At that stage Christchurch was in sixth place nine points adrift of Suburbs although having five games in hand. Suburbs' final five produced two points - both draws - losing the other three to title contenders Mount Wellington, Christchurch and Blockhouse.

Newly promoted Courier Rangers attracted a number of players with generous signing-on fees. Consolidation was achieved and finishing only nine points adrift of the title was a far better performance than most people foresaw. Just seven goals conceded at home was easily the league's best while eight netted away was as easily the league's worst. Only the champions had a better defensive record. Seven of eight defeats were by the odd goal.

North Shore United failed to produce the previous year's form winning half the number of
